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A 2024 SEASON TO REMEMBER

The Tennessee Volunteers capped off their historic 2024 season with a 6-5 win over Texas A&M in Game 3 of the College World Series, clinching their first College Baseball National Championship in program history. After losing several key players from that roster, Tony Vitello will now look to repeat the feat — something that hasn't been accomplished since South Carolina did it in 2010 and 2011.

However, history over the past decade tells a different story. Since 2015, only one team has won the National Championship and returned to the College World Series the following year — Florida in 2018. While Tennessee will undoubtedly remain a powerhouse in the SEC, the trend of repeating champions doesn't necessarily favor them. But what has this program shown us? Tony Vitello and the Volunteers have already bucked one major trend by becoming the #1 overall seed to win the National Championship. Heading into 2025, they'll look to defy another as they aim for a return to Omaha.

The Michael Earley era in College Station is set to begin with sky-high expectations. This Texas A&M roster is arguably the most talented in the country, loaded with star power, quality depth on the mound, and a chip on its shoulder to get back to the College World Series (CWS) —and win it this time. D1 Baseball has ranked A&M as the #1 offense heading into the season, and it's easy to see why. The Aggies return superstars Jace LaViolette, who has the best odds to win the Golden Spikes Award (+400), and Gavin Grahovac. Adding to an already powerful lineup, they landed Gavin Kash from Texas Tech and Wyatt Henseler (Ivy League Player of the Year) from Penn through the transfer portal. This lineup is both deep and loaded with talent.

On the mound, the weekend rotation looks strong with the return of lefties Ryan Prager and Justin Lamkin. The addition of Myles Patton from Long Beach State provides a pivotal piece to the puzzle—he's expected to take the Sunday starter role, further solidifying the rotation.

One of the biggest questions surrounding this team is how they, and first-time head coach Michael Earley, will handle the immense expectations of being the team everyone is "hunting." With a championship-or-bust caliber roster, the pressure is undeniably high. The Aggies open their SEC schedule with a tough slate of opponents, including Alabama, Vanderbilt, Kentucky, and a highly anticipated rematch of last season's CWS Championship against Tennessee. There won't be much time for a learning curve. The primary concern, in my opinion, lies in the back end of the bullpen. Losing Evan Aschenbeck and Chris Cortez leaves significant gaps to fill, and it will be critical to see who steps up in highpressure, late-game situations. This bullpen could make or break their season.

At the end of the day, this team is the best in the country on paper. I fully expect them to return to the CWS, with a legitimate shot at bringing home a national championship.

After back-to-back 0-2 showings in the College World Series, the Virginia Cavaliers are heading into 2025 with their eyes set on winning in Omaha and capturing their second national title.

Heading into fall ball, Coach O'Connor expressed confidence, calling this one of the best teams he has had in recent years, particularly due to an improved pitching staff—a weak point in previous seasons because of a lack of depth and consistency. The weekend rotation looks promising, with Evan Blanco anchoring Friday nights, Jay Woolfolk transitioning into the Saturday role, and highly touted two-way transfer Chris Arroyo rounding out the weekend. In the bullpen, Virginia expects to have more success and greater contributions, addressing what has been a glaring issue over the past two years. Offensively, the Cavaliers should once again feature one of the top lineups in the nation, returning key bats like Harrison Didawick and Jacob Ference while adding to an already talented group featuring rising stars Henry Ford, Henry Godbout, and Chris Arroyo. With depth and versatility, Virginia's 1-9 lineup is arguably the most complete in the country, capable of delivering power while also excelling at small ball when needed.

Expect big things from Coach O'Connor and the Cavaliers this season, both in ACC play and on the postseason stage. If their pitching staff can hold up and maintain depth throughout the year, this team has all the tools to contend for—and win—a championship.

The Tigers head into the 2025 season ranked No. 3 in the nation, aiming to reclaim their spot as one of the most dominant programs in college baseball. After an up-and-down 2024 campaign that ended in the regionals, head coach Jay Johnson's squad looks to be reloaded and ready for a deep postseason run. Offensively, the Tigers bring back key contributors like Jared Jones, a slugger with 42 career home runs, and Steven Milam, who made an immediate impact as a freshman. Transfers Luis Hernandez and Daniel Dickinson add additional firepower to the lineup, providing consistency and power that should make LSU one of the most dangerous offensive teams in the SEC.

On the mound, LSU has plenty of talent, but faces the challenge of replacing a plethora of talented arms they've relied on in the past. Sophomore lefty Kade Anderson steps into a leading role after showing flashes of brilliance, while transfer additions like Anthony Eyanson from UC San Diego and Zac Cowan from Wofford bring experience and high ceilings to the rotation. The bullpen will be anchored by experienced arms and newcomers alike, including closer Gavin Guidry, who brings stability to the back end of games. With plenty of raw potential across the staff, the Tigers will rely on this group to develop quickly and support their powerful offense.

LSU has the talent and depth to be a national title contender, but their success will hinge on how well their pitching staff adapts and performs throughout the season. If the new arms step up and the offense lives up to its potential, the Tigers could find themselves back in Omaha, ready to chase another championship. This year's roster has all the tools to be special – it's just a matter of putting it all together.

Tony Vitello has transformed Tennessee baseball into a powerhouse, adopting a mantra of "we don't rebuild, we reload." Over the last five seasons, the Volunteers have won more games than any other program, and after capturing their first national title in 2024, the expectations remain sky-high. Despite losing a star-studded group of players, including Moore, Burke, Dreiling, Beam, and others, Tennessee's combination of portal acquisitions, top-tier recruiting classes, and proven player development keeps the program poised for success. Notable additions include Andrew Fischer (2nd Team All-SEC, Ole Miss), Gavin Kilen (3rd Team All-ACC, Louisville), and freshmen standouts Jay Abernathy and Levi Clark, both expected to make immediate impacts. Returning stars like Team USA shortstop Dean Curley and center fielder Hunter Ensley will anchor the defense, ensuring a strong foundation.

However, the Volunteers face some early-season uncertainties, particularly in their pitching staff. With ace AJ Russell sidelined, the rotation is expected to feature Liam Doyle, who brings SEC experience and a bulldog mentality that aligns with Vitello's philosophy. Nate Snead is transitioning from the bullpen to a starting role, while JUCO transfer Brandon Arvidson and freshman Tegan Kuhns, a top-100 prospect, are in contention for the Sunday spot. Offensively, Tennessee remains loaded and capable of producing big numbers, but they'll need key players like Reese Chapman and Cannon Peebles to step up. Peebles, a former Freshman All-American at NC State, aims to regain his form, while Chapman's potential as a middle-of-the-order bat is pivotal to the team's success.

Vitello and his coaching staff, including Frank Anderson and Josh Elander, have consistently delivered results, making three College World Series trips in the past four years. Even in their one absence from Omaha, the Volunteers fielded one of the most dominant teams in college baseball history. Despite the roster turnover and a few question marks, Tennessee is well-positioned to make another deep postseason run and contend for back-to-back national championships.

The Razorbacks enter the 2025 season ranked No. 5 nationally, ready to build on their tradition of success under veteran head coach Dave Van Horn. With one of the deepest pitching staffs in the country and a roster brimming with talent, Arkansas is positioned to compete for an SEC title and make a push for Omaha. Sophomore Gabe Gaeckle headlines the rotation after an impressive freshman campaign in which he dominated out of the bullpen, showcasing a fastball that touches 100 mph and a devastating mix of secondary pitches. He'll be joined by East Carolina transfer Zach Root and Ohio State transfer Landon Beidelschies, who bring experience and stability to the rotation. Meanwhile, junior Christian Foutch steps into the closer role, and highly touted freshmen Carson Wiggins and Cole Gibler add even more firepower to a pitching staff loaded with upside.

Offensively, the Razorbacks are focused on taking a step forward after struggles at the plate in SEC play last season. Key returners like Kendall Diggs and Ryder Helfrick are expected to make an impact, while transfers Cam Kozeal and Brent Iredale add fresh energy and production. Iredale, one of the top hitters in junior college over the last two years, brings elite power and consistency to the lineup. Arkansas will rely on this revamped offense to complement its pitching dominance, with the hope of becoming a more complete team capable of winning high-scoring games as well as pitching duels.

As usual, expectations are high in Fayetteville, but the Razorbacks know their season will ultimately be defined by postseason success. With a pitching staff that stands out as one of the nation's best and an offense poised for growth, this team has all the ingredients to compete on the sport's biggest stage. If Arkansas can improve at the plate and maintain its depth on the mound, a return trip to Omaha could very well be in the cards.

North Carolina was one of the best teams in college baseball last year, winning the ACC title in 2024 with a 22-8 conference record and making first trip back to the College World Series in Omaha since 2018. Coach Scott Forbes is ready to reload the Tar Heels and make another run this season.

The Tar Heels set a school record for home runs last year, with 115. While they lost some key power bats, including clutch hitter Vance Honeycutt, the team returns several impactful players. Catcher Luke Stevenson, who slashed .284 with 14 home runs and 58 RBIs, is back after earning Freshman All-American honors last year. Another standout bat is sophomore Gavin Gallaher, who had an impressive freshman campaign, hitting .314 with 8 home runs and 38 RBIs. The Tar Heels also bring back Alex Madera (.303, 2 HRs, 34 RBIs), who provides a steady bat and a great glove in the infield. Freshman Perry Hargett is also a player to keep an eye on this year.

On the mound, North Carolina could have one of the best weekend rotations in the country. The Tar Heels led the ACC last year with a team ERA of 4.30 and return several key arms. RHP Jason Decaro (6-1, 3.41 ERA, 78 strikeouts) is back after earning Freshman All-American honors. Two more starters, Jake Knapp and Folger Boaz, are expected to return to the rotation after missing time, giving the team a strong core to anchor their pitching staff. Kyle Percival, who posted an impressive 2.42 ERA across 22 relief appearances, is also back, along with Aidan Haugh, who made 22 appearances and started 8 games last season. Matthew Matthijs will be another key bullpen arm this year, while transfers Cale Bolton (Liberty) and Tom Chmielewski (Princeton) will add valuable depth to an already strong staff.

The Tar Heels are primed to defend their ACC title, and another trip to the College World Series could very well be in their future.

Oregon State delivered another impressive season in 2024, finishing 45-16 and falling just short in the Super Regionals against Kentucky. The Beavers face the challenge of replacing No. 1 overall MLB draft pick Travis Bazzana, but their offense still has plenty of firepower. Gavin Turley, who started 61 games and slashed .277 with 19 home runs and 74 RBIs, will be a key cog in the lineup. Transfer Avia Arquette (Washington) brings elite tools, a .325 average with 12 home runs, and gold-glove-caliber defense at shortstop, making him a projected top-10 draft pick. Center fielder Dallas Macias (.315, 9 HR, 43 RBIs) provides leadership and aggressive play, while first baseman Jacob Krieg (.278, 9 HR, 40 RBIs) adds more pop. A healthy Trent Caraway, who missed 44 games last year, should further bolster the lineup.

The pitching staff must replace key arms like Jacob Kmatz and Aiden May, but there is talent ready to step up. Eric Segura (6-1, 4.93 ERA, 72 Ks in 69.1 IP) is a reliable strike thrower who can eat innings. Lefty fireballer Nelson Keljo, who touched the high 90s last year in the bullpen, could transition to a starting role. Freshman standout Dax Whitney, a highly-touted recruit from Idaho, brings a fastball that touches the mid-90s and could play a significant role. The bullpen features versatile options like Joey Mundt and transfer Tanner Douglas (Portland), who are both closer candidates. Transfers Max Fraser (Washington) and Ethan Kleinschmit (Linn-Benton CC) will add depth to the staff.

Playing as an independent this season, Oregon State will rely on its mix of experienced players and high-ceiling newcomers to aim for another deep postseason run.

The Bulldogs enter 2025 ranked No. 8 nationally, building on the momentum of a standout season under second-year head coach Wes Johnson. After earning a national seed and advancing to a regional in Johnson's debut, Georgia looks ready to take another step forward with a roster that blends returning stars, key transfers, and rising talent. At the plate, the Bulldogs have a potent lineup led by returning sluggers Slate Alford and Kolby Branch, who combined for 34 home runs last year. Tre Phelps adds another level of power after an outstanding freshman season, while transfers like Robbie Burnett and Devin Obee provide proven production and athleticism. This offense is balanced with power, consistency, and experience, making Georgia one of the most dangerous teams in the SEC.

On the mound, the Bulldogs boast a talented pitching staff led by ace Kolten Smith, who struck out 105 batters in just under 70 innings last season and has the tools to emerge as one of the SEC's best arms. He's joined by reliable returners like Leighton Finley and a crop of newcomers, including Ole Miss transfer JT Quinn and Cal Baptist transfer Brian Curley, who add depth and upside to the staff. While the rotation has the pieces to succeed, consistency will be key as several young and new arms adjust to their roles. The bullpen, anchored by Curley and rising talent Matthew Hoskins, should provide stability in high-pressure situations.

With an experienced lineup, strong pitching depth, and a head coach known for developing talent, Georgia is primed for another big season. The Bulldogs have the firepower to compete for an SEC championship and the potential to break through to Omaha for the first time since 2008. If their pitching staff solidifies and their newcomers adapt quickly, this could be a special year for the program.

Defensively, the Seminoles are among the nation's elite, boasting the No. 1 ranked defense according to D1 Baseball. Catcher Jaxson West, shortstop Alex Lodise, second baseman Drew Faurot, and center fielder Max Williams form a dynamic core up the middle, ensuring that runs will be hard to come by for opposing teams. Offensively, Williams and Lodise must step into larger roles to compensate for the departures.

On the mound, Preseason All-American Jamie Arnold provides stability on Fridays, but the rest of the rotation is a question mark. Additionally, the status of future first-rounder Cam Leiter remains unclear, and his absence could further strain the pitching depth. Florida's pitching was inconsistent in 2024 and likely wouldn't have reached Omaha without key contributions from Jac Caglianone, Brandon Neely, and Jameson Fisher, all of whom have moved on. Now, younger arms like Liam Peterson, Jake Clemente, and Pierce Coppola must step up to anchor the weekend rotation. Both impressed with strong summers for Team USA and in the Cape, giving fans and coaches confidence. Peterson, with his streamlined delivery, has the potential to emerge as a true ace. The bullpen, despite losing Neely and Fisher, still boasts reliable options like Luke McNeillie, Alex Philpot, and Frank Menendez, with JUCO transfer Matthew Jenkins also expected to contribute as well.

While Florida loses Gator legend Jac Caglianone, Coach O'Sullivan has restocked the roster with offensive firepower. Kyle Jones adds a true leadoff hitter, Blake Cyr provides an impact bat, and Bobby Boser offers a combination of defensive and offensive versatility. Ty Evans returns after a strong start before injury, joined by Colby Shelton, Luke Heyman, and Cade Kurland, all primed for rebound seasons. If Florida's young pitching develops and stays healthy, the Gators have the tools to make another Omaha run. Even in "down years," Sully's teams always seem to find themselves back on the national stage.

Offensively, Florida should have no trouble producing runs. If the young arms can continue to grow, stay consistent, and remain healthy, this team has all the ingredients to contend for a national title. There may be some growing pains early, but history suggests that Sully and the Gators will find their way back to Omaha. Even in their so-called "down years," Florida always seems to be playing on college baseball's biggest stage.

Facility upgrades are underway, and a team rebuild was completed this fall for Chris Pollard and the Blue Devils.

The 2024 season was plagued with injuries for Coach Pollard, who aims to avoid the injury bug in 2025 and continue Duke's success as one of the ACC's top teams. After losing elite arms like Jonathan Santucci, Fran Oschell, and Charlie Beilenson, the Blue Devils return a presumed all-lefty rotation featuring Andrew Healy, two-way star Kyle Johnson, and James Tallon. For this staff to thrive, Healy needs to stay healthy, Johnson must maintain consistency, and Tallon must rediscover his freshman-year form. If those pieces fall into place, this pitching staff will give Duke a chance to compete in every game. Offensively, replacing Alex Stone, Logan Bravo, and Zack Morris—who combined for over 50 home runs in 2024—will be a challenge. However, Pollard has risen to the occasion, landing standout Georgetown transfer Jake Hyde to complement returning bats like Tyler Albright, AJ Gracia, and Ben Miller. Another key portal addition is Harvard transfer Ben Rounds, who posted a .400 batting average and hit eight home runs in 170 at-bats last season. While Duke may not lean as heavily on the long ball in 2025, Pollard emphasized that his team has worked hard this fall to grind out at-bats and develop a more balanced offensive approach.

Despite the loss of significant power and talent from the 2024 lineup, Pollard has brought back several quality bats and supplemented them with strong portal additions, ensuring this team will generate runs throughout the season. Duke's success in 2025 will largely hinge on the pitching staff's ability to stay healthy and for key arms to recapture their early career success. If those factors align, the Blue Devils should be among the ACC's best and a formidable postseason contender.

NC State had a very successful 2024 season, reaching the College World Series under veteran head coach Elliott Avent, who enters his 28th season at the helm. This year, the Wolfpack will need to replace key contributors Alex Makarewicz and Jacob Cozart, but they bring back some exciting young talent. Sophomore right fielder Josh Hogue had an excellent freshman campaign, slashing .314 with 4 home runs and 28 RBIs in 37 games. Catcher Alex Sosa, another sophomore, returns after hitting .230 with 6 home runs and 24 RBIs in 35 games. Versatile sophomore Luke Nixon also played multiple positions last year and will be a key contributor.

The offense will get a boost from transfers like Luke DeCriscio (.308, 3 HR, 42 RBIs at San Diego), a strong defender, and Ryan Jaros (.343, 1 HR, 8 RBIs at Georgia Tech), a consistent hitter. However, the Wolfpack offense lacks significant power, so playing small ball may be crucial to generating runs. The strength of this year's team lies on the mound. Dominic Fritton (LHP), who went 3-7 with a 7.64 ERA over 17 starts, has improved his secondary pitches and will step into the ace role. Lefty Ryan Marohn (4-2, 3.97 ERA in 10 starts) brings swing-and-miss stuff and should hold a rotation spot, along with sophomore Heath Andrews. The bullpen looks solid, led by Derrick Smith (8 saves, 4.55 ERA) as the likely closer and key arms like Jacob Dudon (4-2, 4.50 ERA).

With a strong pitching staff, NC State's success will rely on its ability to win low-scoring games and hold leads late. If the offense finds its rhythm, the Wolfpack could make another deep postseason run.

While this trio may lack experience, their sky-high potential could make them formidable rotation pieces. Backing them up is a deep bullpen brimming with game-tested talent.

At the plate, gone are the likes of Seaver King and Nick Kurtz, but the lineup might be even stronger overall thanks to an impressive haul from the transfer portal. Marek Houston returns after a breakout 2024 campaign, and he'll be joined by impactful newcomers Ethan Conrad, Jimmy Keenan, and Kade Lewis—each expected to thrive in the hitter-friendly confines of Wake Forest's home field. Last year, the offense often faltered when Kurtz wasn't having a monster day, but that won't be an issue this season. This year's lineup is more well-rounded, offering a mix of power, consistency, and speed from top to bottom.

Offensively, the Demon Deacons should rank among the ACC's best, but their ultimate success will depend on the starting rotation living up to its potential after a full offseason in the pitching lab. If Dallas, Lunceford, and Marsten deliver as expected, Wake Forest could find themselves playing deep into June, chasing a trip to Omaha.

Erik Bakich has enjoyed a strong start to his tenure at Clemson, leading the Tigers to success in his first two seasons, though postseason heartbreak has been a recurring theme. The 2025 team appears poised to break through and return to the College World Series. Bakich recently expressed optimism about this group, calling it "the deepest roster we've had in the three years that we've been here." Leading the charge is preseason first-team All-American Cam Cannarella, a dynamic player who competes with a chip on his shoulder and enters the season with the fourth-best odds (+1000) to win the Golden Spikes Award. Bakich has excelled in leveraging the transfer portal, bringing in Purdue standout Luke Gaffney, who hit .359 with 13 home runs and earned Big Ten Freshman of the Year honors in 2024, and Michigan transfer Collin Priest, an All-Big Ten Freshman Team member. Adding to the good news, Andrew Ciufo returns fully healthy after missing the second half of last season, providing another key bat to an already potent lineup.

On the mound, preseason first-team All-American Aidan Knaak will anchor the pitching staff. Knaak is coming off an impressive freshman season where he went 5-1 with a 3.35 ERA, earning All-ACC First Team honors, and looks ready to elevate his game as one of the nation's top arms. The rest of the rotation should include Michael Gillen, a Seton Hall transfer with a fastball that can hit 98 mph, Ethan Darden, who gained experience in last year's rotation, and true freshman Dane Moehler. While the bullpen presents some uncertainties, the starting rotation appears more stable and should improve on last year's performance. Combined with an explosive offense, this rotation gives Clemson a strong chance to contend.

If the offense continues to thrive and the pitching staff proves reliable, Clemson has the tools to claim another ACC title and make a long-awaited return to the College World Series. The pieces are in place, and this season could be the one where Bakich and the Tigers finally overcome their postseason hurdles.

The Cowboys are gearing up for another strong season in 2025, entering the year ranked No. 17 nationally. Under the leadership of Josh Holliday, now in his 13th year as head coach, the Cowboys have built one of the most consistent programs in college baseball. This year's roster features a potent offense led by junior Nolan Schubart, a left-handed slugger with light-tower power who is poised to be a first-round MLB draft pick. He's supported by veteran bats like Ian Daugherty, Aidan Meola, and Colin Brueggemann, all of whom bring proven production and the ability to hit for power. Transfers Jayson Jones from Arkansas and Brayden Smith from Iowa Western CC add additional depth and athleticism, ensuring the Cowboys will have a balanced and dangerous lineup.

The pitching staff is filled with potential, though replacing last year's elite weekend rotation is no small task. Gabe Davis, a towering 6-foot-9 right-hander, has electric stuff and made strides last season, putting him in position to take on a leading role. Transfers Harrison Bodendorf from Hawaii and Mario Pesca from St. John's bring valuable experience to the rotation, while freshman Ethan Lund offers high-upside arm talent with a fastball touching the mid-90s. The bullpen features plenty of options, with Davis capable of stepping into high-leverage situations alongside other talented arms ready to develop into key contributors.

With a lineup that's stacked with power and a pitching staff loaded with untapped potential, the Cowboys are wellpositioned to compete for the Big 12 crown and make another postseason run. While regular-season success has become the standard in Stillwater, this year's team has its sights set on making a deeper impact in the postseason. If the pitching staff can find consistency to complement the firepower of the offense, Oklahoma State has the pieces to make a serious push toward Omaha.

Mississippi State heads into the 2025 season as a potential dark horse in the SEC, with a roster full of experience and upside. Despite losing star pitchers Jurrangelo Cijntje and Khal Stephen, the Bulldogs' rotation is deep, albeit lacking a true ace. Pico Kohn, Karson Ligon, and Jacob Pruitt appear to be the frontrunners for weekend starting roles, but each must prove capable of handling the increased workload required to contend in the SEC.

On the offensive side, Mississippi State must replace its top three hitters from last season, but first baseman Hunter Hines returns as a key piece. After a "down" year in which he hit .257 with 16 home runs, Hines is poised for a bounceback season, potentially surpassing 20 homers with improved plate discipline. Transfers Noah Sullivan (USC Upstate) and Ace Reese (Houston) bring All-Conference potential, with Reese generating significant buzz following a dominant fall.

For Mississippi State to achieve its ceiling, the Bulldogs will need both the rotation and lineup to find their footing. The development of top arms and breakout performances from emerging hitters will be pivotal. This team has the potential to compete at a high level, but it will depend on whether the Bulldogs can answer key questions about their pitching and offensive production. If the pieces come together, Mississippi State could find itself in Omaha, but the margin for error is slim in the unforgiving SEC.

Jim Schlossnagle begins his tenure at Texas as the Longhorns make their much-anticipated debut in the SEC. With one of the nation's top offenses and an experienced coaching staff, the Longhorns are looking to make a statement in their new conference. The offense, ranked fourth nationally by D1 Baseball, is headlined by Golden Spikes contender Max Belyeu, who also enters the season with the third-best odds to win the award (+800). Jalin Flores, a Preseason Third-Team All-American, adds power and consistency at shortstop.

Schlossnagle brought along renowned pitching coach Max Weiner from Texas A&M to address the significant question marks on the mound. Weiner's reputation for developing pitchers will be tested, as Texas relies on transfers and unproven arms to navigate the SEC gauntlet. Jared Spencer, an Indiana State transfer, is expected to lead the rotation, but the rest of the staff remains up in the air.

The Longhorns face a brutal welcome to the SEC, with a conference slate that closes with a challenging five-week stretch featuring Auburn, Texas A&M, Arkansas, Florida, and Oklahoma. For Texas to succeed, the offense must carry the team while the pitching staff finds its footing. If Weiner can piece together a reliable rotation and bullpen, this roster has the potential to emerge as a dark horse College World Series contender. However, with so many uncertainties on the mound, the Longhorns' postseason aspirations may hinge on how quickly their arms adapt to the rigors of SEC play. While Schlossnagle's coaching pedigree is undeniable, 2025 may serve as a transitional year for a program adjusting to the heightened competition of its new conference home.

The Gauchos are gearing up for another strong season in 2025, entering the year ranked No. 22 nationally. Under head coach Andrew Checketts, UCSB has built a reputation as a consistent postseason contender, and this year's squad has the tools to uphold that standard. The pitching staff is the undeniable strength of the team, led by junior ace Tyler Bremner, who is widely considered one of the top arms in college baseball and a projected top-five MLB Draft pick. Bremner's command and ability to miss bats set the tone for a rotation that also features sophomore standout Jackson Flora, a right-hander with a powerful fastball that has touched 98 mph, and sophomore lefty Cole Tryba, who will anchor the bullpen with his strike-throwing ability and deceptive delivery.

The biggest challenge for the Gauchos will be integrating a largely new lineup after losing seven starters from last season. Although the offense lacks proven consistency, the combination of experienced transfers and young talent offers plenty of promise.

The Gauchos remain a team built on dominant pitching, and this year's staff is among the best in the nation. With a deep bullpen and a rotation anchored by Bremner and Flora, UCSB has the arms to compete with anyone. If the revamped lineup can provide enough support, this team has the potential to make another deep postseason run. For a program that has redefined success on the West Coast under Checketts, the pieces are in place to challenge for a Big West title and contend for a trip to Omaha.

The Horned Frogs come into the 2025 season hungry to return to their familiar postseason stage after falling short in 2024. Ranked No. 23 nationally, this year's squad carries a chip on its shoulder and is led by head coach Kirk Saarloos, who is determined to guide the team back to prominence. Skylar Meade and the 2025 Troy Trojans are focused on making a postseason push after falling short last year, with a roster that has the potential to deliver a strong campaign.

The primary question for Troy heading into the season is their starting rotation, which lacks certainty beyond Friday night ace Garrett Gainous. While the talent is there with arms like Luke Lyon, Noah Edders, and Colby Frieda, consistency will be the key in solidifying the remaining weekend spots.

On the offensive side, the Trojans are in a much better position, led by star catcher Brooks Bryan, who put up an impressive 18 home runs and 85 RBIs last season. Supporting him are Peyton Watts, Gavin Schrader, and Blake Cavill, all of whom are expected to be significant contributors to a well-rounded lineup.

Under Meade's leadership, Troy has emerged as a top-tier program in the Sun Belt and a force in the mid-major landscape. If the Trojans can establish a reliable rotation, they're well-positioned to contend for the Sun Belt title and secure a postseason berth as a team no major program would want to face.

THE OUTSIDERS I TEAMS TO KNOW OUTSIDE OF THE TOP 25

West Virginia (Big 12)

West Virginia enjoyed a magical season in 2024, reaching the Super Regionals before falling to North Carolina. Head coach Randy Mazey retired after the season, leaving the program in the capable hands of longtime assistant and new head coach, Steve Sabins. Sabins is expected to carry on the winning tradition in Morgantown, as the Mountaineers aim to build on last year's success.

Offensively, West Virginia should remain potent despite losing key contributors J.J. Wetherholt and Reed Chumley. Catcher Logan Sauve (.308, 8 HR, 36 RBIs) will anchor the lineup after a strong season. Another key bat will be versatile junior Sam White (.305, 10 HR, 42 RBIs), who can play multiple positions and provide consistent production. Power hitter Grant Hussey (.242, 12 HR, 37 RBIs) remains a significant threat to leave the yard at any moment, and Kyle West, who launched 14 home runs in 2024, will return as the primary DH. Sophomore Michael Perazza (.258, 1 HR, 7 RBIs) will also compete for at-bats, giving the lineup additional depth and versatility. Scoring runs shouldn't be an issue for the Mountaineers in 2025.

On the mound, West Virginia will need to overcome the loss of four pitchers to the MLB Draft, including bulldog starter Derek Clark. Junior Carson Estridge (1-2, 3.21 ERA) is a key returning arm and will transition from the bullpen to a potential starting role this season. Sophomore Chase Meyer could also step into a starting role after an impressive showing in the Cape Cod League. Junior Gavin Van Kempen (6-1, 3.14 ERA) adds high-octane stuff, with a fastball that touches 97 mph. The rotation and bullpen depth will be bolstered by transfer Jack Kartsonas (Kent State), who has starting experience, and freshman Mac Stiffler, a towering 6'7" right-hander with a 90's fastball.

Coach Sabins will undoubtedly have this team motivated and ready to compete. With a mix of returning stars, talented newcomers, and a proven leader at the helm, the Mountaineers are poised for another successful season in Morgantown.

Kansas (Big 12)

The 2025 Kansas Jayhawks enter the season with optimism and momentum under third-year head coach Dan Fitzgerald. Coming off a strong 2024 campaign where they narrowly missed an NCAA tournament berth, the Jayhawks boast a veteran-heavy roster built to compete in the highly competitive Big 12. With a lineup full of experienced players and a pitching staff headlined by Big 12 Freshman of the Year Dominic Voegele, Kansas has the tools to contend for a postseason berth. Voegele, a sophomore ace with a mid-90s fastball and improved secondary pitches, will anchor the rotation alongside breakout candidate Cooper Moore and a deep bullpen. The team's offensive identity will center around disciplined at-bats, physicality, and a mix of power and speed.

Kansas' lineup is led by senior infielder Michael Brooks, who returns after an injury-shortened 2024 season in which he showcased his elite defense and offensive potential. Transfers such as Brady Counsell (Minnesota) and Derek Cerda (Western Oklahoma State) provide additional pop and athleticism to an already experienced roster. The team's ability to grind out at-bats and produce runs in clutch situations will make them a difficult opponent for Big 12 pitching staffs.

The Jayhawks' success will ultimately hinge on their ability to answer questions at the back of the rotation and maintain consistency on defense. If the pitching staff, particularly the rotation depth, can rise to the occasion, and the lineup stays productive throughout the season, Kansas could make significant noise in the Big 12 and punch their ticket to the NCAA tournament for the first time since 2006. With a mix of veteran leadership and young talent, this could be a breakout year for the Jayhawks.

Auburn is coming off a very disappointing season, finishing 8-22 in SEC play and missing the SEC tournament. Heading into his tenth season, Coach Butch Thompson took action in the transfer portal while also signing a strong freshman class to revitalize the Tigers. With the excitement of playing in a renovated Plainsman Park and a solid performance in fall practices, Auburn is optimistic about turning things around and returning to postseason play.

The biggest issue for Auburn last year was its pitching, as the starting rotation struggled to a 5.94 team ERA. The Tigers lost key arms in Chase Allsup and Tanner Bauman to last year's MLB Draft but have addressed these losses by bringing in reinforcements. Cade Fisher, who showed promise in Florida's bullpen with 76 strikeouts, needs to improve his 7.13 ERA but could play a significant role. Samuel Dutton (LSU) and Mason Koch (Creighton) were also added, although Koch will miss the early part of the season. Hayden Murphy emerged as a standout during fall practices and is expected to be a key arm in the bullpen. Additionally, Auburn's talented freshman class could play a major role, with Jackson Sanders and Connor Gatewood standing out as potential contributors.

Offensively, the Tigers have a lineup that could be one of the most dangerous in the SEC. Ike Irish (DH/C) slashed an impressive .319 with 14 home runs and 59 RBIs last season, while Cooper McMurray (1B) adds another big bat, hitting .296 with 14 home runs and 56 RBIs. Key additions from the transfer portal, such as Lucas Steele (Samford) and Bristol Carter (East Carolina), bring depth and power to the lineup. With an offense capable of producing runs and a revamped pitching staff, Auburn has the pieces to bounce back and make a push for postseason action in 2025.

🐔 🛛 Coastal Carolina (Sun Belt)

Coastal Carolina enters the 2025 season under the leadership of new manager Kevin Schnall, who takes over for legendary coach Gary Gilmore. Schnall, a long-time assistant and protégé, has been preparing to step into this role and is poised to lead the Chanticleers into a new era. While Coastal lost some firepower from last year's offense,

they still have a solid core of returning players and new additions ready to contribute.

Catcher Cade Bodine will provide a spark in the lineup, coming off a strong season where he slashed .324 with 9 home runs and 71 RBIs. Blake Barthol, who started all 61 games last year, will anchor second base after slashing .310 with 15 home runs and 61 RBIs. Junior outfielder Jake Books, who hit .290 with 8 home runs in 2024, returns to patrol one of the corner outfield spots, while junior speedster Dean Mihos is expected to take over in center field. Senior transfer Wells Sykes (Citadel) adds veteran leadership and experience, while NJCAA Division II Player of the Year Colby Thorndyke brings left-handed power to the lineup.

The pitching staff looks to be the team's strength this year. Senior RHP Riley Eikhoff will assume the role of ace after posting a 6-1 record and a 5.00 ERA over 75.2 innings last season. Sophomore Cameron Flukey, who started 10 games in 2024, could challenge Eikhoff for the Friday night spot. Dominick Carbone and Oliver Ellison are expected to be key bullpen arms, while freshman Scott Doran, who sits in the low 90s with his fastball, had an impressive fall and should add depth to the relief corps. Additionally, several key arms return from injury, bolstering the staff. With a strong pitching core and a lineup featuring both veteran presence and exciting new talent, Coastal Carolina is poised to contend in the Sun Belt Conference and make another push for postseason success in 2025.

South Carolina (SEC)

This may be more of an honorable mention than anything else, but the Gamecocks enter 2025 led by one of the most surprising coaching hires of the offseason, Paul Mainieri. Has the game changed too much for Mainieri to balance the new world of NIL and the transfer portal? This will be something to keep an eye on throughout the season, but they bode one of the best bats in the country in Ethan Petry. Ultimately, there are way too many question marks to list, but as far as storylines go, seeing how Mainieri navigates this season will be interesting.

🕢 College of Charleston (CAC)

Last season ended in heartbreaking fashion for Chad Holbrook and the Charleston Cougars, as they finished as CAA champions but were controversially snubbed from a regional appearance. That postseason disappointment should serve as plenty of motivation for the Cougars to dominate their conference in 2025 and make a strong case for a tournament bid.

The Cougars' pitching staff, led by Jake Brink and Aiden Hunter, should keep them competitive in nearly every game, giving the offense opportunities to shine. Speaking of the offense, Charleston boasted one of the best mid-major lineups last season, and that success is expected to continue. Anchored by standout players like Avery Neaves, Dariyan Pendergrass, and Will Baumhofer, the Cougars' lineup is well-equipped to produce plenty of runs and make noise on the national stage.

With a chip on their shoulder and something to prove, Charleston is primed to make a statement in 2025. Expect the Cougars to compete as a team on a mission, not only aiming for a postseason appearance but also as a potential dark horse capable of pulling off an upset.

C UCONN (Big East)

Jim Penders has done an outstanding job making UConn Huskies baseball a relevant program in recent years, relying on a combination of strong pitching and timely hitting—and 2025 should be no different. Veteran pitchers Gabe Van Emon and Ian Cooke will anchor the starting rotation, making UConn a tough matchup every weekend.

Offensively, the Huskies return multiple key pieces from their 2024 lineup, providing quality depth throughout the order. The addition of Sam Biller brings another potent bat to complement Maddix Delana, whose base-clearing power will be a focal point of the offense.

UConn may fly under the radar for much of the season, they have the tools to catch national attention in the postseason. Expect the Huskies to be a dangerous team, with potential to make another Super Regional run.

VT Virginia Tech (ACC)


The Hokies head into the 2025 season with plenty to prove after back-to-back late-season collapses that left them out of the postseason. The Hokies, led by head coach John Szefc, have the talent to bounce back, with a mix of veteran returners and exciting newcomers. Offensively, Virginia Tech boasts one of the more dynamic mid-tier lineups in the ACC. The return of Ben Watson, who slashed an incredible .417/.464/.592 last season, provides a cornerstone in the lineup. He's joined by power-hitting transfer David Lewis, who posted 24 home runs last year at D-II North Greenville, and Garrett Michel, whose 2024 campaign was cut short but showed elite promise.

On the mound, Brett Renfrow leads the pitching staff after a strong freshman year and a summer with Team USA. Behind him, Madden Clement and Grant Manning add intrigue to the rotation, while Cameron Lejeune, a transfer from McNeese, offers versatility as a potential starter or closer. The bullpen has depth, with promising young arms like Preston Crowl and intriguing transfers like Josh Berzonski and Brendan Yagesh. While Virginia Tech's pitching struggled in recent years, Szefc is optimistic that this year's group, which has more ACC experience than the 2022 super regional staff, can rise to the occasion.

Ultimately, Virginia Tech's season will depend on striking a balance between their strong offense and improved pitching. If they can overcome past late-season struggles and the newcomers gel as expected, the Hokies have the potential to not only return to the NCAA Tournament but also make a deep run. However, any offensive regression or failure to solidify the pitching staff could leave them on the outside looking in yet again.
