Your League Is Unique, Your Advice Should Be, Too

We live in a new era of fantasy football analysis

Simulations, projections, advanced stats, spreads and totals, player props, weather trends—the tools available to help you win have never been better. And while all of those things are great, none of them solve your biggest hindrance to winning your league: it's all generic advice.

Syncing your league eliminates generic advice. It takes all of those tools and personalizes them to your league settings, your scoring and what your team actually needs to win.

Let's start simple. Your scoring and roster settings. When you sync your league on Fantasy Life, every projection and ranking adjusts to your scoring system. What people sleep on is their roster settings. Your league might be just a traditional PPR league, but you start three WRs and a flex instead of two WRs and a flex. That's not a standard league anymore. Every piece of generic draft analysis you're reading assumes it is. That's the generic advice problem. You may think your league is standard but the reality is most leagues are not, and it's hurting your research. Syncing your league is the solution.

This is how you win draft season. By syncing your league, every pre-draft ranking and projection will be personalized to your league's scoring. That means if you're in a superflex tight end-premium league, rankings and projections will reflect how important it is to grab a TE early. Because of that, when you're doing a mock draft in Draft Champion, you're getting as close to a real draft as possible. All picks made by your opponents are made as if they were actually drafting with you so you're practicing for your real draft, not a generic one.

In-season is where you pull away from the pack. Take Fantasy Life's Start/Sit tool as an example. When you sync your league, the Start/Sit advice will vary based on your projected outcome against your opponent. If you're an underdog either pre-kickoff or at any point after the first games have been played, the suggestion might shift to target a player with a higher ceiling but a slightly lower average projected score. If you're a heavy favorite, the suggestion might shift to recommend a player with a safer floor.

Now apply that to trades. Without syncing, a trade tool just tells you Player X is projected for 145 points the rest of the way and Player Y is projected for 147. With syncing, it factors in your current standings, your projected playoff path and your actual roster holes. It knows you don't need another WR3—you need a TE upgrade to make a playoff push.

Same with waivers. A synced Waiver Wire tool doesn't just tell you who the top pickups are. It gives you suggested FAAB bids based on your team needs while accounting for what your leaguemates need and what they're likely to bid. You're not guessing anymore—you're making moves with context.

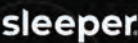

Who's No. 1?

Bijan Robinson vs. Jahmyr Gibbs for 1.01 is the fantasy football debate that will rage throughout this summer

Question: Bijan Robinson or Jahmyr Gibbs in fantasy football?

Answer: Yes.

Seriously, it would be an honor to have either star running back lead my fantasy team, but only one can be drafted first overall. And quite frankly, no one else really enters the discussion. Let's make the argument for both players as the 1.01 in fantasy land.

The Case For Bijan Robinson

Everyone knows how special Robinson is, but the Falcons may have sometimes forgotten just how good. Yes, Robinson totaled nearly 2,300 scrimmage yards on 366 touches, but his 11 total touchdowns were a bit underwhelming. (Thanks a lot, Tyler Allgeier.)

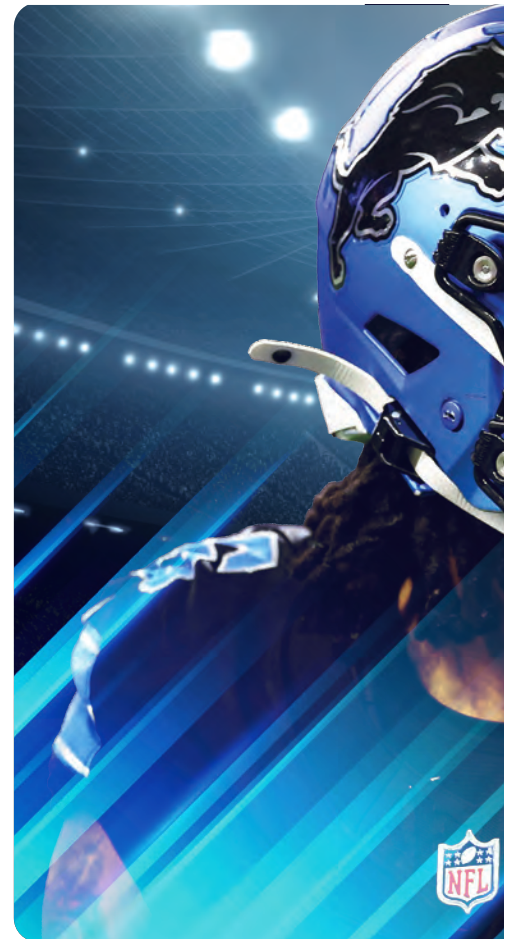
According to the Fantasy Life Utilization Report, Robinson accounted for just 48% of Atlanta's rush attempts from inside the 5-yard line. That put him outside the top-25 running backs and tied with Allgeier, who tied Robinson with five goal-line carries. Robinson also compiled only 32 red-zone carries, which trailed players like Chris Rodriguez, Kyle Monangai and Kareem Hunt. Again, Allgeier was right

behind him with 31 red-zone rushes. Allgeier is a good player, and was effective from in close, converting 4 of 7 carries inside the 5 into touchdowns. But his presence was often a headache for Robinson's fantasy potential.

Free agency served as the cure. Allgeier signed a two-year deal with the Cardinals, paving the way for Robinson to finally dominate the short-yardage work for the Falcons. Whichever running back begins the 2026 regular season as No. 2 on Atlanta's depth chart is highly unlikely to match Allgeier's 9.2 touches per game from a season ago. Atlanta also deployed both Robinson and Allgeier on the field together around 8% of the time.

Although the touchdowns weren't elite, Robinson made up for it with stellar pass-game usage. He ranked second among running backs in target share (20%), while his 23% TPRR was good for fifth at the position. The stellar target share is unlikely to disappear, especially if Tua Tagovailoa is under center for the Falcons. Over the course of his career, Tagovailoa is targeting running backs 23.1% of the time, while sporting one of the highest checkdown rates in the entire NFL. Tua has always had a propensity for getting the ball out as fast as humanly possible, a trait that has

benefited fantasy running backs. Robinson's 79 receptions for 820 yards propelled him to 21.8 PPR PPG last year (2nd), but a spike in touchdowns could lead to the overall RB1 finish in 2026.

The Case For Jahmyr Gibbs

Gibbs finished right behind Robinson last season, averaging a strong 21.6 PPG. After catching 52 passes in each of his first two NFL seasons, Gibbs hauled in 77 balls last year while scoring 18 total touchdowns. He continues to be one of the most dynamic and efficient players in all of football. He ranked eighth in 2023 among NFL running



backs in average yards per touch (5.4), second in '24 (6.4) and fourth last season (5.7).

Like Robinson, Gibbs has also split work with a good, power running back to open his career. After joining the Lions in 2023, David Montgomery averaged a healthy 14.1 touches per game, while accounting for 46% of Detroit's designed rush attempts during that span. Most of the time, the Lions would deploy an every-other-drive approach with their backfield, though once Dan Campbell took over play-calling duties last year the shift toward Gibbs intensified. From Week 10 on, Gibbs accounted for 63% of the rush attempts, 21% of the targets

and handled 19.4 touches per game. Prior to that, Gibbs was averaging 17.8 touches per game, while handling 52% of the rush attempts and a 14% target share. That may have been the precursor to Montgomery's trade to the Texans. Sonic now stands alone.

We have a very fun, totally sustainable split of Gibbs playing games with Montgomery sidelined over the last few seasons. In six career games without Montgomery, Gibbs has averaged absolutely gaudy numbers: 19.7 carries, 5.2 targets, 110.8 rushing yards, 36.5 receiving yards, 24.3 touches, 27.4 PPR PPG. Again, totally sustainable. But in terms of his usage, it might not be too far off. The Lions brought in

Isiah Pacheco on a one-year, \$1.81M deal, which tells me he isn't coming anywhere close to the 14 touches per game Montgomery averaged during his Detroit stint.

There's definitely some change within this Lions offense entering 2026. The offensive line has some new faces, while Drew Petzing will now be calling plays. But one thing should remain—this team will be scoring plenty of points. Since 2023, Detroit has ranked 2nd, 1st and 3rd, respectively in percentage of drives ending in a touchdown. And during that same span, the Lions are averaging 29.6 points per game, giving Gibbs plenty of touchdown potential as the lead running back.

Single-QB Draft Approaches

What to do—and what not to do—when embracing one of three popular strategies

LET THE DRAFT come to you. Be water—hat tip to Bruce Lee. Get your guys. These and more are viable mindsets when going into a draftroom, whether you're getting in the ring with experts or your home league. But after you've studied ADP and done some mocks, certain strategies can be set up even before your draft day. That's where this article comes into play, as we cover three distinct approaches that can all lead to you hoisting your league's championship trophy.

→ Robust RB

If you like running backs more than life itself, well I've got a draft strategy for you! Welcome to the world of Robust RB, a strategy where drafters ideally take three running

backs with their first four picks. This is obviously very different from Zero RB and Late-Round QB because the main goal here is to try and capitalize on the massive upside that early-round running backs offer even though there is history of volatility.

This strategy is directly tied to getting the "elite" backs, especially in the first two rounds of drafts. You must take a running back with your first pick and ideally your second as well.

In the first round you're getting an elite workhorse back—think Jahmyr Gibbs, Bijan Robinson, Jonathan Taylor and Chirstian McCaffrey.

Where the volatility and risk comes in is putting so much stock and early draft capital into one position that has a large bust rate. There are some obvious winners if you draft the

right running back—Robinson, Gibbs and CMC were three of the four highest-scoring fantasy players in 2025.

In the second round you are not getting superstar options, but the upside is obviously there with a featured workload and little competition for touches. Think De'Von Achane, Kenneth Walker and Omarion Hampton.

Essentially, you're making a bet on finding multiple legendary running back performers in a season. You also need to make sure your scoring format favors this draft strategy. If you are in a deep league with three flex positions, it might be better to allocate more early-round wide receiver strategies. Leaving the wide receiver position open for so long is daunting. That's why I think the third round is where you need to jump on a receiver. If a running back with little competition and lots of upside falls to the third, draft him. If not, then now is the time to take a wide receiver with Top-10 upside that has fallen—Chris Olave, Nico Collins and Tetairoa McMillan all come to mind.

Then we are back on the running back train.

This draft strategy will make some other positions on your roster weak—obviously—but where you should sacrifice is at the tight end and quarterback position (cooterdoodle has thoughts for you later). There have been far too many times that late-round quarterbacks have outperformed their ADP, and the tight end position gets so volatile after the first six guys are off the board that it's not a horrible idea to wait for both. You can find streamable players at both positions, but it's hard to find a league-winning running back on waivers.



As always, pay attention to the flow of your draft. If multiple running backs are falling far past where you believe they should be drafted, then shifting to this strategy can work. On the other side, if you're bullish on multiple top backs going into 2026, or if you think the evaluations on the position and incoming rookies are too soft, then Robust RB can be for you.

→ Zero RB

I'm about to do the unthinkable and tout the Zero RB strategy in the year of our Lord, 2026. This is, of course, a dangerous position to take after two straight years of RBs dominating fantasy scoring:

- In 2025, 8 of the top 10 scorers in .5 PPR leagues were RBs

- In 2024, 7 of the top 10 scorers in .5 PPR leagues were RBs

Trust me, I get the resistance ... it's a nearly impossible task to convince anyone that it is viable, much less a sharp idea, to ignore RBs in the first few rounds of your draft.

But here's the thing ... we are also coming off two straight years of the RB position staying shockingly healthy. Zero RB thrives on the chaos of the season and the attrition that naturally occurs at the RB position, so of course the strategy is going to fail when the majority of the lead backs stay healthy.

But what happens when those early RBs do get hurt? Well,

now we can supercharge our teams into juggernauts. Let me explain.

When a top WR gets hurt, no single WR steps up in his absence and fills their exact role. The targets are often distributed evenly across the remaining pass catchers. But when a starting RB gets hurt, a backup RB generally receives the lion's share of the starter's touches.

This dynamic makes backup running backs more valuable than backup wide receivers,

which in turn makes Zero RBs (early WRs + late RBs) a much stronger structural strategy than Robust RB (early RBs + late WRs).

The goal of Zero RB (and no, it doesn't mean literally take zero running backs), is to crush your opponents at every other position with high-end WRs, and ideally, an Elite QB and an Elite TE.

You then take a "spray and pray" approach at the RB position and select a bunch of RBs at the end of your draft—handcuffs, rookies, committee backs with intriguing profiles, etc.

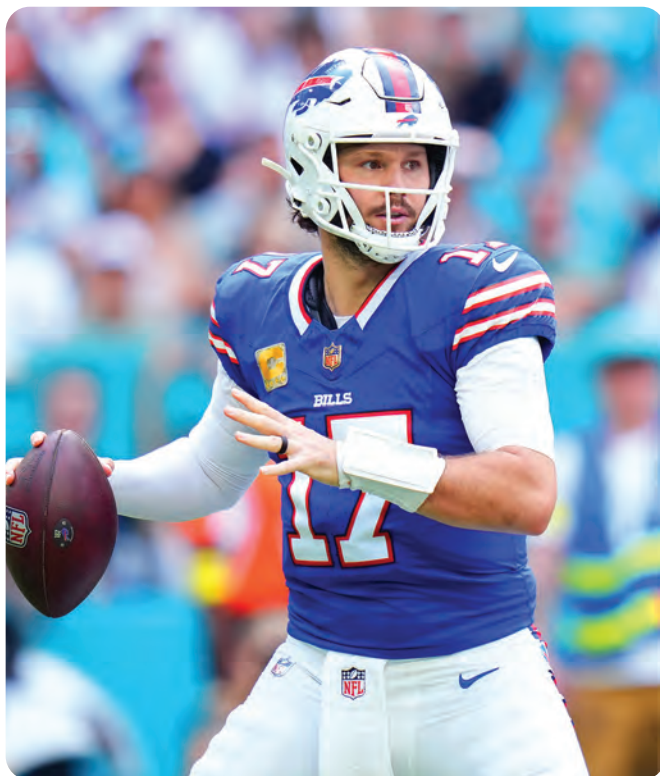
Not all of these fliers will hit, of course, but year after year, we see late-round RBs emerge out of nowhere for a variety of reasons, including injuries, trades, ambiguous backfields, efficient play and outperforming the starter.

Ultimately, the best way to execute Zero RB is to let the draft come to you. If a RB with true bell cow potential is available in the first couple rounds, don't hesitate to grab him. But if the talent at the position quickly runs dry, don't force the issue. Instead, load up on WRs, TEs and QBs in the early rounds and stay patient before pulling the trigger on your first RB.

While it might seem scary to have a weak group of RBs heading into the season, your opponents are at even more of a disadvantage. They are weak at a more important position (WR), and their late-round fliers are far less likely to contribute meaningful points to their roster than yours.

Embrace the opportunity of chaos at the RB position this year and give yourself a chance at a juggernaut team thanks to the Zero RB strategy.

→ Late-Round QB

Some will call a strategy of waiting until rounds 9-15 to draft a QB the "Late-Round QB" strat. I call it the "I didn't get Josh Allen, Now What?" strategy. Why does Allen matter? He has finished as a Top-3 QB in points per game more consistently than any of his "elite" peers.

- **2025: QB1 avg. PPG (22.0)**
- **2024: QB2 avg. PPG (22.6)**
- **2023: QB1 avg. PPG (24.2)**
- **2022: QB3 avg. PPG (24.2)**
- **2021: QB1 avg. PPG (24.6)**
- **2020: QB2 avg. PPG (25.3)**

And once you get past the all-but-guaranteed points from Allen, you have the luxury of waiting at QB, because there will still be viable options available later on. And only one person can walk away with Joshy boy anyway ...

But to successfully pull off the Late-Round strat, you need to be sure to adhere to a few Late-Round Do's and Don'ts.

DON'T:

- **Punt on the QB position in a superflex league.**
- **Force yourself into a Late-Round QB build (especially if the board blesses you with a bargain).**

That's it, really. Easy right? Now, let's get into the Do's.

DO:

- **Keep the faith.**
Leagues can absolutely be won without a top-tier,

early-round QB. Just ask my home league champ who took it all with Trevor Lawrence in 2025. If you're able to build a solid team around your late-round passer, you'll be setting yourself up for success.

- **Aim for top-tier RBs and WRs rounds 1-4.**

If you're going to punt a position like QB, then you really need to have your eye on the prize for the other positions. If you come out of Round 4 with two solid RBs and two solid WRs, you won't feel as pressured to reach for a QB in the next few rounds.

I know one of the elite TEs can be tempting, but you'll feel better about your roster construction if you stick to RB/WR early on. Plus, the dropoff in fantasy value for these positions is much more steep after the first few rounds.

- **Continue to beef up WR, RB and grab a TE rounds 5-8.**

Take a look at your first few picks. Did you end up heavier on WR? Then it's time to pivot toward RB. And you'll still have time to draft a TE in this range.

- **Look for QBs with rushing upside.**

When the time does come to draft your QB, keep an eye out for any gems who have rushing upside. 2025 Daniel Jones, anyone? Which brings me to my next point...

- **Draft two QBs.**

I know, this seems counter intuitive, right? Wasting a perfect late-round flier on a second QB? But if you've beefed up your other positions, you don't need to rely on a dart throw anymore. Instead, your roster would benefit more from a QB insurance policy. You may never need it. Hopefully you never do. But you'll be glad you've got it if you do. And that's what insurance is for, right? Think 2025 JJ McCarthy. You don't want all of your QBs in one basket.

As we've seen over the last few seasons, there are some QBs drafted in the later rounds who have finished top 5 at the position. A late-round ADP isn't a guaranteed death sentence for your QB's future production. Some productive QBs will even be available on waivers throughout the year.

The biggest thing to remember when it comes to a draft strategy: **It is more important to understand the strategy than to force it.**

Try the different strats in mock drafts. Know their pitfalls and their benefits. But remember that every draft board will fall to you differently. Don't force yourself into a situation that may not be the best one for you on that given day.

Superflex Insight

The potential to start two quarterbacks ups the strategy in the format that continues to grow in popularity

INGLOURIOUS *Basterds* isn't my favorite Quentin Tarantino movie—*Pulp Fiction* still has the crown for me—but the tavern scene has lived on in infamy. Michael Fassbender (incorrectly) holding up three

fingers is now the symbol of if you know ball. For instance, I'll make a statement about superflex leagues: Superflex leagues are just regular fantasy squads where you can start two QBs.

A Drake Maye and Trevor Lawrence will be drafted far earlier in '26 than they were in 2025.

Like Major Hellstrom, all you can do is sit there. Yes, the statement carries some truth to it. But the lack of nuance is what gives you pause. Because if you've been in Superflex leagues, the added QB spot changes our strategy for the popular format.

→ Don't Be Afraid to Wait on QB*

**If need be.*

I'm throwing out the caveat early because building a superflex roster, like any other format, hinges on draft position. Sure, there's the extra QB slot to fill. And, absolutely, this means that at a minimum, 24 passers will be on active rosters every week (assuming a 12-team league). Which doesn't even get into the people taking at least one backup, let alone a second. I mention all this because the common knee-jerk reactions are some that I've had in the past:

- I hope I don't get stuck with a late draft slot
- I have to hammer QBs early and often.
- My team is going to be terrible if I don't get at least one elite QB.

Essentially, you're on tilt before you get to the lobby. Plus, the anxiety only ratchets up a notch when you pick (or get assigned) anything in the back half of the draft. The result is a hyperfocus on a singular position. Or, said another way, you're drafting for (a self-imposed) need. However, if you do get stuck with a less-than-desirable spot, there's a way you can pivot. I'll use last year's results as a proxy.

- **Josh Allen:** 374.5 (total points)
- **Drake Maye:** 358.9
- **Matthew Stafford:** 358.3
- **Trevor Lawrence:** 350.1
- **Caleb Williams:** 323.8

While I agree that the results don't reflect how we felt about each signal-caller, the idea that even within the Top 5 there's a gap in scoring should be clear. Even the best projections (i.e, Dwain's or Freedman's) would highlight the same behavior. Of course, you'd see Lamar Jackson, Jalen Hurts or Joe Burrow in the conversation, but there's a tier breaking up even the best passers. As you can see, there's about a 50-point delta between the QB1 and QB5. Just 24 points separate the QB6 (323.8 points) and the QB10 (299.8). Meanwhile, a few non-passers were giving us QB-worthy performances.

- **Puka Nacua:** 375.0 (total points), WR6 (Consensus ADP)
- **Jaxon Smith-Njigba:** 359.9, WR14
- **Amon-Ra St. Brown:** 324.0, WR5
- **Christian McCaffrey:** 416.6, RB4
- **Bijan Robinson:** 370.8, RB1
- **Jahmyr Gibbs:** 366.9, RB3

Jaxon Smith-Njigba is the outlier, but the others were part of real decisions when gamers were on the clock. Puka Nacua or Jalen Hurts? Amon-Ra St. Brown or Patrick Mahomes? And while we treat QBs like brand names, there's viability in getting the generic version at

a cheaper cost. Bo Nix as your QB1 isn't as worrisome if you secure Bijan Robinson, aka "A Non-QB Who Can Score like a QB," with your first pick. But, again, you should only have to resort to this decision-tree thinking if you get boxed out of one of the high-end passers to kick off the draft.

→ Every Action Begets Another

Every Action Begets Another. A few famous movie (and book) quotes come to mind as the draft unfolds.

- **"Out of the frying pan and into the fire."** —**The Hobbit**
- **"I immediately regret this decision."** —**Anchorman**
- **"Now what?"** —**Finding Nemo**

Drafting is like the classic cartoon trope of the main character plugging a leak only to find one after another pop up. For example, let's say you got your early spot like you wanted. And here's your team after a few rounds:

- **Round 1:** Drake Maye
- **Round 2:** Trevor Lawrence
- **Round 3:** Nico Collins

Wow, two top-tier QBs! And a solid WR1. Cool. But at least 15 RBs will go before you get your first one. There's also that pesky TE position you have to worry about, too. Essentially, as one

part of your roster gets stronger, the other (likely) gets weaker. That's the nature of opportunity cost. You're sacrificing strength at the core parts of your team (i.e. RB and WR) to have better QBs. However, there's a way to mitigate the dropoff.

Understanding player archetypes and how they're deployed on the field will boost your chances of limiting your roster weaknesses. Take Collins as your WR1, for instance. He ranked inside the Top 12 in both targets per game (7.8) and aDOT (13.3), but finished outside the Top 24 in seven games.

Just taking the next available receiver shouldn't be the approach. Someone to complement Collins' volatility would raise the floor and ceiling of your budding squad. One of the Jaguars' WRs—I prefer Jakobi Meyers, after quickly developing a connection with Trevor Lawrence—with access to a reliable weekly workload on an efficient offense, would be a suitable pairing. Add in a Jordan Addison or Quentin Johnston later, both with active (read explosive) roles in passing games with good QBs, and the risk of avoiding the position earlier in the draft has diminished with the type of opportunity you've been able to acquire.

Avoid the CHOP!

Remember these strategies in
Guillotine Leagues™ to enjoy the
best sweat in fantasy football

I TELL THIS story often, but it serves as an annual reminder (at least to me) that Guillotine Leagues™ are, as the kids say, *built diff*. Anyway, it was my first year trying the format. I drafted as best I could, but I used a late-round QB approach. Lamar Jackson was on the wire after the first chop, and yours truly dropped 100% of his FAAB on the Ravens' QB1.

I was out by Week 3.

Needless to say, I've learned a bit since that disaster. Discussed strategies with some of the best in the industry. And, to get you prepped for this year's drafts, I have some insights to share before you step into the lobby.

→ Drafting

Whether you're a seasoned vet or a first-timer, these key points always help me reset my mind before I hop into a Guillotine Leagues draft.

- **The common league size is 18 people**
- **Stick to what you know (or what you think you know)**

The first bullet gets me every time. I have a hard enough time waiting 22 picks if I get the 1.01 in a standard league. Or even 12 if I get stuck in the middle. Imagine the shock of having to watch 34 players go off the board in a Guillotine League. I can hear the panic crescendo as your second round comes up.

"OK, I'll get Nico Coll—wait, he just got taken. Oh, James Cook is still ther—no, he isn't. Jaylen Warren? Oh, c'mon!"

Even in regular redraft leagues, having a Plan B, C and D can be critical to building a solid squad. It's no different here. But with fewer options available where we normally expect them to be, getting a sense of the ADP differences will help adjust our targets each round. For instance, let's play out who might be available in subsequent rounds if you had the 1.01.

- **Round 2:** Josh Jacobs (redraft), Breece Hall (Guillotine)
- **Round 4:** Jaylen Waddle, RJ Harvey

Quite the talent drop-off, right? Now, that's

not to say you can't build a winning team from an early position, or any spot for that matter. But, like in any format, how you respond to the ever-changing board is what will put you on a path to a championship. And that brings us to the second bullet. I'll use a couple of example statements to set up the point.

- ***"Ben Johnson didn't like D'Andre Swift in Detroit. Kyle Monangai will be the RB1!"***
- ***"Why draft Amon-Ra now when I can just get Jameson later?"***

We do this every year. To be clear, there's nothing wrong with trying to maximize the value of a pick by "arbitrag-ing" player projections. But remember, we need to win (or not be last) every week. Banking on a situation shifting in our favor isn't an option. If anything, let somebody else play that waiting game.

In redraft, this is like the person in your league who always believes they know the right sleepers to stash on their bench. They might hit one every now and then. But by and large, they're burning roster spots in the process. In Guillotine Leagues, the consequence of

holding onto players with little to no value can be much more severe.

The best way to avoid putting yourself in a similar situation is to treat uncertainty with more skepticism. Rookies are the simplest example. Sure, Ashton Jeanty is a high-end talent. But the Raiders were a bottom-12 run-blocking unit in 2024 and ran it back with the same unit for the rookie's first year. Emeka Egbuka flashed and then fizzled out over the year. Oronde Gadsden had a similar story. Essentially, focusing on more projectable workloads during the draft will allow you to be more flexible during the season.

→ Avoiding the Chop

The other mechanic to Guillotine Leagues is what changes the weekly vibe of the format. It's do or die every Thursday, Sunday and Monday. There is no, "Yeah, my WR got hurt, I've got a couple guys on the bench to cover his absence." That could mean game over. So, when it comes to lineup decisions, I can boil down my approach to another couple of bullets.

- **Floor, floor, and I can't emphasize this enough, floor**
- **Know your roster weaknesses**

In almost every other fantasy format, we're aiming for upside. For redraft, our flex spot is supposed to be the position that adds punch to our roster. The same can apply to one-week contests where ceiling outcomes are what can take down top-heavy tournaments. We just need to get through one set of games at a time for Guillotine. But here's where the draft and our roster decisions—at least in the first month—go hand in hand. Here's a common decision gamers with a mid-draft position had to wade through last year.

- **Tetairoa McMillan: 58.7 (ADP)**
- **Jameson Williams: 60.2**
- **David Montgomery: 60.5**
- **RJ Harvey: 60.8**
- **Isiah Pacheco: 60.8**
- **Zay Flowers: 61.8**

I could make the case for any of them in re-draft. McMillan was walking into a WR1 role as a rookie. Williams signed an extension right as the season began. Pacheco was injured most of '24. There's a nugget with each of them worth continuing to dig in case you strike gold. But now, based on our draft discussion, let's put on our GL lenses and re-examine the list.

- **Two of them were rookies**
- **Two of the WRs come from low-volume passing teams**
- **All three RBs were, at best, the 1B of their backfield**

Their roles within their respective offenses should change how we set expectations for their workloads. Accordingly, their ability to score should also adjust. In truth, I'd have chosen one of McMillan, Montgomery or Flowers, depending on my roster to that point. That would be simply to gain more of a floor of touches until I could either replace them or their level of opportunity progresses, which dovetails into the second bullet. Here's a potential six-round mock using this year's ADP.

- **QB: Drake Maye**
- **RB: Bijan Robinson, Bhayshul Tuten**
- **WR: Ladd McConkey, Zay Flowers, Xavier Worthy**

Regardless of how the rest of the draft shakes out, an obvious weakness will be at TE. But, to quote Marie Kondo, none of my WRs spark joy either. To offset, the usual response would be to swing for the fences. Throw in someone like Luther Burden! But, instead of focusing on ceiling, a Wan'Dale Robinson type (who had 18 targets even before Malik Nabers' injury) would be the optimal way to raise your roster's floor, keeping your roster alive for another week.

→ FAAB

Remember my story from the intro about incinerating all of my FAAB to get Lamar Jackson?

Easy lesson, don't be like me. But on the one hand, my blunder was on the extreme side of things. I knew I had made a mistake when I saw everyone else's totals, and I was the only one with fewer than three digits. However, in redraft, finding a gem like Jackson, or the beneficiary of a catastrophic injury, would force the same response. Unfortunately, you—me, I mean me—need to reframe your approach to spending your money.

- **It's OK to be cheap to start the season**
- **Don't let perfect be the enemy of good**

The power of money is something we don't consider in standard fantasy formats. Partly because the totals between gamers stay about the same throughout the season. Sure, you'll get a big spender here or there. But for every large transaction, there's someone just biding their time. However, with Guillotine Leagues, you gain an edge by holding back on the wire.

- **Week 1: \$1,000 (your balance), \$18,000 (league balance), 5.6% (your share of the pot)**
- **Week 2: \$1,000, \$17,000, 5.9%**
- **Week 3: \$1,000, \$16,000, 6.3%**
- **Week 4: \$1,000, \$15,000, 6.7%**

Remember, every week, a thousand bucks comes out of the pot. So, just by doing nothing, your strength over the waiver wire increases. And that's assuming your leaguemates don't acquire any free agents either. Besides, there's another key aspect to the timing of picking up new players.

Think about the cycle of roster building during the regular season. We make slight adjustments, a trade or two as we learn more about players and their situations, and then start stashing contingent assets for the play-offs. Guillotine is no different. However, the stretch run is where we find the payoff for being stingy with our funds early. Better players—championship-winning players!—will be on the wire as stronger teams fall to the blade. And that's why getting good replacements, not the perfect one, will keep you competing deep into the year. Let's use that six-round mock from earlier as the final example.

- **On Your Roster (after Week 1): Bijan Robinson, Bhayshul Tuten, Rachaad White**
- **On The Wire: James Cook, Javonte Williams, Kenneth Gainwell**

I added Rachaad White, but you get the idea. Outside of Robinson, we've got question marks at RB. You may be able to get by a week or two, but the performance cut line is ever-rising. Again, the common reaction might be to shore up the position with a sure thing.

Picking up an RB like Javonte Williams can allow you to hold on to enough FAAB to make large changes come wintertime.

But, to bring it all home, we're balancing two things: a viable floor of projectable points and enough buying power as the playoffs draw closer.

All three waiver wire options would raise the floor of your starting roster. But consider their relative cost. Cook would require the strongest bid, with the price decreasing to Gainwell. By applying our optimal approach, taking Williams would be the best of both worlds. We'd lift our total for the week and hold on to enough FAAB to make large changes come wintertime.

Age cliffs and veterans to buy or sell, here's some helpful advice

In dynasty leagues, we're not just here for a good time, we're here for a long time. Here are some useful fantasy nuggets to help you climb to the top of your dynasty leagues and stay on top.

→ Age Cliffhangers

Jake:
Mike Evans | WR | 49ers

I'm not so sure it's a good thing when a long-tenured receiver who seemed destined to retire with his original team suddenly heads elsewhere. Evans signing with San Francisco this offseason has a lot of folks excited. But me? I'm getting sad Julio Jones flashbacks.

After a decade spent with the Falcons, Jones went to Tennessee and immediately began fizzling out of fantasy lineups. He was beleaguered with injuries and it became painfully obvious he'd lost "it." I fear we're on a similar trajectory with Evans. In 2025, he posted career-low efficiency numbers and missed more games than in any other season due to a broken collarbone after battling repeated hamstring injuries in years past.

I hope I'm wrong and the 33-year-old thrives in the Bay Area. But I won't hold my breath.

Sam:
Davante Adams | WR | Rams

I'm certainly not one to bet against an All-Pro talent like Davante Adams, but his significant drop in receiving yards last season has resulted in him becoming a bit one-dimensional as a player. His 789 receiving yards were his lowest since 2015 and broke a streak of five consecutive seasons with at least 1,000 yards.

Adams is still a TD-scoring machine—14 in 2025—but his dip in targets and receptions is noteworthy. This offense now funnels through Puka Nacua. Adams could still put up a solid season, but at age 33, the writing on the wall is starting to concern me just a little bit.



> GARRETT WILSON

→ Dynasty Buys

Jake:
Garrett Wilson | WR | Jets

The disrespect this man gets for consistently putting up 1,000-yard seasons with a rotating cast of “who’s that?” at quarterback is astonishing. To this point in his career, Wilson has caught passes from Zach Wilson, Mike White, Trevor Siemian, Tim Boyle, Justin Fields, Tyrod Taylor and a post-Achilles rupture Aaron Rodgers. And he’s never let us down in fantasy. Wilson has been playing wide receiver on All-Madden mode and he should not be punished for that.

Before getting injured in 2025, Wilson was on pace to hit the 1,000-yard mark in receiving yards for a fourth-straight season. Still in his prime, Wilson is widely valued outside the Top-10 receivers, with many dropping him even further. This is the cheapest he’s been as a dynasty asset since his rookie season and I’m not missing the chance to scoop him up.

Sam:
Wan’Dale Robinson | WR | Titans

Still only 25, Wan’Dale Robinson finds himself as the No. 1 option for the Tennessee Titans and second-year QB Cam Ward.

The Titans signed Robinson to a four-year, \$70 million contract, which included \$38 million in guaranteed money. The Titans had the fourth overall pick in this year’s NFL Draft, but did not spend it on a wide receiver (update possible).

Even with the added WR help that came later in the draft, Robinson projects to quietly dominate for the Titans and dynasty managers both this season and moving forward.

→ Dynasty Sells

Jake:
Kyle Pitts | TE | Falcons

Another offseason, another opportunity to save at least one innocent person from getting steamrolled by the Kyle Pitts hype train. Please, let me untie you from the tracks before it’s too late.

Did you realize that in 2025 more than 20% of Pitts’ fantasy production came in one game? A game where Drake London was sidelined? That was a great week and I hope you enjoyed it, but it shouldn’t inflate Pitts’ dynasty value. Because in pretty much every other matchup, he offered worse fantasy outcomes than Dalton Schultz and Hunter Henry.

Sam:
JK Dobbins | RB | Broncos

Whenever a team opens a window for me to sell a player with significant question marks, I’m taking advantage of that every time. This is not a knock on JK Dobbins personally, but a history of injuries and age (27) make me wary of him in dynasty formats.

Denver did dynasty managers a favor by signing him to a two-year, \$16 million contract which includes \$8 million guaranteed. Now is the ideal chance to sell while he still has a lead role on a solid offense with both an excellent head coach (Sean Payton) and an up-and-coming QB (Bo Nix).

The Rookie Super Model

A data-centric approach to grading rookie prospects on inputs that best predict NFL production

OVER THE LAST five years, we have crafted a prospect model—The Rookie Super Model—that is more predictive of future fantasy success than NFL Draft pick. The model uses draft pick, production and film grades from NFL.com to rate prospects on a 50-100 scale, providing a range of outcomes.



Nerd Note: The Rookie Super Model (RSM) normalizes data based on team attempts, age, strength of schedule, QB play and teammate competition for opportunities.

→ Jeremiah Love RB | Cardinals

Arizona used the No. 3 overall pick on Love. While he joins an offense that doesn't project for a high TD total (26th), history says RBs like Love handle an average of 62% of the carries in their rookie season. Tyler Allgeier will see some work, but Love is an explosive playmaker with a high-touch ceiling. Love's 91 RSM Rating ranks fifth all-time, and 100% of his comparisons secured a top-6 finish by Year 3. He profiles as a mid-range RB2 with RB1 upside in 2026.

→ Jordyn Tyson WR | Saints

New Orleans selected Tyson with the No. 8 pick, pairing him with 2025 breakout, Chris Olave. Tyson notched the highest Production Rating of all Round 1 WRs. He notched a 28% career target share (77th percentile) and 2.71 yards per route (67th percentile). With little depth behind Olave, expect Tyson to ascend to starter status immediately. His 89 RSM Rating ranks 15th all-time, and 75% of his comps secured a top-24 season by Year 3. Tyson is a borderline WR2 with upside this year.

^ History suggests that running backs like Arizona's Jeremiah Love handle an average of 62% of the carries in their rookie season.

→ Carnell Tate WR | Titans

Tennessee added a weapon for Cam Ward, grabbing Tate with the fourth pick. While Tate wasn't as productive as Tyson in college, he played alongside multiple future Round 1 NFL Draft picks in Jeremiah Smith, Marvin Harrison Jr. and Emeka Egbuka. The model accounts for that, which helps push Tate to a 96 rating in the RSM. His comps secured a top-24 season by Year 3 75% of the time, with 38% reaching the top 6. Tate should start immediately for the Titans and projects as a low-end WR3 in 2026.



Nerd Note: The model could be slightly overrating Tate because of the overall weakness of the draft class, allowing him to go No. 4. The model views Tate more in line with mid-Round 1 picks historically, but his draft capital pushes him higher in the rating.

At Ohio State, Carnell Tate played alongside multiple future Round 1 NFL Draft picks in Jeremiah Smith, Marvin Harrison Jr. and Emeka Egbuka.

→ Makai Lemon WR | Eagles

The Eagles selected Lemon 20th overall to help replace A.J. Brown's production. His RSM Rating of 83 sits a tier below the top 2 rookie WRs but remains solid—50% of his 28 comps since 2017 became WR2s by Year 3. Lemon aligned in the slot 77% of snaps, raising questions about two-WR set viability, though he flashed as a vertical threat with 23% of targets traveling 20-plus yards downfield—more than Tate or Tyson. For 2026, Lemon projects as a high-end WR4 with upside.

→ Jadarian Price RB | Seahawks

Seattle drafted Price with the final pick of Round 1, with Kenneth Walker departing in free agency and Zach Charbonnet recovering from February

ACL surgery. That means Price is positioned to handle a meaningful workload for a significant chunk of the 2026 season. The RSM views Price as a reach due to minimal receiving production, a huge factor for high-end fantasy success. Still, 49% of Price's comps secured a top-36 campaign by Year 3, and 31% reached top-24 status. He profiles as a mid-range RB3 in 2026 but offers RB2 upside until Charbonnet returns.

→ KC Concepcion WR | Browns

Concepcion was drafted by Cleveland 24th overall and will immediately challenge for the top WR role. He is a versatile

playmaker who can provide easy looks underneath or in the run game and can challenge the field vertically. His RSM Rating of 82 ranks fourth in the class and 32nd all-time. Concepcion's historical comps secured a top-24 season 45% of the time by Year 3. The rookie's biggest challenges in 2026 are a shaky QB situation and a target hog in Harold Fannin, both of which add risk to his outlook. Concepcion projects as a low-end WR4.

→ **Kenyon Sadiq** **TE | Jets**

Despite drafting Mason Taylor in Round 2 last season, the Jets went back to the TE well with Sadiq at No. 16—a bet on traits over production. His 17% best-season target share ranks 45th percentile, but QBs posted a 137.9 passer rating (89th percentile)

when targeting him. His RSM Rating of 85 ranks fifth in model history, and his comps secured a top-12 finish 83% of the time by Year 3. For 2026, Sadiq projects as a high-end TE2 with TE1 upside, though a questionable offense with multiple mouths to feed limits his floor.

→ **Omar Cooper** **WR | Jets**

The Jets selected Cooper with the 30th pick overall, completing their overhaul of the receiving corps led by Garrett Wilson. Cooper didn't get going until later in his career, which slightly dampens his rating. He garnered an 80 in the RSM, a range where his comps collected a top-36 finish 47% of the time by Year 3. In a crowded Jets offense that could pull the plug on Geno Smith to get a look at rookie

Cade Klubnik, there is some risk with Cooper. He projects as a WR5.

→ **Fernando Mendoza** **QB | Raiders**

Mendoza was a prolific passer over his final two college seasons, averaging 273 yards per game in 2024 at Cal before transferring to Indiana, where he tossed 41 TDs at 9.3 yards per attempt en route to a national championship. His 68.1% completion rate ran +7.1 over expected against a 9.0 aDOT, showcasing pinpoint accuracy. He's not a designed runner but will scramble when needed. Ranked No. 9 in rookie rankings and No. 2 in superflex dynasty rankings, Mendoza's ceiling hinges on Las Vegas adding weapons beyond Brock Bowers. For 2026, he projects as a low-end QB2 who may not start immediately.

^
Germie Bernard is a versatile player who can align all over the formation and add value after the catch.

→ **Chris Bell**
WR | Dolphins

Bell, recovering from a torn ACL, slipped to Miami in Round 3 at pick 94, hurting his RSM Rating (70) alongside a slow collegiate start. However, he lands on the NFL's most barren WR depth chart, giving him a legitimate shot at the No. 1 role as a rookie. A size-speed freak with elite run-after-catch ability, Bell's comps produced top-36 performers only 17% of the time—but the model doesn't account for his injury-related draft slide. For 2026, he projects as a low-end WR5 with upside.

→ **Denzel Boston**
WR | Browns

Cleveland double-dipped at WR, securing Boston in Round 2 with the 39th pick overall. He will battle Fannin, Concepcion and Jerry Jeudy for opportunities on a team with considerable QB concerns. Boston is a big-bodied contested-catch artist who didn't get going until late

in his career at Washington. His 75 RSM Rating ranks 75th all-time and seventh in the class. His comps tallied a top-36 finish 30% of the time. Boston projects as a WR6 this year.

Nerd Note: Since 2018, nine WRs ranked 22-plus spots lower in the model than their draft position—only Rashee Rice became a fantasy producer. Boston's model-to-draft delta checks in at -24, making him one of those historically underperforming profiles. That's a legitimate red flag worth monitoring.

→ **De'Zhaun Stribling**
WR | 49ers

San Francisco selected Stribling with pick 33 despite being a consensus Day 3 pick on big boards. He wasn't a high-volume target earner at Ole Miss, but his +1.0 YAC over expected aligns with his 4.36 speed in a 6-foot-2, 207-pound frame. His RSM Rating of 76 shows 43% of comps becoming WR3s by Year 3, though the model flags him as overrated—

similar to Boston. The outlier comparison is Rashee Rice, a YAC monster who thrived anyway. If any coach can scheme for this archetype, it's Kyle Shanahan. For 2026, Stribling projects as a WR7 stash option.

→ **Germie Bernard**
WR | Steelers

Pittsburgh has a strong trio of WRs after adding Bernard with the 56th pick overall to join DK Metcalf and Michael Pittman Jr. Bernard is a versatile player who can align all over the formation and add value after the catch. His career YAC was +1.3 yards over expected. Bernard has a clear runway to the WR3 role and a 74 RSM Rating. Historically, 31% of his comps became WR3s by Year 3, so think of him as a WR4 with upside long term. Bernard projects as a WR7 stash play in deeper leagues in 2026.

→ **Antonio Williams**
WR | Commanders

Williams was the 71st player selected overall and has a path to early playing time on a depth chart with unknowns after Terry McLaurin. At Clemson, Williams primarily played from the slot, aligning wide only 21% of the time, and attacked the underneath zones. A whopping 64% of his targets came behind the line of scrimmage or 0-9 yards downfield. He notched a 72 RSM Rating, which has typically resulted in WR4s or WR5s. However, Williams has the opportunity to make immediate noise. He is a WR7 stash option in 2026.

Bold Predictions

A couple WRs bounce back and a rising star at quarterback falls out of the top 12

NOTHING like looking into the crystal ball and making some calls that people will almost certainly remember in January when they've come true. And will forget if they don't. That'll be especially true of friends and family who buy this magazine. It's time to get bold, and we're looking ahead to the coming season with some takes that may be spicy, but would we all be so surprised if they happen?

1. The Saints Are a Playoff Team

You know, now that I think about this take, it's not really that bold.

If I were solely a vibes guy, calling the Saints a playoff team for 2026 would be a no-brainer. Tampa's 2025 ended with a four-game losing streak before barely beating the Panthers, and then the Bucs lost their franchise leader in receiving yards. The Falcons have an injured QB1 and a reclamation project at QB2. And Carolina? Well, let's say having a regular-season record below .500 doesn't instill much confidence in their ability to repeat their Wild Card appearance. Meanwhile, NOLA was on the upswing to close out the year.

- Passing Yards per Game: 235.2, 7th
- EPA per Play: 0.02, 12th
- Passing Success Rate: 45.8%, 11th

Tyler Shough posted top-10 marks as a dropback passer after taking the starting job in Week 9. And he did this after losing Rashid Shaheed via trade, Devaughn Vele to an injury, and relying on castoffs or developmental players as options. Luckily, Chris Olave and Juwan Johnson were (mostly) there to keep the offense moving. Maybe that's why Shough was trying to pelt Mardi Gras bystanders with footballs. He was recruiting! Regardless, an offseason to learn more of HC Kellen Moore's offense and more additions in the draft should put the Saints on everyone's list for playing football in the Wild Card round.

2. Ladd McConkey Is Back in the Top 12

Yes, I'm going to be obstinate and insist that Ladd McConkey will be (and has been) a top-12 WR. But after rostering him (in too many leagues) last season, I get the hesitancy.

- **Target Share: 26% (2024), 21% (2025)**
- **Catchable Target Rate: 79%, 71%**
- **Play-Action Target Rate: 36%, 24%**

Everything took a step back for the sophomore in '25. From McConkey's workload to the quality of passes thrown his way, buying into the guy who ended his rookie campaign with 197 yards and a score felt like the biggest rug pull of the year. But we should be able to project an improvement in both aspects of McConkey's second-year demise.

Keenan Allen's departure (and the team's unhurried posture to re-sign him) puts McConkey back in the WR2 discussion right away. The Chargers' all-time receptions leader was Justin Herbert's go-to guy. It's why McConkey's target share in obvious passing situations dropped to second on the team, along with his opportunities in the red zone. A season with McConkey back in the top spot would at least give us more games with the ball going his way. And the condition of those looks should go up after their offseason additions.

Justin Herbert was pressured on 42.8% of his dropbacks last season. Accordingly, L.A. added two linemen and a blocking TE in free agency. The team should also get a boost from the return to health of tackles Rashawn Slater and Joe Alt. Plus, with

new OC Mike McDaniels stressing his desire for "easy completions," a receiver with McConkey's route-running skills will vault into the Top 12 by season's end.

3. Garrett Wilson Has Career Year and Lands in the Top 8

I don't like to speak in hyperbole so I'll just say that Garrett Wilson is the most underappreciated receiver in fantasy football history. Wilson kicked off his career with three straight 1,000-yard seasons despite catching passes from a Who's Who of "why them?" including Zach Wilson, Mike White, Trevor Siemian, Tim Boyle and late-stage Aaron Rodgers coming off an Achilles tear. This man should be awarded a medal from the state of New Jersey.

Last year, in the five healthy games paired with Justin Fields, he was the WR6 in fantasy points per game. Would I like to see Wilson get paired up with a bona fide stud quarterback? Obviously, but Lamar Jackson's not walking through that door. One could argue that Geno Smith is exactly what the fifth-year wide receiver needs right now: a consistent, veteran QB who'd rather sling the ball than scramble.

Smith also said the magic words about Wilson when he returned to the Jets earlier this offseason: "It's my job to get him the ball and get him the ball early." That should be music to every fantasy manager's ears.

4. Caleb Williams Falls Back Outside the Top 12

We all remember Williams' opening-drive magic and fourth-quarter theatrics, but what about the stuff that happened in between? Among quarterbacks who threw the ball at least 200 times in 2025, Williams was second from the bottom in completion percentage, above only Shedeur Sanders. His percentage of On Target throws was also second worst, better than just JJ McCarthy. Even diehard Arlington Heights Bears fans have to admit those are scary stats! And although Williams has some rushing upside, it's not to the level that we can disregard his passing numbers.

I'm also expecting a fair amount of bouncebacks from quarterbacks who disappointed last season. Can Williams outpace a healthy Joe Burrow, Lamar Jackson or Brock Purdy? Or Justin Herbert with a healthy offensive line? For Williams to finish as a QB1 in fantasy next season, he'll likely need to achieve Josh Allen-esque growth in his third year. I'm not counting on it.

Jaxson Dart

Fantasy managers got a taste last season of just how good Jaxson Dart could be in fantasy football, but in 2026 we're going to see his full potential. In 2025, Dart was able to start only 12 games due to injuries and some questionable coaching decisions, but he managed to finish his rookie season throwing for 2,272 yards, 15 touchdowns and just 5 interceptions. And what makes Dart a fantasy asset are his legs—he also rushed for 487 yards and 9 touchdowns.

Once Dart was named the starting quarterback in Week 4, the fantasy upside was palpable. His 13% designed rush share was second among all signal-callers, and during that span Dart averaged 20.5 points per game (8th). Throughout the whole season, Dart averaged the third-most fantasy points per dropback (0.66).

So can we get this for a full season? The Giants tabbed John Harbaugh to be their new head coach and he has gotten to work over the offseason ensuring he's building the team around the quarterback and creating a "high-powered offense."

Dart completed a league-low 34% of his passes under pressure this past season, and Harbaugh's

experience building around a quarterback with dual-threat ability will certainly help elevate his game. The second-year quarterback also must focus on protecting himself in 2026. Last season, Dart entered the NFL's concussion protocol four times in four months and while everyone loves to see gritty players, the Giants and Harbaugh must focus on the fine line between Dart's fearless mindset and putting himself in harm's way.

Harbaugh is leaning on his new offensive coordinator Matt Nagy, who spent the past three seasons as the Kansas City Chiefs' OC. Was this a home run hire? Not in the slightest. There were shortcomings during his time in Chicago—the Bears ranked ninth in scoring in Nagy's first season as head coach in 2018 before the offensive production plummeted with

Chicago ranking 29th, 22nd and 27th, respectively, in scoring in his final three seasons.

The better news is that the Giants added weapons for Dart to utilize this season. Isaiah Likely was brought over from the Ravens and could be the potential No. 2 target in 2026 with his downfield abilities. According to ESPN, the Ravens last season (under Harbaugh) used 12 personnel the third most in the NFL at 35.9%.

We also can't forget that the Giants have superstar Malik Nabers, who has only had three passes thrown his way from Dart. Nabers is recovering from a torn ACL, so there is potential he is unable to start Week 1, but he still holds elite upside and the chemistry between him and Dart could be unstoppable.

Overall, Dart has flashed too many times for me to not believe something bigger is coming. His rushing ability provides a safer fantasy floor, but we can't ignore the upgrades the Giants have provided going into his second season.

Quarterbacks

The quarterback position has seen an evolution over time in fantasy football. Back in the stone ages before the internet, fantasy managers would draft them almost on a par with running backs. Then we saw the dawn of the late-round and streaming strategies, where people loaded up early at other positions and attacked QBs late. Then came unicorns like Lamar Jackson, Josh Allen, Jalen Hurts, and now phenoms Drake Maye, Jayden Daniels and Caleb Williams, those dual-threat studs who pile up points with their legs (and a few tush pushes). Rushing quarterbacks have definitely become game-changers, especially during the fantasy playoffs when they could win games all by themselves. Here are breakdowns on the top 35 QBs for fantasy football heading into the 2026 season.

1 Josh Allen Buffalo Bills

Allen has been a top-2 fantasy QB in every season since 2020, and last year he was the No. 1 QB with 23.2 points per game. Even without longtime No. 1 WR Stefon Diggs, Allen has improved as a passer over the past two seasons (8.2 AY/A vs. 7.2 in first six years), and under OC Joe Brady, he has had 12+ TDs rushing in each of the past three campaigns. With Brady now elevated to HC, Allen's usage and productivity should remain intact.

2 Lamar Jackson Baltimore Ravens

Jackson seemed ready for a change after an injury-hampered 2025, and that's what he got with the departures of former HC John Harbaugh and OC Todd Monken. But not all changes are good: Harbaugh championed Jackson early in his career, and Monken helped him become the NFL's most efficient passer over the past three years (9.4 AY/A). Coming off a career-low 26.8 rushing yards per game last season and paired with new and inexperienced OC Declan Doyle, the 29-year-old two-time MVP enters an uncertain era.

Now Hurts enters 2026 with his seventh playcaller in seven years, and OC Sean Mannion has no play-calling experience and just two years as a coach. Eagles fly, but like all creatures, they also die.

But after Daboll's dismissal and Dart's midseason concussion, the team curtailed his called rush attempts (7%). New OC Matt Nagy (as Bears HC) helped second-year QB Mitch Trubisky progress significantly in 2018. Maybe he can do the same for Dart now, but it's worrisome that his 2023-25 Chiefs offenses never ranked higher than No. 15 in scoring.

Shough fell in the NFL Draft because of his advanced age, but last year he looked like a typical 26-year-old veteran, not a second-round rookie, especially after the Week 11 bye, when he produced as both a passer (256.9 yards per game) and runner (25.0 yards). Because of his age, Shough might be closer to his ceiling than the typical second-year player, but he still could take a step forward in 2026 with a full offseason to prepare as the starter.

Now the Dolphins starter, Willis has an uncertain future, but his upside makes him a worthy late-round bet.

Quarterback Sleepers

Draft one of these quarterbacks as your backup and see them start for your team before long

Sure, drafting Josh Allen is great and all. He's almost a lock to finish top 2 among QBs, but what about the RBs, WRs and TEs you're passing up in that range? If you want to take a pass, the quarterback position is deep. There are plenty options to take later in drafts, even sleepers like these three who could be starters on your squad before long.

→ Jordan Love Green Bay Packers

Jordan Love is going to be the quarterback I wait for in drafts in 2026. It doesn't look like we're going to get a Jayden Daniels or Drake Maye type later-round quarterback that we're pounding the table for, but Love might be the closest guy for me.

In 15 regular-season starts in 2025, Love completed 66.3% of his passes for 3,381 yards, 23 touchdown passes and 6 interceptions. He finished as the QB16 in overall fantasy points last season, averaging 16.5 fantasy points per game.

The idea of Love being my sleeper quarterback hinges upon the team getting a little more away from the ground game and focusing on Love's arm and the receivers around him. He attempted only 439 passes in 2025, the seventh fewest in the NFL.

Romeo Doubs (who led all of the Packers' wide receivers in total snaps

in 2025) is out of the picture, and a lot will be asked of Tucker Kraft, Christian Watson and Matthew Golden this season.

The Packers are still going to run the ball and rotate their receivers, but Love could be the quarterback who drastically outperforms his ADP in 2026 if they give him more of a runway.

Minnesota Vikings

Kyle Murray got benched for Jacoby Brissett in 2025. That happened. We can't erase it. But Murray is a dual-threat—the cheat code for fantasy QBs. He doesn't get the short-yardage TDs like Josh Allen and Jalen Hurts, but his run game involvement pays dividends. From 2019 to 2024, he never finished worse than QB11 in fantasy points per game—including three seasons averaging fewer than 227 passing yards.

Now he lands with the Vikings, in Kevin O'Connell's offense alongside Justin Jefferson. The only QB to fail in Minnesota since O'Connell arrived is Murray's competition: J.J. McCarthy.

Murray has limitations as a passer, but so did Mullens and Wentz, who averaged 261 and 243 yards, respectively. And on a \$1.3M prove-it deal, the 28-year-old former No. 1 overall pick should be highly motivated. Darnold turned one year in Minnesota into a three-year, \$100M contract with Seattle.

Over the last three seasons, Murray has averaged 4.7 fantasy points on rushing alone. Modest passing improvement locks him into the top 12. A Darnold-type year makes him a top-6 QB. He's going off the board as QB17. Sign. Me. Up.

Miami Dolphins

Pick a passing efficiency stat and there's a good chance that Willis leads the league in it over the past two seasons. EPA per dropback, completion percentage over expected, yards per attempt, passer rating, explosive pass play rate—first! Hell, yeah!

The sample size is small, and Willis is going from a well-schemed Packers offense with a solid crop of playmakers to ... one of the worst on-paper situations in the NFL (aside from DeVon Achane). Seriously: This WR room is ROUGH ... but does that really matter in fantasy football land? The simple argument for Willis emerging as THE late-round QB of 2026: The man is *fast* and lethal as a rusher.

Since 2014, there have been 34 QBs with 100+ rush attempts in a season, and 31 of them (91%) finished as a top-12 fantasy QB in fantasy points per game! 31 of 34! And I'm talking per-game numbers here!

Ultimately, we're looking at a 26-year-old dual-threat talent who has at least flashed the ability to operate the toughest position in sports at a very high level. We've seen guys like Justin Fields, Tim Tebow, and even Taysom Hill operate as anyone's idea of a bad real-life QB ... while still racking up all sorts of fantasy goodness. Don't be surprised if Willis manages to dodge, duck, dip, dive and dodge his way to a top-12 finish in 2026.

QB Breakout, Do Not Draft, Dynasty Darling

Last season Matthew Stafford, Trevor Lawrence and Caleb Williams all were either waiver wire pickups or selected in the double-digit rounds, then ended up among the top 5 at the position. This happens on a yearly basis at the QB position. Could either of these three signal-callers follow suit?

→ Breakout: Cam Ward Tennessee Titans

Let's get the bad news out of the way first. Ward was sacked an NFL-high 55 times last year behind one of the league's worst offensive lines on one of the league's worst offenses.

Otherwise, how was the play, Mrs. Lincoln?

Yes, his final stat line (3,169 yards, 15 touchdowns, 7 interceptions) does not look like it points to a 2026 breakout, but there is plenty of room for optimism.

Over his final eight games of the season, Ward found his footing and completed 62% of his passes for a 10:1 touchdown-to-interception ratio. He closed the year with a QB14 and QB13 finish before injuring his shoulder in Week 18.

This offseason, the Titans made a concentrated effort to get him more weapons. They handed Wan'Dale Robinson a four-year, \$70 million deal to give Ward a reliable underneath option.

Carnell Tate was taken No. 4 overall to supercharge the offense. Second-year WR Elic Ayomanor is 21. Explosive returner Chimere Dike is 22. Breakout TE Gunnar Helm is 23.

The best part is you can stack the entire Titans passing game in the late rounds of your drafts. Tate is the only one going before pick 100 in drafts.

If Ward takes that leap, every single one of these players is grossly mispriced. Don't just select Ward, make a concentrated bet on the entire offense and get multiple things right for the price of one.

→ Do Not Draft: Jordan Love Green Bay Packers

Here's how I'll couch my stance on avoiding Jordan Love, aka "The Last QB I Know I Can Draft Before Talent Falls Off A Cliff." First, on a positive beat, he's performed like a top-10 passer in every season since becoming the starter. Love's had high marks in EPA per dropback and passing success rate, even as his supporting cast has evolved. However, the shifts this offseason carry the most concern.

Green Bay's offensive line took a step back, putting Love under duress on a career-high 39.5% of his dropbacks, and they're returning four of the five starters. And the Packers' pass-catching corps? Well, let's go with hope as a plan. Romeo Doubs, the WR responsible for 20% of Love's passing yards and a quarter of his explosive plays and TDs, is in New England.

Doubs' replacement? Well, that's a good question. Matthew

Golden functioned only as an outside receiver in five of 12 games. His target share crested 10.0% in two of them. Christian Watson is a vertical threat as a flanker. And Jayden Reed, even if he did play on the perimeter, has still struggled to play a larger role in the offense. All of this before we get into how Tucker Kraft, the TE1 through Week 8, may or may not be coming off his ACL injury.

Again, I have no doubt HC Matt LaFleur and Love will cook up some way to make their way through the NFC North. And I see that my friend Kendall Valenzuela has Love as her QB sleeper, which I can see because he does have a 32-TD season already in his career. But after back-to-back seasons outside the top 12 QBs, I'll root for Love in real life, while letting someone else handle him in fantasy.

→ Dynasty Darling: Tyler Shough New Orleans Saints

Age is a factor to consider in dynasty formats, but it doesn't matter as much when it comes to QBs. That's what makes Tyler Shough such an enticing dynasty darling heading into the 2026 season.

Over his final eight games last season, he averaged nearly 23 points per game. His underlying metrics are strong as well. Shough averaged 2.0 designed rush attempts, 1.9 scrambles and nearly 20 rushing yards per game. Those are more than serviceable numbers for a first-year QB whose only legit weapon was WR Chris Olave.

New Orleans offers a fantasy-friendly environment that

Shough should thrive in. In 2025, led by first-year HC and rising offensive mind Kellen Moore, the Saints ran no-huddle 22.7% of the time, trailing only the Washington Commanders. They also averaged a league-leading 2.2 plays per minute.

The Saints also project to be much better on offense next season. They added Travis Etienne to bolster their backfield and then drafted Jordyn Tyson and Bryce Lance to team up with Olave. The stars are aligning for Shough to have a highly productive season which, at his current price point, makes him the ideal dynasty darling at QB.

The fantasy football world always seems to come up with new, fun, interesting ways of presenting data in our never-ending quest to better predict the future of a sport that uses a ball that isn't even round. And yet, fantasy analysis on running backs in particular still seems to more or less come down to the following four factors:

- Talent:** Is the RB, you know, good at football?
- Offensive environment:** Is the QB good? Is the offensive line good? Are there ample fantasy-friendly red-zone opportunities?
- Workload:** Is the team willing to feed this running back north of 300 opportunities throughout the course of a 17-game season?
- Age/injury:** Are there any red flags in terms of age or a concerning injury that the RB is returning from?

And guess what: Cincinnati Bengals running back Chase Brown checks each of these boxes with enough flying colors to believe that he is firmly capable of (again) working as a league-winning asset in fantasy football land.

→ Talent

Brown's standing as a former fifth-round pick doesn't exactly make him a "generational" prospect, but we're also looking at a guy who has managed to average 4.3 yards per carry in three career seasons behind a Cincy offensive line that has ranked as PFF's 26th, 30th and 28th-ranked unit, respectively, since 2023. Throw in 137 career catches and blistering straight-line speed—Brown's top-career ballcarrier time of 22.05 miles per hour makes him the NFL's third-fastest RB since 2023 per Next-Gen Stats—and at a minimum, we have a certifiably good professional running back here.

→ Offensive environment

Yes, the Bengals' aforementioned lackluster offensive line shouldn't be considered a strength by any stretch of the imagination. Also yes, the presence of near-consensus top-5 QB Joe Burrow has still helped this offense rank seventh, seventh, and sixth in points per game during the three seasons that he's been healthy enough to start more than 10 games. You don't need all 10 of your fingers to count the number of offensive environments we'd rather have a workhorse running back operate from.

→ Workload

Brown has racked up 283 and 301 touches during the last two seasons. While the Bengals have been willing to shed some carries to guys like Zack Moss and Samaje Perine, Brown has consistently been THE running back, posting ELITE snap rates of at least 80% on 11 separate occasions since 2024. The associated high-end pass-game role (fourth most targets among RBs last season) helped Brown post the position's sixth-best overall Utilization Score in 2025.

→ Age/injury

As the great Cal Naughton Jr. once said: The best ability is availability. Credit to Brown for playing in 33 of a possible 34 games during the last two seasons, as the 5-foot-10, 210-pounder hasn't dealt with anything too serious since a rookie-year hamstring injury landed him on injured reserve. Throw in the fact that Brown just turned 26 in March—firmly in the 22-27 prime range that has featured 84% of the position's top-performing fantasy options over the last decade.

Running Backs

The running back position experienced a renaissance two seasons ago, as Saquon Barkley, Bijan Robinson, and Derrick Henry, among others, had us partying like it was the early 2000s. Barkley became just the ninth player in NFL history to reach the hallowed 2,000-yard mark, and he might have threatened Eric Dickerson's NFL record of 2,105 if he had played in Week 18. Six players surpassed the workhorse mark of 300 carries, and 16 surpassed 1,000 rushing yards, as Barkley, Henry and Josh Jacobs showed in 2024 that RBs on their second contracts can still dominate both on the field and in our game.

So what did running backs do for an encore last season? Despite the fact that only four surpassed 300 carries—Jonathan Taylor, Christian McCaffrey, James Cook and Henry—a total of 17 surpassed 1,000 rushing yards. Do we trust the position again and pick almost solely RBs in the first round like it's the 1990s? What we do know: Zero RB drafters are going to pass up some players who could really boost other people's fantasy teams if things break right (looking at you, injury gods).

1 Jahmyr Gibbs Detroit Lions

Gibbs has put up 3,768 yards and 38 TDs on 493 carries and 157 targets over the past two seasons. That could be the entire blurb, but there's more: His Utilization Score jumped up from 81 to 91 in 2025, and he could have a bigger workload in 2026 given that he's nearing his age peak (24 years old) and the Lions traded away former No. 2 RB David Montgomery. Locked in for 225+ carries and 75+ targets, Gibbs is good to go.

Robinson was the consensus No. 1 RB last year in fantasy drafts, and he delivered: He finished with an NFL-high 2,298 scrimmage yards, and he was the only RB to post top-5 production in each of Weeks 15-17 ("fantasy playoffs"). Still just 24 years old, he has an uncertain QB situation (Michael Penix tore his ACL in November), but Robinson's three-down skill set (287 carries, 103 targets last year) should neutralize any circumstantial negativity. In all formats, Robinson is a candidate to be the No. 1 RB.

3 Christian McCaffrey San Francisco 49ers

McCaffrey will be 30 years old when the season kicks off in September, and he's coming off the least efficient performance of his career (4.8 yards per opportunity) since his rookie campaign. That said, he was No. 1 in 2025 with an elite 98 Utilization Score, he put up 2,126 yards and 17 TDs from scrimmage, and the 49ers offense seems likely to flow through him once again in 2026. McCaffrey won't dominate forever, but the beginning of his end is not necessarily nigh.

And then after he put up 805 yards and 9 TDs in the final nine games, the Patriots discouragingly minimized his role in the postseason (109 yards, four games). Henderson's downside is as low as his upside is high.

Running Back Sleepers

Draft these running backs late onto your roster

We all know what happens at the RB position. For every Bijan Robinson and Jahmyr Gibbs who dominate from start to finish on the season, there are plenty others who lose their primary roles because of either injury or ineffectiveness. That's why it's beneficial to draft players who have a pathway to playing time late in drafts. Or maybe they're already in a valuable timeshare. Either way, don't sleep on these RBs.

→ Blake Corum Los Angeles Rams

I know it might seem like Kyren Williams is immortal at this point, that he will outlive us all ... but he is, indeed, human. In fact, he's a 5-foot-9, 195-pound back who has now logged three straight seasons of 250-plus touches. And last year we finally saw hints that a changing of the guard is under way.

After essentially redshirting his rookie season, Blake Corum pushed Kyren into a timeshare down the stretch of the 2025 season. From Week 14 on, Corum wrestled away 37% of the rushing attempts, as well as 40% of the attempts inside the 15-yard line.

Most importantly, though, Corum has been more efficient with his touches, averaging 5.1 yards per carry on 145 attempts vs. Kyren's 4.83 YPC on 259 carries.

Considering there is a 70-pick gap between the two Rams RBs in most fantasy formats right now, there are two

ways you can win by selecting Corum in your draft: 1) Corum flips Kyren as the 1A back for a Rams offense that will once again be tops in the league in scoring; 2) Kyren gets hurt and Corum becomes an automatic top-10 start every week

Even in worst-case scenarios—the backfield split remains the same in 2026—there's still enough standalone value for Corum to justify the selection in the back half of drafts.

That means at current prices Blake Corum has almost zero downside risk and plenty of upside to smash his ADP.

Corum isn't the backup because he's worse ... he's the backup because he got there second. And this is the year that chronology no longer matters.

→ Jonathon Brooks Carolina Panthers

Jonathon Brooks is not only a player who will leave you second-guessing how to spell *Jonathon* for the rest of your life—he's also an RB who could leave you second-guessing why you passed on him late in 2026 fantasy drafts.

The 2024 second-round pick missed most of his rookie year due to a late-season ACL tear in college. Once he returned, he tore the same ACL, missing the remainder of 2024 and all of 2025. Damn those injury gods. That means we're depending on modern medicine to unlock an electric playmaker with passing-game upside, which makes him a sleeper.

If Brooks were in this year's draft class, he'd rank as my RB2 behind Jeremiyah Love. The former four-star recruit bided his time behind Bijan Robinson before breaking out with 1,139 rushing yards, 10 TDs and 6.1 yards per carry

in his third season at Texas. He added 25 receptions for 286 yards and a score.

Brooks was hard to bring down. His career 34% missed-tackles-forced rate sits in the 83rd percentile since 2017, and his 4.1 yards after contact lands in the 60th percentile. He was a capable pass blocker who rarely fumbled—a back with multiple paths to playing time and the electricity to carve out a larger role.

Chuba Hubbard figures to open the season as Carolina's No. 1 back, but Brooks could challenge as the year progresses. Just last season, Rico Dowdle took over this backfield. This coaching staff rides the hot hand, and Brooks offers oven-mitts-hot upside.

→ Nicholas Singleton Tennessee Titans

Nicholas Singleton is currently ensconced in the deepest of slumbers. He has little chance to be a true difference maker in '26: But if circumstances break his way, he could capitalize on his opportunity and become a league winner.

The No. 1 RB in the 2022 recruitment class, Singleton received offers from almost every major college program. At Penn State, HC James Franklin preferred a rotation at RB, so Singleton (playing alongside classmate Kaytron Allen) never had a dominant campaign with the Nittany Lions, but he was consistently productive (4,448 yards, 54 TDs in 53 games), and as a junior he had a borderline great season

(1,474 yards, 17 TDs in 15 games).

So what makes me enthusiastic about him in the NFL if he never owned his college backfield? First, Singleton has legit speed. He didn't work out before the draft because of a foot injury suffered in Senior Bowl practices, but we know he's an athlete: Basically every five-star recruit is, and in college he hit a top-end speed of 23.6 mph via GPS tracking. Dude can scoot.

On top of that, Singleton is going into a Titans RB room where at first he will back up Tony Pollard and Tyjae Spears, both of whom have battled injuries in their careers. Stash Singleton with a late pick on your bench.

RB Breakout, Do Not Draft, Dynasty Darling

While Bijan Robinson and Jahmyr Gibbs have their names bandied about in discussions about who could be the 1.01 in fantasy drafts, there are more RBs to keep an eye on as possible targets in the RB2 and flex discussions. And even one whose situation may be just a big avoid.

→ Breakout: Bhayshul Tuten Jacksonville Jaguars

Bhayshul Tuten played a complementary role behind Travis Etienne in 2025, but his outlook is much brighter heading into Year 2 with Chris Rodriguez as his primary competition for touches.

Rodriguez has history with head coach Liam Coen—he was his No. 1 RB at Kentucky in 2021, totaling 1,379 yards and 9 TDs. So he'll have a role. But his archetype is extremely narrow: a downhill early-down thumper with no passing-game chops. He wasn't a receiving back in college and has recorded only 7 targets in his NFL career, earning a look on just 5% of his routes.

Tuten, on the other hand, posted a 13% target share in college with 1.27 yards per route run—well above Rodriguez's best marks of 5% and 0.34. Tuten graded out as a far-superior prospect. He'd rank as the RB2 in the 2026 rookie class; Rodriguez would be RB14 in my Rookie Super Model. For reference,

Travis Etienne is the No. 8 prospect in the model since 2017 and just got the bag in New Orleans.

The Jags backfield could devolve into a committee, but if we're putting a chip on the player with the skill set to unlock a breakout top-12 RB season, Tuten is the clear answer.

→ Do Not Draft: Bucky Irving Tampa Bay Buccaneers

There is certainly some merit to the argument that Irving will bounce back after a 2025 in which he played more than 50% of Tampa Bay's offensive snaps for only half of the season. I can understand the Bucs' coaching staff not wanting to overload their RB1 after his return from injury. Also encouraging is the fact that his peripherals did not take a complete nosedive in the final month of the regular season.

What's worse is that the players who stepped in for Irving were better in their new roles. Rachaad White, as a receiver, averaged a full yard more after the catch. Sean Tucker turned a third of his goal-line carries into TDs. White might be gone, but the addition of Kenny Gainwell (and his hilarious 19% target share over the final two months) has me out on Irving as a draft target in 2026.

→ Dynasty Darling: Kenneth Walker Kansas City Chiefs

Running back is by the far the toughest position in dynasty to plant a flag on. With receivers it's easy enough to be on the talent and hope everything else works out, but a running back's environment is much more important. Luckily, Kenneth Walker has the talent and the situation to thrive for at least a few years in Kansas City.

The Chiefs haven't had a 1,000-yard rusher while Patrick Mahomes has been their starting quarterback. They've been trying to piece together a usable backfield with duct tape and recycled limbs since 2017, so signing Walker is a declaration. "We don't want our running game to suck anymore!" they're shouting. I'm going to hear them out.

Walker's career fantasy stats haven't been eye-popping, but that's mostly because Seattle refused to use him as the unquestioned lead back for most of his career. But surprise, when Zach Charbonnet went down with an injury in the playoffs, Walker racked up 400+ scrimmage yards and 4 touchdowns across three games and earned himself a Super Bowl MVP.

With Eric Bieniemy back in Kansas City as the offensive coordinator, I expect a nostalgia-inducing return to a top-5 scoring offense. And that sets Walker up for a career-defining stretch of fantasy goodness.

The Handcuff Report

We hate to think of RB injuries, but we need to be prepared on who the Handcuff RBs are for fantasy

Handcuff running backs are backups who are often one injury to their team's starter away from suddenly becoming high-end fantasy football assets. Of course, individual talent level, offensive scoring upside, and general team philosophy with deploying committees all factor heavily into each unique equation, making the process of tiering

handcuff running backs more of an art than science.

But, hey, if it were easy, everyone would do it! Accordingly, let's make today a great day to be great and break down the five tiers of handcuff running backs ahead of the 2026 season. Note that players are listed in order of ranking preference inside each individual tier.

→ Tier S FLEX with benefits

You can probably already start these guys in the FLEX if needed, and the ceiling is the moon if their competition misses time:

Patriots RB TreVeyon Henderson

Bears RB Kyle Monangai

Steelers RB Rico Dowdle

Rams RB Blake Corum

Henderson's up-and-down rookie campaign still featured him showing off some tantalizing big-play upside with 17.6 PPR points per game (RB7) during Weeks 10-18 last season ... Monangai turned 29 touches into 198 total yards in his only game without D'Andre Swift; he averaged 13.7 opportunities per game across da Bears' final 10 contests ... Dowdle overtook Chuba Hubbard early in 2025 and supplied some BOOM performances, something that is on the table again in Pittsburgh with old friend Mike McCarthy ... Corum is essentially a Kyren Williams clone and actually managed to carve out an average of 11.2 opportunities per game in Weeks 7-18.

→ Tier A One injury from being on the cover of waiver wire articles

Standalone value is possible. But if RB1 goes down? We're looking at RBs capable of winning leagues thanks to a blend of scoring upside and three-down ability.

Harvey couldn't match JK Dobbins' effectiveness as a rusher, but the rising second-year talent is a dynamic receiver who managed to return RB8 production following the team's Week 12 bye ... Mason quietly was the RB6 in Next-Gen Stats' rushing yards OVER expected per carry and is a candidate to leap Aaron Jones on the depth chart independent of an injury ... There's potential for Rodriguez to see plenty of standalone work from his old college coach, although the best-case touch ceiling looks capped due in part to the elite pass-pro talents of LeQuint Allen ... Gainwell has the sort of explosive pass-catching ability that fantasy managers dream of seeing in a full-time role—that's on the table if Bucky Irving struggles to stay healthy again ... Rookie-year Marks was painfully inefficient as a rusher, but still handled at least 15 touches in all but two of his final 10 games ... Tracy averaged 18.1 opportunities per game following Cam Skattebo's season-ending ankle injury ... Pacheco is the only RB behind Jahmyr Gibbs on the Lions depth chart with more than 10 career touches.

Washington didn't get the Day 2 draft capital that his truthers hoped for—at least he's the clear next-man-up behind Ashton Jeanty ... My criteria for identifying league-winning WRs is simple:

Typically go in Rounds 3 to 6 of fantasy drafts

Has a strong underlying talent profile

Usually within the first three years of their career

Over the last two seasons, this criteria led me to draft the following wide receivers more than any others in those rounds:

2025: Jaxon Smith-Njigba (21% of 171 leagues; yes, I am sick)

2024: Rashee Rice (20% of 281 drafts; yes, I was even sicker)

2024: Malik Nabers (20%)

With Smith-Njigba, we checked off a fourth criterion: change in team environment. The departure of DK Metcalf left JSN—who broke out over the second half of 2024—to battle an aging Cooper Kupp for opportunities.

Who does the criteria point us to in 2026?
Luther Burden.

The 2025 Round 2 NFL Draft pick didn't boom in fantasy as a rookie, playing a limited role with a 40% route share behind Rome Odunze, DJ Moore, and battling rising star Colston Loveland for targets. However, he did grow his role over the course of the season, much like Rice. And now, Moore is gone, solidifying Burden's starter status.

With players like Burden, diving beyond fantasy points can be helpful. Per-route data tells us how well a player performed within their role. Below is how Rice and JSN fared the year before their breakouts, compared to Burden (WR1 = 1 to 12; WR2 = 13 to 24; WR3 = 25 to 36):

Jaxon Smith-Njigba: 1.81 yards per route (WR3); 22% targets per route (WR2); 0.40 fantasy points per route run (WR3)

Rashee Rice: 2.23 yards per route (WR2); 25% targets per route (WR1); 0.50 fantasy points per route run (WR2)

Luther Burden: 2.36 yards per route (WR1); 24% targets per route (WR2); 0.46 fantasy points per route run (WR2)

What's fascinating about the Rice and JSN comps is that both were seen as limited-upside plays due to their low average depth of target: 4.6 and 8.7 yards, respectively. Burden finished his rookie season at 8.1.

The Bears' new starting WR saw 26% of his targets come on screens as a rookie, which rarely translates 1:1 in a

full-time role. But excluding screens, Burden showed more to his game:

Yards Per Route: 2.35 (WR1-worthy)

Targets Per Route: 21% (WR2-worthy)

Fantasy Points Per Route: 0.43 (WR2-worthy)

Average Depth of Target: 11.8

That is impressive stuff for a rookie battling other good players for looks! The risk is Odunze and Loveland. Rice and JSN didn't play alongside other ascending early-round talents—they were the only game in town. But that fact should keep Burden's price reasonable in fantasy drafts.

Let's look at the range of outcomes for Burden using the Fantasy Life Projection model. His baseline is based on 85% route participation and 23% targets per route:

Ceiling: 17.0 points per game → mid-range WR1

Baseline: 14.1 points per game → mid-range WR2

Floor: 12.6 points per game → mid-range WR3

Burden will likely get drafted at his floor on ESPN, Yahoo and Sleeper this summer—leaving plenty of room for league-winning upside.

Wide Receivers

Wide receiver is where the fun really happens in fantasy football. These are the artists who can turn screen passes into 80-yard scores. Where running backs may need to churn out 20 carries to bull their way to 100 yards, a wide receiver might just need five or six catches to hit that mark. Or they could turn 12 catches into 225 yards and 2 TDs like Puka Nacua did in Week 16 against the Seahawks.

Last season was a mixed bag at the position, as injuries and/or poor QB play contributed to down years for top wideouts like Tyreek Hill, CeeDee Lamb and Justin Jefferson, among others. Nacua, however, reached another level, leading the NFL in both receptions (129) and receiving yards per game (107.2) while his Rams teammate Davante Adams led the league with 14 touchdown receptions. No receiver, however, was able to do what Ja'Marr Chase had done the previous year, hitting the rare receivers' Triple Crown. No player—not even the GOAT Jerry Rice—has reached that mountain more than once, but Chase at barely age 26 has many prime years left in his career. He'll have plenty of players chasing WR greatness alongside him.

1 Puka Nacua Los Angeles Rams

Nacua was No. 1 last year in receiving yards per game (107.2). In fact, since entering the league in 2023, he's still No. 1 (95.3), well ahead of No. 2 Ja'Marr Chase (88.5). With career marks of 9.7 yards per target and 9.8 targets per game, Nacua has elite efficiency and volume, and he's also a contributing rusher (33-240-2 for career). He'll likely lose TDs once again to WR Davante Adams in 2026, but even so Nacua is probably the league's best wideout.

2 Ja'Marr Chase Cincinnati Bengals

Chase since 2024 is No. 1 in targets (360), receptions (252), receiving yards (3,120) and receiving TDs (25). Since he entered the league in 2021, Chase is No. 2 in targets (767), receptions (520), receiving yards (6,837) and receiving TDs (54). Only 26 years old and still very much in his prime, Chase enters 2026 with a ceiling as high as the heavens and a floor higher than almost everyone else's ceiling. A case can be made for him as the 1.01.

3 Jaxon Smith-Njigba Seattle Seahawks

Smith-Njigba had an NFL-best 1,793 yards receiving in 2025, and across his three-year career he has made marked improvements each season in both efficiency (6.8 yards per target, 8.2, 11.0) and volume (5.5 targets per game, 8.1, 9.6). With the offseason departure of former OC Klint Kubiak, the Seahawks offense might regress in 2026, but as long as his 2025 usage carries over (No. 1 with a 35% target share), Smith-Njigba's production should stay intact.

St. Brown had another typical campaign in 2025 (117-1,401-11 receiving), and since his 2022 breakout performance, he's No. 1 in receptions (457), No. 2 in targets (623), No. 3 in receiving TDs (39) and No. 4 in receiving yards (5,340). How new OC Drew Petzing fits with the Lions is uncertain, but he shouldn't be a major downgrade on former OC John Morton, and with HC Dan Campbell and QB Jared Goff still on the team, St. Brown should have another standard season in 2026.

Lamb had a down campaign last season (75-1,077-3 receiving) as he missed three games and was outshined (hit the grunge riff) by the younger, more explosive George Pickens (93-1,429-9). But Lamb is still in his prime at 27 years old, and over the past half decade he's No. 3 in receptions (497) and receiving yards (6,481). If QB Dak Prescott stays healthy, a return to 1,200+ yards and 6 TDs for Lamb is reasonable, even with Pickens still on the roster.

McCarthy improves or HC Kevin O'Connell benches him for veteran Kyler Murray. The No. 4 WR last year in target share (31%), Jefferson could enjoy a significant bounceback in 2026.

He looked like himself upon his return (53-571-5 receiving, 78 targets in eight games) and is clearly the No. 1 target in K.C.

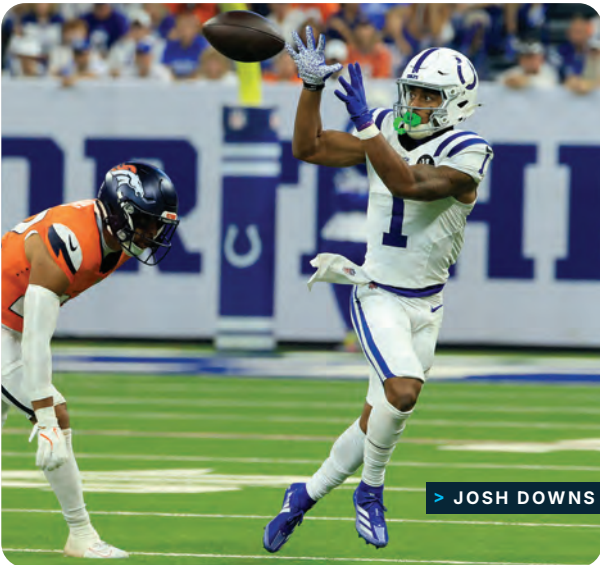

TeSlaa caught 16 passes on the season. He turned 6 of those into touchdowns. If TDs per receptions were a fantasy stat, TeSlaa would be in the discussion to be the 1.01. His route participation was between 58-94% from Week 13 on, but he saw more than 2 targets in a game just three times all season. Amon-Ra St. Brown, Jameson Williams, Sam LaPorta and Jahmyr Gibbs are all well ahead of him in the target pecking order. Pretty stiff target competition.

Wide Receiver Sleepers

None of these wideouts will start the year as their teams' top targets, but all could be big contributors at some point in the season

Wan'Dale Robinson, Luther Burden and Christian Watson were all wide receivers drafted in the 10th round or higher last season, yet all had solid performances late in the season that were pivotal in fantasy. It happens every year, which is why we're highlighting three players who could be key contributors at the very least as flex plays.

→ Jalen McMillan Tampa Bay Buccaneers

All the sleepers mentioned in this feature are outside of the first 10 rounds on Underdog, which is why I am advocating for Jalen McMillan as one of my favorite wide receiver sleepers. Now let's not get it twisted, everyone knows McMillan, but the impact of Mike Evans leaving doesn't just affect Chris Godwin and Emeka Egbuka.

Buccaneers quarterback Baker Mayfield wasn't exactly elite to end the season, but we have seen him carry multiple fantasy-relevant wide receivers. The truth lies somewhere in the middle from Mayfield's elite 2024 numbers and what he produced in 2025. He fell from QB4 in 2024 to QB12 last season with 27 total touchdowns, 14 turnovers and 36 sacks last year. On the other side, Godwin will be 30 years old during the season and has had his fair share of injuries during his career, which means if he were to ever go down it would be Egbuka and McMillan stepping up to the plate.

We also have to consider the vacated targets from Evans' departure as well—he notched four double-digit touchdown seasons since 2020. Egbuka has shown the ability to be a true WR1, but McMillan has also flashed for Tampa Bay before. Does anyone remember the team-best 9-7-114 line in Week 17 last year? Oh, I do because he was on my bench!

McMillan was sidelined for all but the final four games of the season last year due to a neck injury, but he showed immense promise his rookie season as well—in 2024 he caught 37 passes for 461 yards and eight touchdowns. He's not going to be a top-10 receiver in fantasy football, but any player going in the 12th round of drafts that has this kind of flex upside is always going to be on my radar.

→ Josh Downs Indianapolis Colts

While Josh's brother Caleb has gotten most of the attention this off-season, the Colts' rising fourth-year receiver has actually had a lot break his way ahead of 2026.

Michael Pittman left for Pittsburgh. Removing Pittman opens up targets in the underneath and intermediate areas of the field for Downs and Tyler Warren—it's not a coincidence Downs racked up 19 targets in his only two career games with Pittman sidelined.

It would make sense to see a less-mobile Daniel Jones more willing to get the ball out quickly coming off 2025's season-ending Achilles tear.

The only pass-game competition added during free agency was Nick Westbrook-Ikhine, whose one-year, nothing-burger deal hardly solidifies him a major role.

Downs has a better chance than ever to finally earn a full-time spot in two-WR formations.

Turning 25 in August, Downs is firmly in his prime years and suddenly profiles as a candidate for triple-digit targets in an offense that flashed an elite ceiling with Jones healthy in 2025. Throw in the potential for the injury gods to maybe chill out for once—people forget Downs had annoying August ankle and hamstring injuries to deal with in each of the past two seasons—and you have a talented separator looking at the biggest workload of his career in an offense with a high ceiling priced outside of the position's top-50 players.

That sounds like a pretty solid late-round dart to me.

→ Travis Hunter Jacksonville Jaguars

Last year, everyone was convinced Hunter was a full-time WR and he went in the top-50 picks in a lot of competitive drafts. This year, everyone is convinced he's a DB, and now he's going after pick 150.

What's particularly funny is that this massive course correction on Hunter's value is entirely driven by coachspeak, or I guess in this case, GMspeak. All it took is one comment from Jaguars GM James Gladstone about Hunter playing DB in 2026 and drafters overreacted.

We're essentially all playing that old game with flower petals when it comes to Hunter and the Jags' mouthpieces—he's a WR, he's not a WR, he's a DB, he's not a DB. We can all agree on this, though—when Hunter

does play WR, he's really good at it. Right before a knee injury derailed his season, he logged a game with a 28% target share and scored 24.1 fantasy points—good enough for a high-end Utilization Score of 92.

There's a famous Warren Buffet saying: Be greedy when others are fearful and be fearful when others are greedy. It was smart to be concerned about Hunter's frothy price tag in 2025 as a rookie, but it's now time to be greedy and acquire as much Hunter as you can in 2026 drafts.

If the DB whispers are true, you can easily cut him back into the waiver pile. If not, you will have just landed a talented wideout with top-24 upside at bargain-bin price.

WR Breakout, Do Not Draft, Dynasty Darling

George Pickens got a change of scenery to Dallas' pass-heavy scheme and *voila* ... breakout season. DJ Moore was in a crowded WR room with a new head coach, and those who avoided him got to miss his career-low yardage output. And Jameson Williams went past 1K to reward dynasty bros. Who's next?



→ Breakout: Luther Burden Chicago Bears

Burden's rookie season didn't exactly produce consistent fireworks. Sure, his 8-138-1 explosion against the 49ers in the fantasy championship was awesome, but it's tough to call 751 total yards and 2 touchdowns in 17 games (including playoffs) an overly special campaign.

That said: It was the efficient manner in which Burden picked up those yards that makes him such a prime breakout candidate ahead of 2026. You see, HC Ben Johnson had Burden play at least half of the offense's snaps in only seven games last season, but we saw some serious fireworks from the rookie when he was on the field.

Consider that among rookie wide receivers to have been targeted 50 or more times over the past decade, just five have averaged north of 2.5 yards per route run:

Luther Burden (2.71)

AJ Brown (2.68)

Justin Jefferson (2.66)

Puka Nacua (2.60)

Ja'Marr Chase (2.51)

That's pretty good company—and now Burden's path to a full-time role is more clear than ever after the team shipped DJ Moore off to Buffalo. There's still some legit target competition in the form of Rome Odunze and Colston Loveland, but at least the rising second-year talent should now have every opportunity to turn his elite efficiency into similarly awesome counting numbers. Throw in the potential for the offense as a whole to make a leap in Year 2 of the Caleb Williams–Ben Johnson partnership, and Burden profiles as a breakout bet worth making in 2026

→ Do Not Draft: Malik Nabers New York Giants

There's a level of certainty that should come with an early-round WR. They should have one of two traits (both would be nice, though). One, being in a situation that precludes them from missing out on fantasy-relevant touches. Or we can project them for a weekly floor of targets that will land them in the WR1 discussion each Monday.

Malik Nabers might have neither of those attributes in 2026. The obvious showstopper for drafters should be the lingering concern around Nabers' return-to-play timeline. After suffering a torn ACL and meniscus in Week 4 of last year, expecting a Week 1 start might be a stretch.

But let's say No. 1 suits up for the season opener. Studies have shown an average 10.0% drop in targets and production for players in their first year back from an ACL reconstruction

alone, which casts some doubt on Nabers' ability to return his lofty top-10 cost. Plus, his competition for targets isn't the same either.

Individually, none of the Giants' FA additions moved the needle. Out of the three, Mooney finished the highest in the EOS positional ranks (WR44). But collectively, they're a step above what Jaxson Dart had, chipping away at Nabers' total domination over the looks. Plus, with HC John Harbaugh bringing his emotional support fullback from Baltimore, passing scores might be at a premium in 2026.

→ Dynasty Darling: Jayden Higgins Houston Texans

Jayden Higgins finished with a solid first season in which he caught 41 passes (68 targets) for 525 yards and 6 TDs.

Despite playing alongside one of the top-end talents at the position in Nico Collins, Higgins functioned well as the No. 2 wideout. However, veteran TE Dalton Schultz outpaced Higgins in targets (106), receptions (82) and receiving yards (777). It is worth noting that Houston did sign Schultz to a one-year, \$12.6 million extension this offseason.

I fully expect Higgins, the 34th overall pick back last year, to have a much stronger sophomore season. The Texans have already let Christian Kirk leave in free agency, which

really just opens things up for Jaylin Noel, but Higgins has all the attributes to be a solid secondary option.

He's currently valued as a low-end WR4. That should be his floor both in 2026 and in the seasons to come. Despite a tough third season that saw C.J. Stroud post career-low marks in passing attempts, passing completions, passing yards and passing TDs, I'm viewing Stroud as a bounceback candidate—and a sneaky dynasty trade target in SF formats—who can elevate this offense.

The Texans will be better in 2026 and beyond and Higgins will be a big reason why.

George Kittle

How can one of the greatest tight ends of this generation be considered a breakout candidate? Great question. You might think I'm cheating here, but let me explain: There are only a few difference makers at the TE position. Heading into 2026, that short list includes the Cardinals' Trey McBride, the Raiders' Brock Bowers and the Bears' Colston Loveland. As post-breakout guys, you'll have to pay up for their services.

If we are hunting for cheap breakouts at the position, they usually come from the rookie cohort. Think Sam LaPorta a few years ago or even Harold Fannin last year. I could certainly write up a guy like Kenyon Sadiq, but I find the case for George Kittle more compelling.

The argument is twofold: 1) He's the cheapest he's ever been in drafts and 2) He's had six seasons where he's finished as the TE4 or better. There's no need to do any guesswork with rookies when Kittle is there for the taking in the double-digit rounds. Outside of the three other Elite TEs I mentioned above, Kittle is the one other guy in the player pool we definitively know produces as an elite TE.

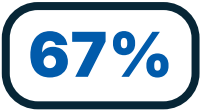
OK, so now for the elephant in the room ...

He's the cheapest he's ever been because he tore his Achilles in the Wild Card round. Yes, he will almost certainly miss the start of the season, but I'm here to assure you that it's not that big of a deal for our purposes. The most important weeks are the fantasy playoffs.

If we want to build a juggernaut starting lineup that can bulldoze its way through the fantasy playoffs, then an Elite TE is a key ingredient because of how much they can separate from the rest of the position. Normally we have to pay up for this positional advantage, but the Kittle injury discount is providing a rare opportunity to sneak a late-season

hammer onto your roster at sleeper prices.

And because TE is the lowest-scoring position, you can easily survive the early part of the season without Kittle.

My suggestion is to draft Kittle alongside another cheap, reliable TE. Think guys like Dalton Schultz or Hunter Henry. Let one of those types serve as a chaperone for Kittle until he's ready to go.

Then when Kittle returns to action in November or December—and I honestly won't be surprised if it's on the early side with what a physical freak Kittle is—you will be able to supercharge your starting lineup for the fantasy playoffs (aka the money weeks) with an elite TE at bargain-bin prices.

Don't get caught thinking of Kittle as a "dead roster spot." It's quite the opposite, he's the skeleton key to unlocking a superteam in the fantasy playoffs

Tight Ends

After a seven-year stretch where Travis Kelce surpassed 1,000 yards annually from 2016 to 2022, the future Hall of Famer has seen his TE1 era pass by. Sam LaPorta entered the league in 2023 and promptly set the rookie record for receptions (86) and his 10 TDs tied him for the most by a first-year player. Then Brock Bowers said “hold my beer,” putting up WR1-type numbers with 112 receptions (on 153 targets) for 1,194 yards and 5 TDs in 2024. Last season it was the Cardinals’ Trey McBride who produced like a No. 1 wide receiver.

1 Trey McBride Arizona Cardinals

McBride over the past two years is No. 2 in the league in targets (316) and receptions (237), No. 6 in receiving yards (2,385), and last season he leveled up his game with 11 touchdowns. He plays TE, but he produces like a No. 1 wide receiver.

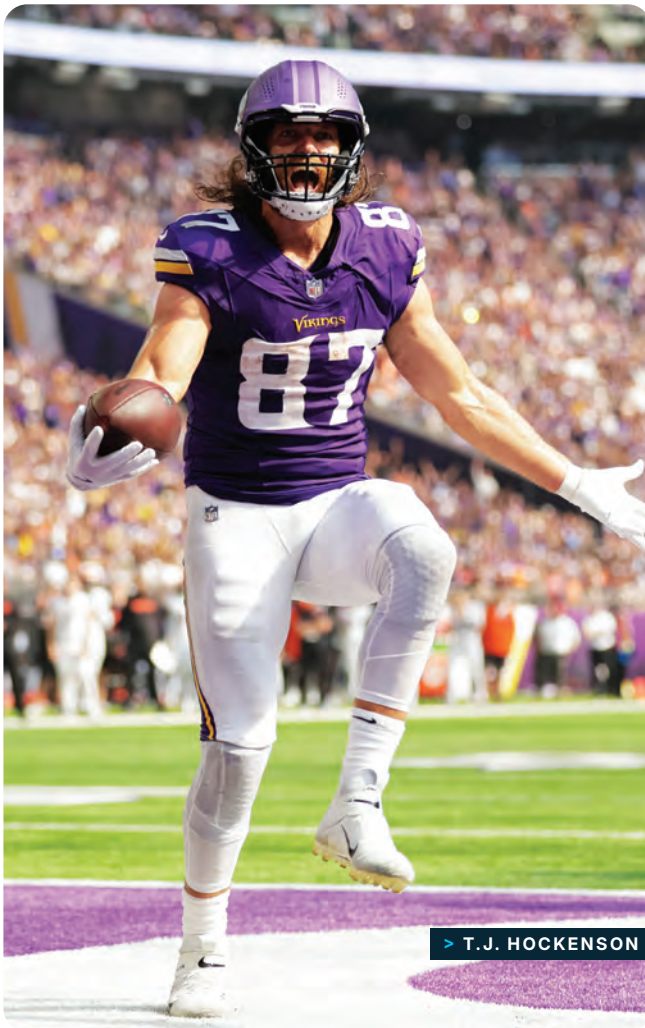

Tight End Sleepers

These players could be drafted as backups and turn into fantasy starters before long

"This is the year that tight end is as deep as it's ever been." That's something that a number of fantasy football analysts utter during the summer months of draft season. We know how that's worked out. But annually there are sleepers who surprise with top-12 finishes, like Hunter Henry, Dalton Schultz and Juwan Johnson did last year. Here are three TEs who could pop this season.



> T.J. HOCKENSON



> T.J. Hockenson Minnesota Vikings

Hockenson was widely speculated to be a cap casualty this offseason, but instead he'll be wearing purple and gold for at least one more year after the Vikings decided to restructure his contract.

On the one hand, Hockenson is essentially coming off career-worst counting and efficiency numbers inside a Minnesota offense that will presumably continue to primarily flow through Justin Jefferson and Jordan Addison. He gained more than 50 yards just twice and finished as fantasy's TE27 in 2025.

On the other hand, the veteran TE is an extra year removed from 2023's devastating knee injury—a season in which he finished as fantasy's TE2 in PPR points per game despite catching passes from Kirk Cousins, Nick Mullens and Joshua Dobbs. This came in a season in which Jefferson and Addison combined for 208

targets, albeit the former receiver did miss seven games due to injury.

So we're looking at a TE who has finished the last three seasons as fantasy's TE2 ... TE18 ... and TE27 ... and he's now being priced as the TE23 in early drafts! Last year Hockenson ended August as the consensus TE5 in ADP. Talk about someone being priced closer to their floor than ceiling ahead of a season in which all parties involved *should* see some level of improvement in the QB play department with the addition of Kyler Murray, who, you know, helped Trey McBride work as fantasy's TE2 all the way back in ... 2024.

→ Isaiah Likely New York Giants

New head coach John Harbaugh is making his mark on the New York Giants, and one of his biggest free agency moves was signing former Ravens tight end Isaiah Likely to a three-year deal worth \$40 million.

Likely was behind Mark Andrews his whole career, but this feels like a bet from Harbaugh that, without the All-Pro tight end in his way, we could finally see Likely reach his full potential.

In four seasons, he has played in 63 games and has recorded 135 receptions for 1,568 yards and 15 touchdowns. He has totaled 740 yards after the catch in those four seasons as well. Now, these aren't necessarily numbers that are jumping off the page, but when talking about "sleeper tight ends," we are focusing on players who could drastically outperform their ADP, and Likely fits that mold.

There are bigger plans for Likely in this new offense. Theo Johnson is still on the team, but Likely fits better as a downfield threat for Jaxon Dart and just overall boasts more upside. It is more than likely we will see both Likely and Johnson on the field together regularly, though.

According to ESPN, the Ravens last season (under Harbaugh) used 12 personnel third most in the NFL at 35.9%. But is it crazy to think Likely could be the No. 2 target on this team?

The Giants also let Wan'Dale Robinson walk in free agency, signaling that a tight end duo could be their future alongside Malik Nabers. There are some questions about whether Nabers will even be ready for Week 1 of the NFL season, which makes drafting Likely even easier for me.

→ Chig Okonkwo Washington Commanders

Here's a list of TEs: Travis Kelce, George Kittle, Dallas Goedert, Dalton Schultz and Chig Okonkwo. Not a bad group. Those are the only TEs with 450-plus yards receiving each year since 2022, when Okonkwo entered the league as an upside fourth-rounder.

Is 450 yards a notably high threshold? No. But it shows that Okonkwo has been a consistently high-floor producer. When it comes to sleepers, are we looking for floors? No. We want ceilings. But most guys with high floors have theoretically elevated ceilings (even if we never see them), and I believe that Okonkwo—with his elite athleticism (4.52-second 40-yard dash at 238 pounds) and

sufficient career efficiency (7.4 yards per target)—could reach his ceiling in his new circumstances. After toiling with the Titans to open his career, Okonkwo signed a three-year, \$27 million contract with the Commanders. Okonkwo could slide into Zach Ertz's vacated role as the No. 1 TE on the team and the No. 2 pass catcher for QB Jayden Daniels.

And what happens if No. 1 WR Terry McLaurin—who missed seven games last year and turns 31 in September—declines as a player or suffers a significant injury? Then Okonkwo would have an outside chance to function as the No. 1 pass catcher for a young, promising QB.

TE Breakout, Do Not Draft, Dynasty Darling

Every year during fantasy draft season we hear that the tight end position is deeper than it has been in years. Then when the actual season plays out, it feels like just six TEs are set-it-and-forget-it players, while the rest of the league plays the streaming game. Is 2026 going to be any different?

→ Breakout: Chig Okonkwo Washington Commanders

You know when people say the grass might be greener on the other side? That describes Chig Okonkwo's situation for 2026.

In four seasons with the Titans, Okonkwo caught 194 passes for 2,017 yards and had 8 receiving touchdowns.

Now with a new three-year contract signed with the Commanders, a breakout could be coming. I hate to say his talents were wasted in Tennessee, but jumping to a situation where Jayden Daniels is now your QB1 is a massive upgrade.

In 2024, when Daniels was fully healthy, he ranked 12th in on-target throw percentage (78.2%). In Okonkwo's four seasons in Tennessee, he's never had a quarterback rank higher than 25th (shoutout to Ryan Tannehill in 2022).

Zach Ertz went down last season with an awful ACL injury, but even with Daniels in

and out of the lineup due to injuries, Ertz still had 72 targets. Now all that attention turns to Okonkwo. Not only is Okonkwo stepping into a better offense, but the Commanders should be able to elevate his skill set. His YAC ability is something that cannot be ignored—Okonkwo ranked in the top 15 at the tight end position in three of his four seasons, getting as high as 11th last season. Combine his YAC ability with his speed—he ran a 4.52 40-yard dash at the combine—and the Commanders are going to be cooking with gas.

I'm bullish on Okonkwo finally reaching his ceiling in 2026 and proving he can be a reliable fantasy asset, and NO Matthew Berry did not make me write this! Okonkwo's a mid-range TE with upside.

→ **Do Not Draft:**
Jake Ferguson
Dallas Cowboys

We knew going into last season that Dallas would be the NFC version of Cincinnati: high-end offense with a porous defensive unit, forcing constant passing scripts. Pieces like Ferguson were therefore coveted draft targets due to their projected opportunity. And through the first two months, gamers rostering Ferguson were happy.

Targets per Game (Weeks 1-8): 7.4, 2nd among all TE (min. 100 routes)

RZ Target Share: 24.1%, 7th

FPPG: 15.0, 3rd

But remember that CeeDee Lamb missed a month of action. Both Ferguson and George Pickens benefited from his absence. However, earning targets is a skill. Simply being on the field isn't enough. And Ferguson's midseason peripherals hinted at a loss of work unless the performance improved.

Of the 13 TEs with a similar target share and route deployment, only Mark Andrews averaged fewer yards after the catch per reception. Breaking tackles was optional. Consequently, as Dak Prescott needed more from his pass catchers down the stretch, the focus shifted away from the veteran TE.

Target Share: 21% (Weeks 1-8), 14% (Weeks 9-18)

Targets per Route Run: 25%, 16%

Play-Action Target Rate: 42%, 29%

Prescott was still averaging 38-39 dropbacks per game. Lamb and Pickens were top-24 options each week. Said another way, the offense was the same. But without anything to add, Ferguson became an ancillary part of the offense, making him an overvalued option in drafts for 2026.

Last year, I hyped up Tucker Kraft in this space. And as much as I'd love to just run it back and talk more about the Green Bay tight end, the tight end position is far too sparse for me to simply rest on my laurels. So instead, let's look at another rising star who could be a linchpin of your dynasty teams for years to come.

Harold Fannin, the 22-year-old with the name of a septuagenarian, came out swinging in his rookie season. Not only did he leapfrog David Njoku to become the top tight end for the Browns, but Fannin also led all pass catchers in Cleveland in receptions, yards and receiving touchdowns. Sure, he's bound to have more

competition for targets going forward, but the Bowling Green product showcased enough to ensure his place near the top of the pecking order. Fannin finished inside the Top 10 at the position in points per game while also notching the highest Targets Per Routes Run rate of any tight end. On top of that, he set the franchise rookie record for most catches in a season. I know what you're thinking ... it's the Browns. But hey, that's an impressive feat no matter the team!

Colston Loveland and Tyler Warren are flashier names, but don't sleep on Fannin going into his second season

Justin Jefferson and Drake London will be catching passes from new QBs. Rashee Rice has yet to play a full season, and Patrick Mahomes' Week 1 availability isn't for certain. And the chances of Taylor and the Colts recapturing

Matthew snagged Carnell Tate at 57th overall. Our rankers have him at 70th. Don't wait to draft your pass catchers.

If Romeo Doubs and Dontayvion Wicks leaving Wisconsin frees up more routes for Reed, drafters like Freedman will have plenty to smile about in the middle rounds.

Jorge tried to sneak this one by me. But after watching Rico Dowdle overtake the Panthers' backfield last year, I wish I had taken the same bet on Jonathon Brooks returning to form after missing 2025.

Yes, pocket passers can be hard to bank on as every-week starters, but Dwain has Dak Prescott as the QB9 in his projections. He finished as the QB5 last year. And Gene let the Cowboy fall to him at QB14. That's my bad. Anyway, over Prescott's last two full seasons, we've yet to see him be anything less than a QB1 in opportunity or efficiency.

> Team Overview

Jacoby Brissett led the NFL in pass attempts on his way to scoring the sixth-most fantasy

points at the position upon taking over for Kyler Murray in Week 6. Was this heavily aided by fantasy-friendly comeback-mode game script because the Cardinals were a bad football team? Yes. Is that ... still expected to be the case in 2026? Also yes.

Longtime starter James Conner is 31, coming off a season-ending foot injury, and essentially took a \$4 million pay cut to stay with the team. This came in the same month as the team signed former Falcons RB Tyler Allgeier to a relatively ho-hum two-year, \$12.25 million deal. Then the Cardinals drafted Jeremiyah Love, and now Fantasy Life Projections have Love winning the touch battle with Allgeier ... 264-104. The electric No. 3 overall pick is worthy of early-round treatment in drafts, while Allgeier is more of a handcuff. Conner is now an afterthought.

Michael Wilson was the overall fantasy WR2 during Weeks 11-18 last season! Of course, injuries to basically all relevant target WR

competition helped in a big way. Marvin Harrison Jr.'s average career efficiency numbers in yards (1.62, 45th) and targets per route run (20.5%, 47th) don't paint a promising picture when hoping for a third-year breakout. There's triple-digit target upside here with a capable gunslinger QB. Just realize both will inevitably be the Robin to the real Batman of this passing attack.

The reigning, defending, undisputed No. 1 tight end in fantasy football just scored 105.1 more PPR points than the next-best fantasy tight end. The one concern for Trey McBride is the change at playcaller, although Mike LaFleur spent 2025 working with Sean McVay where Rams tight ends as a whole scored more fantasy points than any team other than ... the Cardinals!

> Utilization Notes

Michael Wilson went bonkers after an injury to MHJ opened the door to more playing time. From Week 10 to Week 18, he averaged 19.7 points per game over nine contests. Over that span, he was the No. 4 WR, ranking 11th in target share (27%) and second in air yards per game with 127.3. Early coachspeak points to Harrison as the vertical threat. Wilson could be the WR1 in a rhythm-based passing attack with Jacoby Brissett returning. The 2023 Round 4 NFL Draft pick offers significant upside as a borderline WR3 in fantasy drafts.

→ Team Overview

Any meaningful efficiency metric will tell you that both Tua Tagovailoa and Michael Penix had ROUGH

2025 campaigns, but Penix's ongoing recovery from a partially torn ACL gives Tua the edge to start Week 1. Neither immobile pocket passer profiles as an overly intriguing fantasy option in this probable run-heavy attack.

If the aliens invaded the planet and forced humans to play a game of football to avoid being destroyed: Bijan Robinson would be my pick for RB1 duties. But should he go before Lions RB Jahmyr Gibbs in fantasy drafts? Fantasy Life Projections give Gibbs the slight nod. The projected discrepancy in rushing touchdowns (14.1 vs. 8.6) underlines the difference in scoring upside between the Lions and Falcons. Meanwhile, the other B Robinson, Brian, is one of fantasy's more valuable late-round handcuff picks.

Drake London was fantasy's WR3 in PPR points per game during the first 11 weeks of last season, but a knee injury kept him out until late December when the going wasn't as fun with Kirk Cousins at QB. Tua's arm strength is certainly more Cousins than Penix, although London is young (25 in July), very talented and clearly is poised to operate as the No. 1 pass-game option in this offense. The previous

three factors are enough to warrant top-10 treatment at the position.

Kyle Pitts' 11-166-3 eruption in the first week of the fantasy playoffs was the cherry on top of the most productive season of his career. A Jay-Z level encore is worth betting on considering there's plenty of precedent from the playcaller (David Njoku and Harold Fannin have a combined four top-8 seasons since 2022) and QB (Tua got a LOT out of Jonnu Smith and Darren Waller).

However, his splits with and without Drake London paint a wide range of outcomes: 19 points per game with a 29% target share in five games without London on the field, compared to 9.6 points per game and a 20% target share with London. With Darnell Mooney gone, Pitts slots in as Atlanta's No. 2 pass-game option. Early drafters are grabbing him at TE7, which is a fair price, but he's a boom-bust profile.

The most concerning part of Lamar Jackson's 2025 campaign was his career-low 26.8 rushing yards per game—33.1 yards lower than his previous career average. Of course, September hamstring and December back injuries didn't help matters. There's reason to believe Jackson's biggest and best seasons are in the rear-view mirror, but we are still talking about one of just three QBs with a career fantasy points per game average north of 20.

Derrick Henry's 325-1,921-16 and 307-1,595-16 rushing lines in his first two seasons with the Ravens came on a beastly 5.6 yards per carry. While the future Hall of Famer has played in 69 of a possible 70 games over the past four seasons, Henry would be the first RB aged 32+ to post top-12 PPR numbers since DeAngelo Williams back in 2015. Justice Hill is the next man up.



Zay Flowers' 12-game scoring drought during the middle of the year wasn't ideal, but the man was indeed one of only six players at the position to gain 1,200+ receiving yards, and this depth chart continues to offer very little in the form of significant competition. Meanwhile, times as a Rashod Bateman truther are tough. Injuries be damned: 2024 (45-756-9) is the only season that the former first-rounder has managed to get much of anything going—and now the Ravens drafted Ja'Kobi Lane and Elijah Sarratt to compete with him.

Mark Andrews is the team's undisputed No. 1 tight end after Isaiah Likely and Charlie Kolar took their talents to New York and Los Angeles, respectively, in free agency. The 30-year-old veteran is only one season removed from scoring 11 touchdowns, but 2025 was *rough*. We're talking career-worst counting and efficiency numbers in basically every stat out there. Except rushing. Remember that cool 35-yard fake tush push TD run? Crazy.

→ Utilization Notes

At the age of 30, Andrews isn't the same player he once was, but he profiles as a top-2 option in an offense projected as a top-5 scoring unit. He is a near lock for a 75% route participation rate. Over the last three seasons, the veteran TE has averaged 12.1 fantasy points in 18 games in which he reached that threshold. That would make him a mid-range TE1. Andrews is a steal as the TE16 in early drafts.

Josh Allen has worked as fantasy's QB2, QB1, QB2, QB1, QB2 and QB1 during the last six years. Expect continued success with Joe Brady and the tush push both back: Allen (17) and Jalen Hurts (27) are the only QBs with more than

seven rushing touchdowns from the 1-yard line since the start of the 2023 regular season.

James Cook handled 342 touches in 2025 after getting just 239 during 2024. The 26-year-old star averaged the league's second-most rushing yards over expected per carry along the way. The ceiling is the moon if Cook can get more going as a receiver—his 4.35 PPR points per game from strictly receiving in 2025 were his fewest since his rookie season. The handcuff picture is a bit murky: Ray Davis was the lead back in one game without Cook in 2024, although Ty Johnson was the primary backup throughout 2025. A committee seems likely in Cook's absence.

Ex-Panthers/Bears WR DJ Moore notably turned in a 96-1,364-8 receiving line (PPR WR9) catching passes from Justin Fields in 2023. Unfortunately, 2024 (WR27) and 2025 (WR44) weren't as fun. QB upgrade be damned, borderline WR2/upside WR3 treatment feels about right. Elsewhere, Khalil Shakir's steady dose of screens and low-aDOT targets makes him a likely bet to at least finish inside the position's top-50 PPR performers even if his ceiling is whatever. Rookie Skyler Bell

joins an uninspiring WR3 competition with Josh Palmer and Keon Coleman.

Only Jaxon Smith-Njigba (3.68) and Puka Nacua (3.65) averaged more yards per route run than Dalton Kincaid (2.67)! The problem was an ongoing PCL injury led to Kincaid playing 55% or fewer of the offense's snaps in every game. Both Brady and GM Brandon Beane have already spoken this offseason about additional load management for Kincaid.

→ Utilization Notes

James Cook has averaged 16.7 and 18.1 fantasy points, finishing as the RB11 and RB6 over the last two seasons. While Joe Brady refuses to integrate the explosive back into the passing game (41% route rate), Cook has become a rushing TD aficionado. Despite the presence of Josh Allen, Cook ranks fourth in RB rushing TDs over the last two seasons with 28. Playing behind one of the best offensive lines in a high-scoring offense points toward another big TD total in 2026. If Brady ever unleashes Cook in the passing game, he would offer top-3 fantasy upside.

Bryce Young remains just 24 years young and has flashed during his three seasons as a starter—especially when throwing downfield—but at the end of the day, we're looking at someone who ranks among the position's bottom-10 QBs in pretty much any meaningful efficiency metric (including fantasy points per game) during the past two seasons.

Rico Dowdle's departure suddenly gives the (Roman) reins of this backfield back to Chuba Hubbard, who turned in an RB13 finish in PPR points per game all the way back in ... 2024. Of course, this backfield could be more of a committee between Hubbard and 2024 second-round pick Jonathon Brooks—if the 22-year-old finally stays healthy. Offseason updates

have been encouraging. Chuba is also a candidate for improved health considering he dealt with a nagging calf injury throughout 2025. While the scoring upside in Carolina isn't massive, this quietly solid run-blocking offensive line helped Panthers RBs average the eighth-most yards *before* contact per carry last season.

Tetairoa McMillan looked the part of a true No. 1 receiver as a rookie in 2025. Of course, No. 2 option Jalen Coker spent the early parts of last season on the sideline, and the addition of Chris Brazzell in the draft makes it tough to assume T-Mac will see a spike in targets in 2026. Similar ceiling concerns exist for Coker and Brazzell: Young's 2023 (2,877) and 2025 (3,011) campaigns produced the two lowest passing yards totals among 45 QBs to start at least 16 games in a season during the last three years.

The Panthers were more than content to rotate a trio of tight ends throughout 2024 and 2025. No Panthers tight end has finished better than the TE36 in PPR points per game during the last two seasons.

→ Utilization Notes

Tetairoa McMillan averaged 12.5 fantasy points en route to being named the NFL's Offensive Rookie of the Year. However, his 72 Utilization Score suggests there was more in the tank. Historically, players in that range averaged 14.1 points. His underlying talent profile (26% target share) points to a WR who could leap into the top 12 in Year 2. But McMillan needs a little help from his friends. Over the past two seasons, Bryce Young averaged 193 passing yards in 27 games where he played over 80% of snaps. McMillan projects as a mid-range WR2 who needs Young to improve to unlock WR1 upside in 2026.

Caleb Williams went from one of the league's single-worst QBs in pressure-to-sack rate as a rookie

(28.2%, 43rd) to one of the very best in 2025 (10.8%, 3rd). The 24-year-old talent still has some work to do in making the easy actually easy, but his Rolodex of off-script magic is up there with anyone. A true breakout in Year 2 with Ben Johnson shouldn't surprise anyone.

The Bears deployed a boom (Kyle Monangai) and zoom (D'Andre Swift) committee down the stretch of 2025. Swift led the way in touches (139 vs. 110) and PPR points per game (13 vs. 9.2) in Weeks 10-18, but Monangai was still plenty involved and proved capable of handling a legit workhorse role (29 touches, 198 yards) in his lone start of the season. This one-two punch was reminiscent of Johnson's previous backfield tandems in Detroit and should be expected to continue in 2026.

No DJ Moore *should* consolidate targets more cleanly between Rome Odunze and Luther Burden. The former looked to be on the verge of a Year 2 breakout with 5 scores in his first four games of the season, but a foot injury slowed Odunze down the stretch. Meanwhile, Burden didn't earn a full-time role until late November, but the man was electric with his opportunities: No rookie WR

has averaged more yards per route run than Burden (2.71) during the last decade of action! Of course, the real No. 1 pass-game option in this offense might just be the team's stud tight end.

Colston Loveland posted top-5 marks at the position in targets (23.4%, 5th) and yards (1.98, 5th) per route run as a rookie (including playoffs). Overall TE3 treatment in fantasy land is warranted as the odds-on favorite to lead this ascending offense in targets.

> Utilization Notes

Colston Loveland didn't take over full-time TE duties until Week 16, but he exploded from there—posting a 99 Utilization Score, 16.8 PPG and a 29% target share over five games through the Divisional Round. His 1.98 yards per route run ranks third among rookie TEs since 2011, trailing only Brock Bowers and Kyle Pitts. Loveland offers a rare blend of target-earning and field-stretching prowess (10.0 aDOT) that can unlock massive touchdown production. Paired with Ben Johnson and Caleb Williams, he offers top-3 upside. Loveland goes almost two rounds after Bowers and Trey McBride in drafts. Yes, please.

Joe Burrow scored the second-fewest fantasy points per game

(16.8, QB15) of his career last season. Of course, he remains a yearly threat to vie for the league lead in passing yards and touchdowns ... like he did in 2024 ... whenever healthy enough to make it through a season. Although we do now have two examples (2023, 2025) of Burrow offering rough QB2 fantasy production when forced to play through lower-body injuries.

Chase Brown is a solid enough real-life talent capable of playing across all three downs inside a Bengals offense that has ranked seventh, seventh, and sixth in points per game during the three seasons that Burrow has been healthy enough to start more than 10 games. Throw in the reality that Brown (26 years young) is in the middle of his prime and not coming off any injury, and we sure seem to be looking at the profile of a Round 1 fantasy RB—but at a Round 3 cost.

Ja'Marr Chase (19.6) trails only Puka Nacua (20) in career PPR points per game among all wide receivers ... ever. Even Jason Pierre-Paul doesn't need more than one hand to count the number of players who deserve to be

drafted ahead of him in fantasy this season. Meanwhile, Tee Higgins has scored 24 touchdowns in his last 30 games. Unfortunately, injuries have caused Higgins to miss 12 games over the last three seasons to a variety of lower-body issues (usually hamstring-related) and concussions. Scary stuff. Just realize the 27-year-old talent possesses as high a ceiling as anyone at the position whenever he has the blessings of the injury gods.

The Bengals are fully expected to continue rotating three to four tight ends, rendering each as non-viable fantasy assets more weeks than not.

Chase Brown has yet to put together a wire-to-wire great fantasy season. However, when injuries have opened the door to a full-time role, he has boomed.

Shedeur Sanders, Deshaun Watson and Dillon Gabriel rank 54th, 53rd and 52nd, respectively, in EPA per dropback among 54 qualified quarterbacks over the last three seasons. Here's to hoping Todd Monken and an improved skill-position group ignite a spark and provide Cleveland with its first great quarterback since ... Bernie Kosar?

GM Andrew Berry said Quinshon Judkins should be full go for training camp following last December's season-ending dislocated ankle and fractured fibula. Judkins started out swinging and worked as fantasy's RB13 in PPR points per game through the first seven weeks of the season, but a shoulder injury and porous offensive line/scoring environment led to him averaging just 9.5

points during his final eight games. A monster workload could be on the way if Todd Monken views his new lead back in an even somewhat-similar light as his last two lead backs Nick Chubb (334 touches in 2019) and Derrick Henry (344, 322 touches in 2024-25).

Jerry Jeudy remains just 27 years old and is technically just one season removed from a Pro Bowl 90-1,229-4 campaign. That said: He's averaged 98.9 receiving yards per contest in eight career games with Jameis Winston ... and 35 or less with every other current Browns QB. Adding rookie WRs KC Concepcion and Denzel Boston to the equation makes it tough to expect too high of a boom from any party involved considering the lackluster QB room and presence of ace tight end Harold Fannin.

The numbers paint Fannin's rookie campaign (72-731-6, PPR TE6) fine enough, but the eye test was even more fun. Overall, PFF credited the Bowling Green product with avoiding 29 tackles—the most by ANY tight end or wide receiver not named Deebo Samuel since 2020! The ceiling is the roof here, especially considering how productive tight ends were under Monken in Baltimore.

→ Utilization Notes

Harold Fannin took over in Week 7 of his rookie campaign and never looked back—retaining the starting role when David Njoku returned. In nine healthy games, Fannin posted a beastly 27% target share and 7.1 targets per game, trailing only Trey McBride over that stretch. His 24% targets per route led all TEs with 250+ routes, and his 2.18 yards per route ranked eighth—impressive given Cleveland's QB situation. The coaching and QB uncertainty are real concerns, but Fannin has the talent to vacuum up targets. Fannin is a viable mid-range TE1 target in fantasy drafts.

Dak Prescott has led the NFL's sixth, first, first, and seventh highest-scoring offense during

his last four seasons when he was healthy enough to start at least 16 games. While the rushing heights aren't quite what they used to be, the soon-to-be 33-year-old gunslinger is a discount Joe Burrow in fantasy land thanks to his team's alpha wide receiver duo and piss-poor defense.

Javonte Williams looked like a new man in 2025 on his way to racking up 1,201 rushing yards and 13 total touchdowns. The Cowboys' decision to give him a three-year, \$24 million extension and to not add any meaningful competition likely (again) locks Williams into a bell cow role inside pretty much anyone's idea of a top-10 offense. Malik Davis is the likely handcuff over Jaydon Blue.

CeeDee Lamb's last four season-long finishes in PPR points per game: WR7, WR1, WR7, and most recently WR12. Of course, George Pickens squeezed targets a bit more than usual in 2025. Lamb still led the way in targets (116 vs. 99) and PPR points (16.6 vs. 16.1) during their 12 full games together,

but the competition is enough to push Lamb outside fantasy's consensus top-4 receivers for the first time in a minute. Meanwhile, Pickens is a more than viable borderline WR1 alongside fellow overqualified WR2 Tee Higgins and WR1s with shakier QB situations like Tetairoa McMillan and Chris Olave.

On the one hand, Jake Ferguson's 82-600-8 receiving line was good enough to work as the TE11 in PPR points per game. On the other hand, he boasted bottom-5 efficiency and largely benefited from averaging 18.6 PPR points per game in four games without Lamb compared to just 9.4 with him. He's not someone fantasy managers should realistically expect top-5 heights from without major injuries occurring elsewhere.

→ Utilization Notes

CeeDee Lamb's 14.4 PPG in 2025 represents a steep drop from his 23.8 WR1 finish in 2023, hurt by George Pickens' arrival and multiple injuries. In 11 healthy games, he averaged 16.5 points with a 28% target share and 2.29 YPRR—great numbers. At 27, he's still in his prime on one of the league's most durable passing offenses. Dak Prescott has averaged 277 passing yards over three seasons in healthy games—well above the 230 NFL average. Even sharing targets with Pickens, Lamb remains a locked-in WR1 worth targeting in Round 1.

Nix led the Broncos to the AFC's No. 1 seed in 2025 and outdueled that Josh Allen guy to capture a Divisional Round W. And yet, it's still tough to find a passing efficiency metric that paints him as anything

more than an average-to-below-average quarterback. Good news for fantasy investors: Nix has racked up the position's fifth-most fantasy points from rushing during the past two seasons, helping him post QB8 and QB11 fantasy finishes despite (to this point) meh efficiency through the air.

JK Dobbins is back to presumably again lead this backfield. After all, Dobbins racked up 164 touches compared to just 75 for RJ Harvey during the first 10 weeks of last season and was considerably more efficient as a rusher (5 vs. 3.7 YPC) along the way. The good news for Harvey: He flashed as a pass catcher, and Sean Payton handed him 16.2 touches per game in the absence of Dobbins down the stretch. Jonah Coleman will muddy the waters.

Fantasy Life projections have the target edge going to Jaylen Waddle (118) over Courtland Sutton (108). Troy Franklin is expected to be the odd man out among the other receivers. Good news: The speedy ex-Dolphin adds a much-needed field-stretching dimension to this offense and *should* make things easier for all parties involved. This could theoretically actually help Sutton build upon his

PPR WR25 and WR19 finishes, although Waddle's big-play ability still makes him the preferred click among the one-two punch.

Evan Engram is back as TE1, although that role resulted in just 76 targets and a PPR TE32 finish in 2025. He never played even 60% of the offense's snaps in a game all season. Broncos tight ends as a whole rank dead last in targets since Sean Payton took over in 2023.

→ Utilization Notes

RJ Harvey blossomed after JK Dobbins suffered a Lisfranc injury, averaging 14.2 fantasy points over nine games, including the NFL Playoffs. But Dobbins was the better runner before going down, and Denver re-signed him on a two-year, \$16M deal. Prior to Dobbins' injury, Harvey's role was dramatically smaller: 10.0 PPG, 29% snaps, 19% attempts, 32% routes and 9% targets. His Round 2 NFL Draft capital suggests a path to the lead role, but he has to earn it. Harvey is an RB3 who offers RB1 upside should he distance himself from Dobbins or if the veteran gets injured.

Jared Goff has cleared 4,500 passing yards in each of the past

three seasons—the rest of the NFL has done so just six times combined during that span! While Goff's status as a zero in the run game doesn't help, he's still posted top-15 fantasy numbers in each of the past four seasons—besting his low-end QB2 ADP price tag every year along the way.

Jahmyr Gibbs has worked as fantasy's RB8, RB2 and RB3 in PPR points per game since 2023. The electric 24-year-old talent has averaged an absurd 24.4 PPR points per game in 14 career contests with David Montgomery (now on the Texans) playing under a third of the offense's snaps. Gibbs is Fantasy Life's consensus 1.01 pick over Bijan Robinson thanks to the tiebreaker of the Lions' scoring upside being better than the Falcons. Isiah Pacheco profiles as a quality late-round handcuff.

Amon-Ra St. Brown has worked as fantasy's WR4 in PPR points per game during each of the past three seasons. He's ranked as just that

ahead of 2026. The bigger question is whether boom-or-bust speedster Jameson Williams is more like the man we saw in Weeks 1-10 (10.9 PPR points per game, WR41) or Weeks 11-18 (15.2, WR13). TE Sam LaPorta notably hit the injured reserve for the latter stretch. Isaac TeSlaa has a penchant for making some SWEET catches, but limited targets make him a non-viable weekly fantasy option.

Injuries and emergencies from Gibbs and Williams limited LaPorta's ability to replicate his awesome 2023 rookie campaign (14.1 PPR points per game, TE3) in 2024 (10.9, TE9) and 2025 (11.9, TE7). Still good, albeit not exactly the sort of difference-making numbers to go out of your way for in the earlier rounds of any given fantasy draft.

→ Utilization Notes

Jahmyr Gibbs erupted for 22.6 points per game with a 94 Utilization Score over the final eight games in 2025 after Dan Campbell took over as the playcaller. Over that span, he played 75% of the snaps, handling 66% of attempts and notching a 21% target share on a 65% route participation rate. Gibbs is an elite dual-threat RB on a high-scoring offense. With David Montgomery traded to the Texans, Isiah Pacheco will spell Gibbs in Drew Petzing's offense, but the Lions have turned the page to Gibbs RB1 SZN. He should be the No. 1 pick in fantasy drafts.

Jordan Love ranks among the league's very best QBs in EPA per dropback (+0.21, 3rd) and yards per attempt (7.6, 8th) since taking over

in 2023. He's a really good quarterback! Unfortunately, less rushing production in 2024 (15.6 fantasy points per game, QB17) and 2025 (15.7, QB21) has prevented Love from returning to 2023 fantasy heights (18.8, QB6).

Josh Jacobs has scored 31 touchdowns in 34 games with the Packers, returning RB8 and RB10 production in PPR points per game along the way. The latter mark would have been better if not for a Week 11 knee injury that severely limited him down the stretch. Jacobs remains a safe bet for low-end RB1 fantasy production as the engine of an offense that ranks eighth in scoring since 2023. MarShawn Lloyd is theoretically the next-man-up after Emanuel Wilson signed with the Seahawks.

Christian Watson profiles as the leader of this Romeo Doubs-less receiver room: He trails only Alec Pierce in yards per target since 2024 and was fantasy's WR19 in PPR points per game in 2025. The Packers' reluctance to use Jayden Reed in multi-TE formations doesn't help his quest to get back to 2023-2024 heights. Matthew Golden saved his best for last (4-84-1 in the Wild Card

Round), but it's tough to be excited about Year 2 considering the brutal history of healthy Round 1 receivers who fail to gain 500 yards as a rookie.

Tucker Kraft's 14.7 PPR points per game in 2025 ranked fourth at the position! Unfortunately, a torn ACL ended Kraft's season in early November, adding a cloud to his 2026 projection. News of a full recovery and full-go status in training camp could help Kraft rise into Fantasy Life's consensus top-5 tight ends.

→ Utilization Notes

Christian Watson returned from his late-2024 ACL tear in Week 8 of 2025, averaging 13 fantasy points, including the NFL playoffs. The former Round 2 NFL Draft pick has notched 2.41 and 2.26 yards per route run marks—WR1 territory—over the last two seasons. Now Romeo Doubs is gone. Watson has primarily operated as a deep threat, but has flashed the ability to win at all levels of the field. Should Matthew Golden's Year 1 struggles continue, don't be surprised to see a more versatile role for Watson in 2026. He is a mid-range WR3 with WR2 upside.

While CJ Stroud's 4-INT stinker against the Patriots wasn't exactly a great way to end last season, he did improve across most meaningful efficiency metrics from his down 2024. Unfortunately, that still produced just 14.9 fantasy points per game (QB23)—this low ceiling isn't worth chasing in fantasy land aside from in superflex/two-QB formats.

New RB1 David Montgomery hasn't really had a bad season ... ever. The man averaged 1,212 total yards and 7.5 touchdowns in four seasons in mostly bad Bears offenses before going for 3,156 total yards and 33 scores during his last three years in Detroit. There's potential here for 15-20 touches per game on a team with the sort of dominant defense that

could lead to many fantasy-friendly leading game scripts. Woody Marks is the next-man-up and could flirt with a fantasy-relevant pass-game role, but his standing as one of the league's worst running backs in most meaningful efficiency metrics as a rookie wasn't ideal.

Nico Collins has cleared 1,000 yards in three consecutive seasons despite missing nine combined games. Fantasy Life projections believe in the 27-year-old talent replicating that success: Collins' 1,266 receiving yards projection is the sixth-highest mark at the position. There isn't too steep of target competition elsewhere. It'd make sense if Jayden Higgins, Jaylin Noel and a returning Tank Dell rotate in the other two starting receiver spots. Here's to hoping the latter speedster manages to regain his pre-injury explosiveness and emerge as a late-round gem in fantasy land.

Dalton Schultz has posted TE11, TE28 and TE15 finishes in PPR points per game in three seasons in Houston. Fireworks are unlikely—the 30-year-old veteran's yards-per-catch

marks have decreased in each of the past two seasons—but another borderline TE1 finish is possible at a VERY late-round price.

→ Utilization Notes

Nico Collins has delivered three consecutive top-10 finishes in PPR points per game. Over that span, he ranks seventh with 16.6 points per contest. His underlying data backs that up: 26% targets per route (10th) and 2.75 yards per route (2nd). Still well within his prime at age 27, Collins offers a strong floor and high-end WR1 upside. His primary nemesis has been the injury bug, missing at least two games each of the last three years. In early drafts, he is one of the best picks available at the Round 2-3 turn.

Daniel Jones averaged career-best marks in pretty much every efficiency metric out there prior to 2025's season-ending Achilles injury.

Reduced mobility won't help matters in fantasy land, but Jones (again) stands out as a very solid mid-to-late-round option in superflex/two-QB formats.

Jonathan Taylor averaged 27 PPR points per game (RB1) in Weeks 1-10 ... and 12.6 (RB23) in Weeks 12-18 once Jones was injured. Good news: Taylor set career-high marks in receptions (46) and receiving yards (378), elevating the floor in full-PPR formats. He's locked in as a consensus top-5 back ahead of 2026. DJ Giddens is the next man up, but it'd likely be a committee situation should JT miss any time.

The decision to trade Michael Pittman to Pittsburgh condenses this WR room around \$116M man Alec Pierce and shifty slot maven Josh Downs. Credit to Pierce for leading the NFL in yards per catch and per target in each of the past two seasons, but Downs and TE Tyler Warren project as the more likely beneficiaries from Pittman's vacated underneath-and-intermediate targets. Caleb's older brother is a fun late-round breakout candidate: Downs is still just 24 years young and has flashed elite separation ability during his three-year career. Nick Westbrook-Ikhine isn't expected to supply much

fantasy goodness as the likely No. 3 WR, but that time he caught 9 touchdowns in 2024 sure was wild!

Like Taylor, Warren's breakout season was undone by Jones' season-ending injury. Before the Colts' Week 11 bye, Warren averaged 13.6 PPR points per game (TE6). After? Well, he posted 7.2 (TE26). The return of Jones and exclusion of Pittman suddenly has Warren looking at a salivating situation ahead of 2026—he's Fantasy Life's consensus TE5 and the disparity in ADP between him and Colston Loveland seems awfully wide.

→ Utilization Notes

Josh Downs may never earn a full-time complement of routes in a run-balanced Colts offense, but the door is open with Michael Pittman Jr. traded to the Steelers. The 2023 Round 3 NFL Draft pick ranks 24th in targets per route (24%) and 41st in yards per route (1.75) of all WRs with at least 500 routes over the last three seasons. Indianapolis added Nick Westbrook-Ikhine, who isn't much of an obstacle as a receiver, but the team might prefer his run blocking on base downs. Downs is a WR4 with WR2 upside if playing time breaks his way.

Trevor Lawrence struggled during the first half of 2025, but caught

fire late and averaged a whopping 23 fantasy points per game following the team's Week 9 bye—the highest mark among any QB! Don't expect Lawrence to score 9 rushing touchdowns again in 2026, but the 26-year-old talent is firmly in the low-end QB1 conversation with the upside for much more.

The departure of Travis Etienne should produce a newfound one-two punch in Jacksonville between Bhayshul Tuten and Chris Rodriguez. Rising second-year back LeQuint Allen also figures to factor into the equation on passing downs. While C-Rod is great in short-yardage situations and has familiarity with HC Liam Coen dating back to their time together at Kentucky, Tuten looks like the de facto lead back and should boast superior upside thanks to his big-time speed and pass-catching ability. There are serious Year 2 Chase Brown vibes here for Tuten.

Travis Hunter is reportedly expected to be a full-time corner, part-time receiver in 2026. This would make sense with Jakobi Meyers, Brian

Thomas and Parker Washington each being most people's ideas of #good wide receivers. Our most applicable final five-game stretch with the latter three receivers healthy featured Washington leading the way in target share (27%) and PPR points (19.1!). The relative lack of clarity surrounding the pecking order makes each enticing clicks at their respective WR3-4 price tags, considering each has proven capable of supplying high-end upside with a featured role.

Brenton Strange averaged 11.1 PPR points per game (TE12) in Weeks 12-18 upon returning from a hip/quad injury. The 25-year-old talent is a dependable pass catcher who could provide top-10 upside should the touchdown gods really get on his side one of these years. Of course, that's the case for many mid-to-low-end TE2s like Strange.

→ Utilization Notes

Parker Washington erupted after taking over the WR3 duties when Travis Hunter went down in Week 7 of 2025. Over nine healthy games, Washington notched an 83% route participation rate with a 25% target share, averaging 17.1 fantasy points. He ranked 16th in yards per route at 2.08. We saw Chris Godwin thrive in a similar role in Liam Coen's offense in 2024 in Tampa Bay. With Hunter likely moving to a full-time role on defense in 2026, Washington should remain the starting slot WR and could be a steal in fantasy drafts. Amon-Ra St. Brown vibes.

Patrick Mahomes is tentatively expected to be ready to go for Week 1 following 2025's season-

ending ACL injury. Hopefully, the return of former OC Eric Bieniemy gets this passing attack back to operating with elite efficiency, as it's unlikely we see Mahomes reach the same rushing heights (career-high 30.1 rushing yards per game in 2024) less than 12 months removed from major knee surgery.

Kenneth Walker signed a three-year, \$43.05 million deal to work as Kansas City's new workhorse back. The Super Bowl MVP has been a top-2 RB in tackles avoided per carry in each of the past three seasons and provides a much-needed boost of explosiveness to this backfield. We probably shouldn't overthink 300+ touches for a high-end talent like Walker in an offense led by Patrick Mahomes.

Rashee Rice isn't facing suspension risk ahead of 2026 and is in play as a top-6 fantasy receiver. While his route tree won't be confused with the top real-life talents at the position, his 18.8 PPR points per game in 2025 were the fifth-highest mark at the position. Xavier Worthy is an interesting post-hype bounceback candidate considering he was forced to play the entirety of 2025 with a torn labrum and ankle injury. Still, Tyquan

Thornton is fresh off leading the NFL in yards per catch and hinders Worthy's potential to emerge as the offense's go-to deep-ball threat.

Travis Kelce looked to have a bit more juice than we've seen in recent years on his way to working as fantasy's TE9 in PPR points per game in 2025. Getting a full season from Rice won't help Kelce rack up his familiar low-aDOT targets, but the future Hall of Famer still possesses triple-digit target potential—not a bad deal at a TE2 price tag in fantasy land.

→ Utilization Notes

Rashee Rice has had his share of off-field problems, but the NFL is not seeking a 2026 suspension. When it comes to fantasy production, Rice has been elite. Over the last three seasons, including the NFL playoffs, Rice has averaged 18 fantasy points in 21 games in which he played at least 65% of pass plays. Of players with at least 500 routes over that span, he ranks fifth in points per route (0.55) and ninth in yards per route (2.31). Patrick Mahomes is recovering from a late-season ACL tear, but Rice is a mid-range WR1 with Mahomes.

The NFL Draft's No. 1 overall pick is fresh off one of the best college

seasons ... ever. Of course, Mendoza was playing with one of America's best rosters at Indiana, something that is NOT the case in Las Vegas. Throw in the likelihood of Kirk Cousins starting the first chunk of the season, and Mendoza profiles as more of a late-round streamer option in fantasy land ahead of Year 1.

Ashton Jeanty's rookie season was marred by life behind the NFL's worst offensive line, but flashes were still evident in blowup performances against the Bears (155 yards, 3 TD) and Texans (188 yards, 2 TD). Klint Kubiak deployed an evenly split two-back committee with the Seahawks, but Jeanty sure looks like THE running back, y'all, based on this current depth chart. Even with the addition of rookie RB Mike Washington, a better run scheme could be enough to turn Jeanty's disappointing rookie-year RB16 finish into top-10 goodness.

Tre Tucker and Jalen Nailor profile as the leaders of this WR room, which is just such a ridiculous

sentence to write out. Kubiak has led run-heavy offenses during each of his last two stops in Seattle and New Orleans, and whoever winds up leading this group will still be the offense's No. 2 pass-game option behind Brock Bowers. Tucker deserves top billing, but expecting more than boom-or-bust WR4 production feels like wishful thinking.

Bowers' encore campaign was unfortunately undone by a lingering knee injury, bad QB play and a scheme that was rough enough to warrant OC Chip Kelly getting fired in November. And yet, Bowers still somehow finished as fantasy's TE2 in PPR points per game. Don't be surprised if Bowers reminds everyone just how special he is inside an improved offense. He's fantasy's consensus TE2 and in play as a Round 2-3 option.

> Utilization Notes

Ashton Jeanty averaged 14.3 fantasy points as a rookie, finishing as the RB15. That is a respectable number—on par with Bijan Robinson's 14.4 in 2023. And Jeanty proved capable of handling a heavy workload. He ranked second in rush share (78%) and seventh in target share (14%), resulting in the No. 7 Utilization Score (84). Historically, RBs in that range averaged 16.4 points. The Raiders don't project as a high-scoring offense, but the addition of Tyler Linderbaum at center and an upgrade at playcaller with Klint Kubiak are positives. Jeanty projects as a low-end RB1 in 2026.

Justin Herbert's QB10 finish in fantasy points per game last season was heavily aided by a career-high 498 rushing yards. One of just 10 QBs with multiple career seasons averaging north of 22 fantasy points

per game, it'd make sense if better offensive line health, combined with an improved scheme courtesy of new OC Mike McDaniel, leads to bigger and better things for Herbert.

Omarion Hampton flashed some big-time upside during the first month of his rookie season before a Grade 3 high-ankle sprain doomed the rest of the year. Good news: Hampton's combination of high-end volume (77% snap rate Weeks 1-4), youth, explosiveness and receiving ability creates a fantasy-friendly profile inside an offense with top-10 scoring upside. Expect a committee of some sorts between speedy ex-Raven Keaton Mitchell and Kimani Vidal if Hampton misses time.

Ladd McConkey was less productive in 2025 (66-789-6 receiving) compared to 2024 (82-1,149-7) despite seeing only 6 fewer targets. Not ideal, although McConkey does profile as a solid bounceback candidate considering the departure of Keenan Allen and potential for Ladd to seize fantasy-friendly targets as McDaniel's primary motion-at-the-snap receiver. Quentin Johnston profiles as the boom-or-bust WR4 that he's largely been during the past two seasons. 2025 second-round pick Tre Harris should step into a starting role,

though he could have competition for snaps and targets from speedy rookie Brenen Thompson.

Oronde Gadsden averaged a ridiculous 17.9 PPR points per game in Weeks 6-9, but his playing time noticeably dropped after LT Joe Alt was lost for the season. Good news: A pair of healthy tackles in 2026 should allow Gadsden to get back to functioning as more of a full-time receiver. There's some serious upside here for someone priced as a low-end TE1.

→ Utilization Notes

Omarion Hampton saw much of his rookie campaign wiped out by injuries, playing on over 50% of the snaps in only seven contests. Still, in those games, he averaged 16.2 fantasy points. The 2025 first-rounder has the frame to carry a heavy workload, and while he won't be the focal point of a passing game, his 18% targets per route suggest he is a capable checkdown. The return of tackles Joe Alt and Rashawn Slater, plus the switch to Mike McDaniel as the playcaller, are positives. Kimani Vidal and Keaton Mitchell could rotate, but Hampton projects as a low-end RB1.

Matthew Stafford threw for an NFL-high 4,707 yards and 46 touchdowns in 2025. The Rams didn't actually throw the ball much more than usual near the goal line—the spike came from 46.6% of Stafford's inside-the-10 pass attempts going for scores, up from 27.9% in 2024. Natural regression could push the reigning MVP's fantasy production closer to what we saw from 2021-2024 (15.7 fantasy points per game, QB19) as opposed to 2025 (20.6, QB3).

Kyren Williams' workload dropped considerably in 2025 (17.4 touches per game) compared to 2023 and 2024 (21.8), but his efficiency improved, and he scored 13 touchdowns inside the league's top-ranked scoring offense. Greedy fantasy managers always want more touches. Just realize

Williams will be tough to keep out of the weekly RB1 conversation with similar volume and scoring upside in 2026. Amidst this, Blake Corum carried FLEX-worthy standalone value down the stretch and arguably the single-most valuable handcuff in fantasy football entering next season.

Puka Nacua is WR1 in career PPR points per game ... in NFL history. He's a consensus top-3 receiver and top-5 overall pick in fantasy land. And then there's Davante Adams, who worked as fantasy's WR9 (15.9 PPR points per game) before missing the end of the season with a hamstring injury. 33-year-old receivers don't make a habit of balling out in fantasy land. Though realize double-digit touchdown upside remains on the table for the future Hall of Famer.

Rams tight ends collectively scored the second-most PPR points in the league, but their committee usage led to Colby Parkinson (TE22) being the top scorer. Rising second-year talent Terrance Ferguson probably possesses the most raw upside of the group, but it's unlikely any party involved receives enough consistent

volume to be overly dependable in fantasy land.

→ Utilization Notes

Kyren Williams averaged 21.4, 17.4 and 15.7 fantasy points from 2023 to 2025, notching a top-12 season each year. In 2023 and 2024, Williams was the only game in town, with astronomical snap shares of 83% and 87%. Last season, that fell to 63% from Week 7 through the NFL Playoffs with Blake Corum carving out a larger role in Year 2. This doesn't make Williams a bad fantasy asset—he plays in one of the best offenses—but we should adjust expectations. Williams projects as a mid-range RB2, and his floor is lower if Corum's role expands.

Small-sample size be damned: Malik Willis has looked GOOD on his way to leading the NFL in pretty much any premier aerial efficiency metric over the past two seasons.

And yet, it's his rushing prowess that makes him a premier late-round quarterback option this season. 31 of 34 QBs with 100+ rush attempts in a season have returned top-12 fantasy per-game numbers since 2014—that's a 91% hit rate!

De'Von Achane is essentially the last man standing from the Mike McDaniel Dolphins. The good news is that OC Bobby Slowik was on the staff in 2025, so ideally Achane's fantasy-friendly pass-game role doesn't go anywhere. The bigger potential problem is going from a statue QB like Tua Tagovailoa to a dual-threat talent like Willis—it's possible we see checkdowns replaced with scrambles, and the quick-footed signal-caller also figures to be more involved as a rusher near the goal line. Even with these newfound concerns, Achane is Fantasy Life's consensus RB6. Jaylen Wright and Ollie Gordon would likely form a committee should Achane miss any time.

The NFL's least-proven receiver room should mostly revolve around a pair of Day 2 rookies in Caleb Douglas and Chris Bell. Douglas was a draft reach, and Bell is coming off a late-season ACL tear. Keep an eye on his training camp participation. Elsewhere, Malik Washington has flashed some solid

YAC ability, but has been used in more of a gadget capacity early in his career—as evidenced by his 5.4-yard aDOT.

Greg Dulcich quietly posted top-5 numbers in yards (2.37) and targets (23.4%) per route run at the position last season. Of course, his 10-game, 33-target sample isn't too big, but the 26-year-old does possess a fantasy-friendly receiving skill set inside an offense with probably the least target competition in the entire NFL.

→ Utilization Notes

De'Von Achane will get his opportunities with Tyreek Hill and Jaylen Waddle gone. However, defenses could key on the Year 4 RB. That could drive down efficiency and the overall state of the offense hurts Achane's TD upside. With a creative scheme, we could see Malik Willis' rushing ability help open up running lanes. But that is a question mark with Bobby Slowik. And Willis' mobility cuts both ways. He boasts the No. 1 scramble rate over the last three seasons (19%), which could mean fewer checkdowns to the RBs. Miami's offensive concerns push Achane down to borderline RB1 territory.

Kyler Murray is the frontrunner to win this alleged competition. While 2025's "soft benching" for Jacoby Brissett featured Murray

putting up career-worst passing numbers, the pint-sized speedster has posted high-end real-life—and especially fantasy—numbers on multiple occasions during his seven-year career. Murray joins Malik Willis as the top two later-round dual-threat options in fantasy.

Aaron Jones and Jordan Mason split snaps and touches for a middling Vikings offense in '25. However, both reached a 70%+ snap rate at different points of the season, indicating something close to a fantasy-friendly workhorse role is just one injury away to either from appearing. Of course, Mason profiles as the safer bet when considering age (27 vs. 31) and injury history. Credit to the ex-49er for ranking sixth in the NFL in rushing yards over expected per carry last season (+1.02, Next-Gen Stats).

Justin Jefferson's brutal 2025 featured career-worst counting and efficiency numbers in virtually every meaningful statistic. Overall, he finished as fantasy's WR32 in PPR points per game. At the risk of jinxing things, it shouldn't be able to get any worse—and overall WR1 heights

certainly remain on the table should Kyler get back to partying like it's 2021. Sidekick Jordan Addison also had a rough time adjusting to the JJ McCarthy experience; the 24-year-old talent posted upside WR3 numbers in 2023 (WR31) and 2024 (WR25) alike and offers sneaky-solid late-round bounceback potential.

TJ Hockenson was viewed as a likely cap casualty this offseason, but a restructured contract will keep him wearing purple and gold in 2026. Like everyone else in Minnesota, 2025 was rough, but we are only two years removed from Hockenson finishing as fantasy's TE2 in PPR points per game. Last season Hockenson carried a TE6 ADP in August—this year he's going outside the position's top-20 options.

→ Utilization Notes

Justin Jefferson averaged just 11.9 fantasy points in 2025—almost unfathomable for an alpha still earning a 31% target share (4th). The culprit was Minnesota's QB room. After averaging 277 (1st) and 258 (5th) passing yards per game in 2023–24, the Vikings collapsed to 189 (30th) in 2025. So, Minnesota signed Kyler Murray to a one-year, \$1.3M prove-it deal. Murray averaged 220 yards over three seasons—below league average—but paired with Kevin O'Connell, there's hope he can stabilize the offense. At 27, Jefferson offers top-3 WR upside, but the QB uncertainty makes him a mid-range WR1 with some risk.

Drake Maye's 2025 breakout featured him scoring more fantasy points per game than anyone other than Josh Allen. This was thanks to a mix of high-end passing efficiency (NFL-best 72% completion rate,

8.9 yards per attempt) and all sorts of rushing upside (6th most fantasy points from rushing among QBs). The ceiling is the moon with a new-and-improved wide receiver room.

Last season, Rhamondre Stevenson rather easily out-touched TreVeyon Henderson (232 vs. 193) in 18 games together (including playoffs). This grew in the postseason, as Stevenson doubled up Henderson (70 vs. 35) while playing 71% of the offense's snaps. Henderson proved capable of booming when given the (Roman) reins of the backfield with Stevenson injured (RB16, RB4, RB3 Weeks 9-11), but expecting a non-injury-induced takeover seems like wishful thinking, particularly with Henderson struggling to lock down a featured pass-game role as a rookie.

The Pats were happy to rotate up to five receivers during any given week in 2025, and this feels like the case again in 2026—behind re-energized longtime stud No. 1 WR AJ Brown, who was expected to be traded to the Pats when we published. Fire up AJB as an upside WR1 with something to prove while catching passes from potentially the best *passing* QB of his career. Romeo Doubs' shiny new contract

should earn him No. 2 duties, but there's a lot of additional competition that could limit the involved ceiling.

Old dogs can learn new tricks: Hunter Henry gained a career-high 768 yards in 2025 and also found the end zone seven times. The resulting TE13 finish in PPR points per game was good value for such a late-round option. There's similar cost-reward upside on the table ahead of 2026—especially with Austin Hooper (85 targets in 2024-2025) now in Atlanta.

→ Utilization Notes

TreVeyon Henderson averaged 8.1 fantasy points in 18 games with a healthy Rhamondre Stevenson, including the NFL Playoffs. In those contests, he played 34% of snaps, handled 36% of attempts and garnered a 28% route participation rate. But Henderson flashed explosive upside, averaging 5.1 yards per carry. He delivered an electric 21 points per game in four games without Stevenson. The 2025 second-rounder should challenge for more opportunities in Year 2, but the range of outcomes is wide. Henderson projects as a high-end RB3 with genuine RB1 upside if he can wrestle the lead role away from Stevenson.

Tyler Shough took over in Week 9 and worked as the QB12 in fantasy points per game the rest of the way. Shough's sneaky

athleticism—get it? because he's white—helped him average 3.33 fantasy points per game from rushing. That was right there with Caleb Williams and even Lamar Jackson. With the addition of WR Jordyn Tyson at No. 8 in the NFL Draft, Shough fits the profile of a quality late-round QB.

The Saints have 52 million reasons to feature Travis Etienne as their lead back. Credit to the ex-Jaguar for racking up 1,441, 1,484 and 1,399 total yards with an average of 10 touchdowns in three seasons when he was healthy enough to suit up for all 17 games. Still, Alvin Kamara—should he remain with the team—could certainly lead to more of an annoying backfield split than fantasy managers might prefer. Ultimately, ETN is the favorite to lead the way, but his top-20 ADP could look rough should this wind up being anything close to an evenly split committee.

Chris Olave's breakout 2025 campaign featured a sizzling 100-1,163-9 receiving line and more PPR points during the fantasy playoffs than any receiver not named Puka

Nacua. Few players combine Olave's mix of youth (26 in June), proven efficiency (WR17 in yards per route run since 2022) and projected volume (141 targets). A healthy Tyson projects for triple-digit targets and is a great complement to Olave.

Juwan Johnson set career-best marks in receptions (77) and yards (889) during 2025, as HC Kellen Moore proved willing to consistently feature the 29-year-old veteran as an every-down player for the first time in his career. Rookie Oscar Delp might have a bright future, but at least for 2026 Johnson (again) profiles as the sort of player with borderline TE1 upside at a low-end TE2 cost.

→ Utilization Notes

Chris Olave finished as the WR6 in fantasy, averaging 16.8 fantasy points. Under Kellen Moore, Olave shifted more to the slot (42%), where he created matchup nightmares for interior defenders. Tyler Shough emerged as a viable passer, averaging 251 yards, after taking over in Week 9. Olave boasted a 29% target share and 126 air yards per game in eight contests with Shough. He was the No. 4 WR over that span with 18.8 PPG and an 88 Utilization Score (3rd). Olave's talent profile has always had the underpinnings of a borderline WR1—in line with his 2026 projection.

Jaxson Dart flashed some tantalizing dual-threat ability as a rookie: Only Josh Allen (8.2) averaged more fantasy points per game from rushing than Dart (7.2) among all quarterbacks. That

mindset could be curbed under a new coaching staff—especially after Dart spent so much time in the injury tent himself—but there's an awfully high ceiling here should everything click with a healthier supporting cast.

Cam Skattebo is expected to be full go by training camp following last season's season-ending lower-body injury. Wild but true: It's not ideal to suffer a dislocated ankle, fractured fibula, and ruptured deltoid ligament, but learned doctors believe the lack of knee-related issues could help Skattebo resemble his usual bulldog self sooner rather than later. This reality makes him an enticing option at low-end RB2 cost considering Skattebo worked as fantasy's RB9 in PPR points per game last season.

Here's to hoping Malik Nabers is feeling like his old self: The 22-year-old trails only Puka Nacua and Rashee Rice in targets per route run over the last two seasons—there's overall WR1 upside here with good health and improved quarterback play. Darnell Mooney, Darius Slayton and Malachi Fields figure to compete for No. 2 WR duties, although the offense's real No. 2 pass-game option might just play tight end.

Isaiah Likely's \$40 million contract makes him the sixth-highest-paid player at the position. HC John Harbaugh has stated, "I'm certain he's going to be able to put up the numbers, the stats ... that wasn't the thing in Baltimore because of the supporting cast." Likely possesses plenty of YAC ability and showed off a penchant for getting open on the scramble drill—something that could mesh well with Dart. It's easy to argue Likely has the highest best-case ceiling of any mid-tier TE2.

→ Utilization Notes

Jaxson Dart took over in Week 4 and ranked second in designed rush rate (13%), fourth in scramble rate (9%) and second in designed rushes inside the 5-yard line (33%)—averaging 19.9 fantasy points as the QB8. A Week 10 concussion cooled his designed attempts to 7%, but his scramble rate held at 10%, and he still accounted for 25% of rushing attempts inside the 5. Dart finished as a QB1 as a rookie without Malik Nabers. With John Harbaugh arriving to maximize his rushing upside, the dual-threat QB projects as a low-end QB1 with high-end upside.

Geno Smith led the NFL in interceptions (17) and sacks taken (55) in 2025. Of course, the Raiders' miserable offensive line and scheme didn't help, and Smith is just one year removed from posting average-to-above-average numbers in most passing efficiency metrics. Are the Jets likely to bring out the best in Geno? No, but you could imagine what it'd be like if they did.

Breece Hall's 1,415 total yards and 5 touchdowns were good for only RB21 status in PPR points per game, but the 25-year-old did post an 8.6% explosive rush rate—tied with Jahmyr Gibbs for the eighth-best mark in the league. New OC Frank Reich is no stranger to force feeding his RB1 the football—there's RB1 upside here if (big if) the Jets get a return to form from Geno and close to elite play from their young stud tackles. Braelon Allen would likely lead a committee next to Isaiah Davis should Hall miss any time.

Last season Garrett Wilson did his best DJ Moore impression with a 36-395-4 receiving line in six games catching passes from Justin Fields prior to his season-ending knee injury. 16.2 PPR points per game! WR10! If 2026 Geno can just be better than 2025 Fields (spoiler: he is), it's within Wilson's range of potential outcomes to ball the hell out. After Wilson, Adonai Mitchell will battle for targets alongside rookie Omar Cooper. Fantasy Life projections have Cooper out-targeting Mitchell, 95-61.

Rookie first-rounder Kenyon Sadiq has some serious YAC juice and gives this offense a newfound seam-stretching threat. Still, Mason Taylor is a competent enough inline option to potentially make this far more of a committee situation than fantasy managers would prefer.

> Utilization Notes

Garrett Wilson averaged 18.6 PPG over the first five games of the 2025 regular season before suffering a hyperextended knee in Week 6. In the two prior years, he averaged 14.7 PPG (WR20) and 12.5 PPG (WR33). His underlying data points to a solid WR2 talent. His career TPRR of 24% is WR2-worthy, but his career YPRR of 1.70 is in WR3 territory. It's hard to put too much weight into his YPRR considering his quarterbacks. While Geno Smith regressed in 2025, he averaged 242 and 254 passing yards in 2023-24. Wilson is a mid-range WR2 heading into 2026.

Jalen Hurts' main culprit for last season's career-worst fantasy production was a five-year low in rushing touchdowns (8). However,

the Eagles still used the tush push tactic on 89% of their trips to the 1-yard line; the difference was this sputtering offense had only 10 total plays from the doorstep. Reminder: Hurts is the QB2 in fantasy points per game since '21.

Saquon Barkley's down 2025 campaign featured his yards per carry falling from 5.8 to 4.1. The offense's uninventive scheme, a midseason groin injury, and Barkley simply not being himself following 2024's gargantuan workload are potential excuses. Either way: The longtime stud RB still profiles for a fantasy-friendly three-down role and is at least far cheaper to acquire in fantasy land this time around. Tank Bigsby is the next-man-up behind Barkley and is a great late-round handcuff option.

AJ Brown is still on the team as of this publishing, amid trade rumors. DeVonta Smith could be a sleeping giant here: One of the things Matthew Berry heard at the combine was that the Eagles believe Smith *"hasn't reached his full potential and has 'another gear' he can get to. That, if Smith were given the same kind of target share as Jaxon Smith-Njigba, he could have that kind of year."* Makai Lemon was selected 20th overall in the NFL Draft, and

will be a factor in this offense. There's enough of a talent/volume upside scenario to warrant a later-round dart.

Dallas Goedert scored 13 touchdowns in 16 games last season ... and all but three came from inside the 10-yard line. Otherwise, the 31-year-old veteran averaged a career-low 9.9 yards per catch and had his fewest yards per game (39.4) since his rookie season. Goedert is a (very) touchdown-dependent low-end TE1.

→ Utilization Notes

Saquon Barkley registered his best season in Year 1 with the Eagles in 2024, averaging 22 points per game, but that fell to 14.5 in Year 2. However, he battled knee, groin, back and stinger injuries, and the offensive line was banged up for the majority of the 2025 regular season. Barkley's Utilization Score of 83 ranked seventh. His historical comps averaged 16.2 points. He will be 29.6 and faces the challenge of a quarterback who is a touchdown hog, but the Eagles project as a high-quality run-oriented team. That makes Barkley a strong mid-range RB1 worthy of a Round 2 pick in fantasy football.

Aaron Rodgers—still unsigned as of this writing—remains capable of slinging the pill with the benefit of a clean pocket; the problem is the mobility is long gone, and the old man (understandably) isn't too keen on hanging onto the ball too long at the risk of taking hits. Credit for leading the Steelers to their best scoring offense rank (15th) in the post-Big Ben era, but there's no semblance of fantasy upside for the soon-to-be 43-year-old future Hall of Famer in the year 2026.

This profiles as a two-headed committee between incumbent starter Jaylen Warren and ex-Cowboy/Panther Rico Dowdle, who HC Mike McCarthy once described as "a bowling ball full of butcher knives." Dowdle is a threat to split, or even take over, early-down

and goal-line work, but Warren's PPR ceiling gets a boost after Kenneth Gainwell (73 receptions in 2025) took his talents to Tampa Bay. Both Warren and Dowdle profile as weekly FLEX options with contingent RB1 upside should the other miss time.

DK Metcalf was the WR20 in PPR points per game last season and has the paycheck of a No. 1 WR, although it's possible ex-Colt Michael Pittman Jr. is deployed closer to the line of scrimmage and accordingly competes for the team lead in targets. Credit to Pittman for posting PPR WR24, WR22 and WR14 fantasy finishes in 2021-2023 before dealing with a fractured back in 2024 and a literal Grandpa in 2025. Bernard should start from Day 1, but he's No. 3 in this low-flying offense.

Pat Freiermuth's full-time role evaporated in 2025 due to the presence of Darnell Washington and Arthur Smith's longtime BFF Jonnu Smith. The absence of the latter could help breathe some life into Freiermuth's fantasy stock, but we'd still be looking at the probable No. 4 target in a meh passing game.

→ Utilization Notes

Jaylen Warren has a new backfield mate in Rico Dowdle. Unfortunately, it feels like we will never experience the full-time Warren era. Early reports indicate that Dowdle, who played under Mike McCarthy in Dallas, will be highly active on base running downs, where he thrived for the Panthers in 2025. Still, Warren projects as the better fantasy asset, given his passing-down ability. His 1.45, 1.44, and 1.58 yards per route data align with historical top-6 RB1s. Warren projects as a mid-range RB3 with borderline RB1 upside should he ever handle a full-time workload. Same as it ever was.

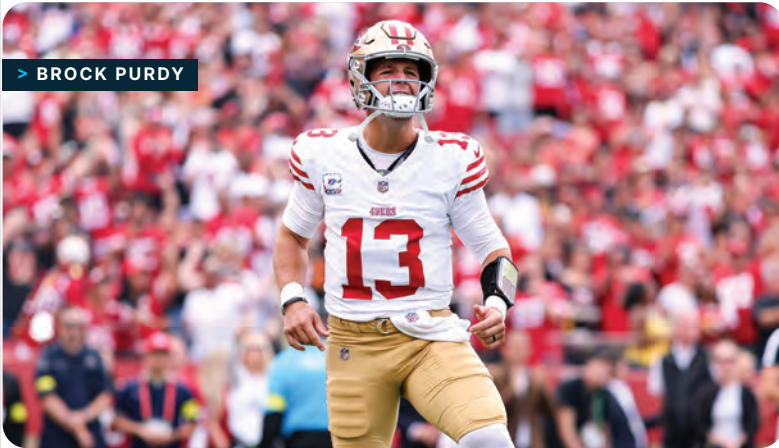

Brock Purdy ranks first in the Super Bowl era in career yards per attempt and passer rating. He's the QB6 in fantasy points

per game since 2023. The system and environment have helped, but in recent years the team's top playmakers have missed plenty of time. Purdy is a screaming buy at his borderline QB1 price tag in fantasy land.

Christian McCaffrey has finished as a top-3 fantasy RB in five of the last eight seasons. The concern is that the 30-year-old is coming off an insane 450 touches, and HC Kyle Shanahan has stated this offseason that CMC "needs some help." That said: Good luck ranking five RBs ahead of McCaffrey. Either way, third-round rookie Kaelon Black suddenly profiles as one of fantasy's better handcuff options after Brian Robinson departed for Atlanta during free agency.

Mike Evans' injury-riddled 2025 featured career-worst numbers in pretty much every statistic. The glass-half-full bounceback scenario for the soon-to-be 33-year-old revolves around marketable upgrades in the QB, scheme and volume departments. Failure for Evans to function as his typical alpha self would put more on the plate of third-year talent Ricky Pearsall, veteran Christian Kirk and No. 33 overall pick De'Zhaun Stribling. No parties here

are without risk; just realize Purdy and Shanahan have consistently produced one of the league's most efficient aerial attacks together.

George Kittle apparently has a chance to be ready for Week 1 despite suffering a torn Achilles last January. While it's certainly scary to bet on a 32-year-old tight end coming back from what's usually a devastating injury, the TE2 price tag does make Kittle a reasonable late-round dart. Credit to Jake Tonges for working as the TE9 in total PPR points in Weeks 1-6 with Kittle sidelined last season.

→ Utilization Notes

Mike Evans will be 33 and is coming off his worst fantasy season ever, averaging 10.6 fantasy points (WR41). He dealt with significant injuries last year, delivering 1.62 yards per route. Still, he was earning opportunities at a high rate with a 26% targets per route, and the 49ers decided to bet on the aging WR with a three-year \$42.5M contract. With San Francisco, Evans will play in a potential top-5 offense with an exceptional schemer in Kyle Shanahan. Evans projects as a mid-range WR2 with WR1 upside.

Super Bowl champion Sam Darnold (what a line to type out) ranks third in yards per attempt

(8.2) and fourth in success rate (52%) during the last two seasons, although the fantasy returns in 2025 (QB24 in fantasy points per game) weren't huge. Still, the Ghostbuster carries a reasonable borderline QB2 ADP ahead of a season that could feature him forced to throw more than ever considering this dire running back room.

Zach Charbonnet could be looking at a November or even December return following last January's torn ACL. Here's to hoping for a quick recovery. Jadarion Price was a surprise first-round pick, and he projects to have 246 total touches, far and away leading a backfield that also includes former Packer Emanuel Wilson and holdover George Holani.

Jaxon Smith-Njigba scored 21.2 PPR points per game (WR2) during his Offensive Player of the Year campaign. He's a top-5 fantasy pick so long as new OC Brian Fleury doesn't attempt to do his best Shane Waldron impression. Rashid Shaheed's shiny new \$51 million contract doesn't change the

fact that the ex-Saint averaged just 17.5 receiving yards in Seattle last season could be wishful thinking. It's more likely that Shaheed divides the small pie of remaining targets with Cooper Kupp (33 in June) and Tory Horton (recovering from season-ending shin injury).

The NFL's best short-yardage rusher in 1st-down percentage on 3rd/4th down with three or fewer yards to go: AJ Barner (87.5%)! The tush push aficionado and reigning TE21 in PPR points per game is a perfectly fine late-round dart at the position, although the team's wide receiver room—and TE Elijah Arroyo—make it tough to envision too big of a boom scenario given the lack of target upside at hand.

Jaxon Smith-Njigba followed up his second-half 2024 breakout, where he averaged 18.2 fantasy points from Week 9 onward, with a fantastic Year 3 campaign with 20.9. He led all WRs with a 36% target share and finished second in yards per route with a sterling 3.71. His 94 Utilization Score ranked second. Smith-Njigba expanded his game, winning from the outside (77% wide alignment) and upped his aDOT from 8.7 to 11.1. Sam Darnold ranked eighth in passing yards per game (238), and the target competition is low. JSN is a top-3 WR.

Baker Mayfield was receiving unironic MVP chants last October during his blistering start, but inaccuracy and injuries to many of

the offense's key playmakers made for a rough finish. Maybe Mayfield's history with new OC Zac Robinson brings out the best from the 31-year-old gunslinger—it's his eighth offensive coordinator entering Year 9! But either way, Mayfield's QB19 ADP is a pretty solid value for someone who has averaged 17.9 fantasy points per game since 2023 (QB10).

Bucky Irving's 2025 season was largely undone by Week 4 shoulder/foot injuries. It'd be great to assume that better health will get the rising third-year talent back to his tantalizing late-season 2024 heights. Although the decision to sign pass-game specialist Kenneth Gainwell and bring back short-yardage hammer Sean Tucker doesn't exactly make this a clean projection.

Emeka Egbuka worked as fantasy's WR9 in PPR points per game (16.1) in Weeks 1-10 ... and the WR72 (6.1) during his final eight games of the season. The 2025 first-rounder did play through a midseason hamstring injury and has less target competition than ever with Mike Evans out of the picture. Buy. Chris Godwin is an intriguing bounceback candidate who's an extra year removed from his devastating

2024 ankle injury—remember when he was fantasy's WR2 through the first seven games of 2024? No. 3 WR Jalen McMillan is more of a late-round best ball play than enticing re-draft target.

Cade Otton is a perfectly solid real-life tight end who ceases to exist in fantasy until several of the team's wide receivers get injured. Credit to Otton for making a habit of booming with his extra opportunities over the years, but yeah, he's nothing to overly concern yourself with until it's time to grind the ole waiver wire.

→ Utilization Notes

Emeka Egbuka cooled over the second half of 2025. But variance can play a role in small samples. Overall, he had a solid rookie season, averaging 11.4 fantasy points. His 1.74 YPRR (26th) and 24% TPRR (18th) were in the same ballpark as Tetairoa McMillan. The Round 1 NFL Draft pick will have less target competition with Mike Evans gone, and Zac Robinson will replace Josh Grizzard as offensive coordinator. When asked about Egbuka, Robinson said there is "nothing he can't do," noting his route tree, yards-after-catch ability and ball skills. Egbuka projects as a low-end WR2 with upside.

Silly “numbers” and “analytics” say Cam Ward was quite bad in 2025, but the No. 1 overall pick still managed to make a throw or two per week that showed off his tantalizing upside. New OC Brian Daboll was a bit of a mixed bag in New York, but the team's improvements in the playmakers department can only help what has been one of the league's most talent-barren offenses in recent years.

Tony Pollard is the incumbent lead RB, and plenty would be surprised to learn that he totaled 1,288 scrimmage yards and 5 TDs last season. Still, he's 28 and hasn't been as explosive in recent years. It wouldn't be surprising if Tyjae Spears continues to steal plenty of pass-down work, while former five-star recruit Nicholas Singleton

at least shows the physical tools to be more interesting than your typical Day 3 rookie.

Bad players don't earn 140 targets in back-to-back seasons ... and now the Titans have 70 million reasons to feed ex-Giant Wan'Dale Robinson—the reigning WR17 in PPR points per game—another fantasy-friendly target share. Of course, Carnell Tate was selected with the No. 4 pick in the draft and could feasibly lead the passing game from Day 1. There's also at least some reasonable optimism for a healthy Calvin Ridley. Expecting major fantasy-friendly fireworks from anyone here is probably wishful thinking, but credit to the Titans for making some serious improvements to this group ahead of 2026.

Chig Okonkwo took his talents to Washington in free agency, positioning rising second-year talent Gunnar Helm as the lead dog in Tennessee. The Texas product didn't exactly put up big counting numbers (44-357-2) as a rookie, but his underlying marks in yards (1.45, 24th) and especially targets per route

run (22.4%, 9th) were encouraging. Helm will be a preseason rankings riser should something close to a full-time role reveal itself.

→ Utilization Notes

Wan'Dale Robinson notched a career-high 13.6 PPG last season. He was always a strong target earner, but it was mostly of the dink-and-dunk variety. His aDOT was 5.1 in 2024. That jumped to 9.1 in 2025. That dramatically improved his air yards per game from 40 to 74. He reunites with Brian Daboll, who will call plays for the Titans in Year 2 for Cam Ward. His history with Daboll and a four-year \$70M contract with \$38M guaranteed suggests a near-full-time role. Robinson projects as a borderline WR3 who could outperform his draft position if Ward improves.

Jayden Daniels was one of just four rookie quarterbacks in NFL history to average 20+ fantasy points per game, but the encore produced just 16.3 (QB17). Of course, Daniels dealt with knee,

hamstring, and elbow injuries in the first nine weeks of the season and had his No. 1 WR active for only three of his seven starts. For the love of the fantasy gods—please stay healthy, Mr. Daniels.

The Commanders re-engineered their backfield this offseason by signing veterans Rachaad White and Jerome Ford, and drafting Kaytron Allen. Throw in the departure of Chris Rodriguez to Jacksonville, and Jacory Croskey-Merritt could feasibly have another decent chance of wrangling away a solid workload. Credit to the artist known as Bill for averaging the NFL's 12th-most rushing yards over expected per carry as a rookie.

Terry McLaurin largely dealt with one rough quarterback after another during the first five years of his career ... and then caught 13 touchdowns and finished as the WR15 in PPR points per game with Daniels in 2024. Maybe the soon-to-be 31-year-old veteran has already played his best football, but it's tough to be too pessimistic about his on-paper projections when he and his QB are healthy. Antonio Williams will slot in as the WR2 in this offense. We apologize to the dozens of dynasty managers who are keeping a candle lit for Treyton Burks.

The Commanders brought in former Titans TE Chig Okonkwo to presumably work as their new go-to pass catcher at the position in place of Zach Ertz. While Okonkwo never gained even 600 yards in a season during his four years in Tennessee, he's flashed some very fun YAC upside and could reasonably work as the No. 2 option in this passing game. That profile isn't so different than Isaiah Likely (complimentary).

> Utilization Notes

Jayden Daniels averaged 21.1 fantasy points as a rookie in 2024, but his 2025 season was marred by injuries. It is hard to provide much analysis on a season in which Daniels played 100% of the snaps only twice. However, he posted an elite scramble rate of 18% and collected a healthy 9% rush share in games played. That is the same sort of profile that made him a star on a larger sample in Year 1. Daniels projects as a top-5 option and is one of the few QBs with a realistic shot at finishing No. 1 overall.

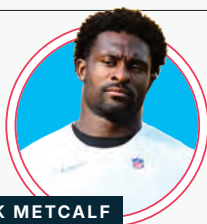
